A record crowd of 87 members and guests greeted Mrs. H. M. Zell of Wasco, Wash., at the Roseburg Woman's Club Tuesday, when she made her third address on Gerontology during her two-day stay in Roseburg.

Reminding her audience that the United States possesses over 12 million people 65 years of age or older, Mrs. Zell emphasized again the basic importance of providing social and cultural interests for this large group. She reminded her listeners that it was possible to salvage skills and idle talents of high quality among older people, and that providing activity for these people would enable them to make full and happy use of their later years.

Mrs. Zell expressed her pleasure that the Roseburg Woman's Club, which had been a pioneer club in developing cultural interests in Roseburg, should also be a pioneer group in the exploration of the important field of Gerontology.
