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LITTLE EYES ARE ON YOU

The article in Thursday's Statesman about Marion County's circuit court of domestic relations told how juvenile offenders and adults committing a crime involving juveniles come before that court.

Judge Felton explained the basis of the new program is the policy that all matters pertaining to juveniles ought to be handled in a family court. Legal procedure, it would seem, has caught up with what society has always known: That a problem child usually, though not always indicates some family problem, for "as the twig is bent, so grows the tree."

This old, but newly re-discovered idea, underlies an outstandingly well-done article on today's teen-agers by Bill Mauldin (of wartime cartoon fame) in the January 21 Collier's. Mauldin, who could still pass for a teen-ager himself, went here and there across the country, asking the kids, "what gives?" The answers he got shouldn't surprise any parent of high school young people but the parents might get a jolt out of seeing them in print.

Mauldin's conclusion isn't original — just as the crazy, mixed-up kid isn't unique in our times. It is a conclusion, though, that points up what the daily true-stories and real confessions in Judge Felton's court dramatize: That youngsters so often follow the examples set around them. Says Mauldin:

"Those sharp, preceptive little eyes have before them a whole neurotic warring world of booms, liars, cowards, hypocrites, bootlickers, hopheads, lechers, swaggers, snobs, and bullies, seen in entertainment form or as real-life news flashes."

"Actually, the fact that a lot of kids are adjusting so well to this age of malice and violence — where entire nations as well as individuals abide by Indian Charlie's philosophy of kicking in the groin first and asking questions later — should be a source of comfort. It's well-known by the military, for instance, that, in past wars, many American kids just couldn't bring themselves to press a trigger. Their pious parents had drilled them so thoroughly in the Christian virtues of meekness and humility that the poor little cusses didn't have much chance in combat (or in commerce, for that matter)."

"Well, that's all being fixed now. The killer instinct is being nurtured by many influences, and there seems to be undue surprise at the occasional violence, when some kid gets over-enthusiastic and becomes 'delinquent.'"

"Little eyes are on you all the time. It's an awful burden for a grownup to carry in these hard days, but the more personal attention you pay to your sub-adults the less likely you are to read about their activities in the morning paper. The kids'll be out of your hair soon enough, anyway, by marriage, by military conscription or the lure of a job. But, meanwhile, they're not going to do as you say, but as you do, and possibly with horribly original variations. If by chance they don't want to be like you, then you've really fouled up, and God help us all."

Nothing really new, here. Just an important reminder, that's all.

KEEP PUBLIC BUSINESS PUBLIC

If a measure now before the Oregon legislature is passed, all meetings of any state board, commission or committee must be "open to the public at all times" except when "discussing certain personnel matters." It is a good bill, though as some state editors have pointed out, it still needs teeth; no method of enforcement has been provided in its original draft. This can be attended to before the final disposition of the bill.

The measure deals only with state bodies and has no reference to such local governmental groups as city councils, county courts and school boards, where there is a bit of censorship in some communities. This condition varies from place to place; the Albany situation seems to be satisfactory.

This bill is one in which there should be probably more public interest than there is, since, contrary to the impression of some people, it is in the interest of the citizens, even more than that of the press, to have their public business transacted publicly, with no cards under the table. Public servants should not get the idea that they are anything other than that; the public interest is paramount.

NEW YORK (AP) — There has been a quiet revolution in the American family's food buying habits.

Wives may select most of their husband's clothing, but more and more husbands now do the grocery shopping. They have to. It's the only way they can get what they want to eat.

"About a third of the sales in the average supermarket now are made to husbands who do the family food shopping alone," estimates Frank Packard, "and another third to husbands and wives who shop together."

Packard, a cherubic, well-fed businessman who gallivants about the country in his own private plane, operates a pioneer supermarket at Hackensack, N. J. which for many years claimed it did the biggest food business under one roof of any store in America. This was before Texas started building supermarkets.

His long experience has led Packard to develop an interesting theory about the crasser sex—that is, women. They simply don't have as good taste as men, in food.

"I've never heard of any great professional women tea or coffee tasters—or chefs either," he said. "A man's taste for food is more glamorous than a woman's, because his taste buds are more sensitive."

"If you gave them a physiological test, I'm sure you'd find women's taste buds are inferior to men's. That's probably why women are inclined to overseason food."

He has found women are less adventurous than men in trying new foods. A supermarket push cart brings out the Marco Polo in a man.

"Most of the free recipe leaflets are picked up by husbands, not wives," Packard said. "Men

like to experiment. They are more likely to buy things like Japanese octopus, buffalo steak or canned rattlesnake meat."

"They buy the rattlesnake meat as a gag usually—to fool a friend, or startle a visiting mother-in-law. I don't know of anyone who eats rattlesnake meat regularly. At \$1.50 a can it isn't exactly habit-forming."

Here are some other differences he has noted between men and women grocery shoppers.

"Women enjoy buying new clothing, but buying food is just a chore to them. They get it over as quickly and efficiently as possible. But it's fun for men—a hobby."

"Women stick strictly to the household budget in buying food. Men throw the budget overboard. Sometimes they go on such food buying jags, our clerks actually have to discourage them."

"Children behave better when they are with their father. They never get lost and stick close to him. But they are more used to him. When they come in with her, they run and romp all over the store."

"Left to his own choice, a man will rarely buy fowl or fish. He'll buy beef. And he won't even go near the bakery table unless it's to get something on his wife's list."

"There's a reason for this. The psychology of food is imbedded in our language. Tell a man he's a bull, and he's flattered. Call him a creep, and he's insulted." Packard predicts changing food

THE 'GIVEAWAY' IN REVERSE

Governor Patterson did a neat job in introducing Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay to a home town audience when he pointed out that the real "giveaway" in the McKay career is not the phony ones he was charged with during the political campaign, but the giving of himself to public service.

This began in college and included the giving of blood and a permanent bodily injury on the battlefields of France in 1918, service as mayor and state senator here, return to military service in World War II and of course his larger services as governor and a member of the president's cabinet.

McKay then turned the "giveaway" charge around when he revealed that the big giveaway of his administration is giving an education to thousands of Navajo Indian children who never had a chance to go to school before, and he cited "giveaways" to the nation's taxpayers through increased receipts from leases, timber sales, etc., from the public domain, a long standing Alaska railway deficit turned into a profit and a receipt of \$144,000,000 for the right to drill for oil and chemicals off shore in the Gulf of Mexico, outside the state boundaries. This great federal asset, which his administration is turning into a real one for the first time, should eventually bring \$6 billion into the federal treasury, based on what has already been received for three percent of it.

Doug McKay's friends and neighbors here know him as both honest and competent, so his success on such a local surprise, though plenty of satisfaction, will eventually be better recognized throughout the country than it is now, for "truth crushed to earth" by false "giveaway" charges is bound to be recognized eventually.
