South Korea Would Act In Accord With U.S.

SEOUL (AP) — South Korea's top military leader said Tuesday his 20-division army would "act in close coordination with United Nations forces" in case of a shooting war between the United States and Red China.

Gen. Lee Hyung Keun, chairman of the Republic of Korea (ROK) joint chiefs of staff, declined in an interview to say whether South Korea would carry out its long hoped-for drive against Red North Korea. But his statement seemed to indicate no unilateral action would be taken by the ROK army.

Asked if South Korea would send troops to help Nationalist China defend Formosa, the 35-year-old four-star general replied "we are too busy defending ourselves against the Communist forces in North Korea, who are daily increasing their strength. . . . It is a known fact they are busy preparing another attack. . . . That matter must be decided by higher authorities."

Signboards' Regulation Battle Opens 4th Week Of Oregon Legislature

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Legislature is now working in its fourth week, and faced a three-way fight over regulation of signboards along highways.

Speaker Edward A. Geary said that three bills are being prepared to regulate the billboards.

He said that one, by the Oregon Roadside Council, would call for strict control of the signs. Another bill by the big billboard companies call for a minimum of regulation, while the third, by the small billboard companies, seeks moderate regulations.

This matter was placed before the Legislative Interim Highway Committee, but it took no action.

The Commerce and Utilities Committee of the House began its long task Monday on the two water resources bills. They would create a state water resources board, and regulate the use of well water.

No School Union Urged
The lawmakers got some good news when Sen. Robert D. Holmes, Gearhart Democrat, said he wouldn't make any effort to obtain passage of a measure to provide for compulsory consolidation of school districts.

Holmes said that consolidation still is needed, but he feels that the people aren't ready yet.

He led the fight for consolidation in the past two sessions. The 1951 Legislature passed it, and the people defeated it. In 1953, the Legislature defeated it.

Property Tax Opposed
Rep. John D. Hare, Hillsboro Republican, said he is introducing a resolution opposing a state property tax, and calling on the Ways and Means Committee to appropriate funds only within the revenues available.

This resolution means that unless the Legislature adds new taxes, the Ways and Means Committee would have to trim appropriations sharply.

Meanwhile, the Legislature was waiting to find out what new taxes the 31 Democrats will propose. This decision will be announced Tuesday noon.

Rep. Herman Chindgren, Molalla Republican, plans to introduce the bill for compulsory inspection of motor vehicles. It is sponsored by the Oregon Automobile Dealers Association.

Chindgren introduced a bill Monday to exclude cookies, biscuits and crackers from regulation in the state Department of Agriculture.

Norblad Concerned Over Status Aim For Finland

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) wrote Secretary of State Dulles this week that he was "becoming very much concerned over the constant and increasing efforts of the Soviet government to virtually place Finland in the status of a satellite."

The Oregon congressman urged Dulles to use his office to "counteract these moves and do all within our power to reverse the trend and help keep that brave republic a close friend and ally of ours."

Norblad wrote that he was convinced that the "great majority" of the Finnish people "without question . . . are bitterly opposed" to the Soviets, "but under certain of their present government leaders, they seem to be slowly drifting in this direction."

A substantial number of persons of Finnish extraction live in Norblad's district.
