Radio And TV Network Overhaul Need Noted

WASHINGTON (AP)—A major overhaul of radio and TV network operations designed to "remove artificial restrictions on competition" was proposed Wednesday by Harry M. Plotkin, special counsel to the Senate Commerce Committee.

Plotkin, hired by the committee to study broadcasting problems, said in a memorandum that no new legislation was required to prevent what he called network domination of radio and television stations.

The report was made public by Chairman Magnuson (D-Wash), who said in a statement: "The public interest supersedes the interests of those who have been entrusted by the government with the utilization and administration of this greatest of public assets—the airwaves."

AFL Streetcarmen Reject Traction Company Offer

PORTLAND (AP)—AFL streetcarmen have rejected contract proposals by the Portland Traction Co. but M. E. Lienard, union business representative, said Wednesday negotiations will continue.

He reported that bus drivers and mechanics by a 15-1 majority vote turned down an offer of a 4-cent hourly wage increase and some improvement in vacation benefits. Lienard said members had sought a 15-cent boost and more vacation improvements than offered by the company.

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
