Oregon State, the irresistible force of the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division, edged closer to its second straight basketball title Friday night.

State's Gilt potential Beavers ran their conference record to a spotless 9-0 by whipping Idaho's Vandals, 59-52, in a game that came within a cat's whisker of turning into an upset.

Washington, meanwhile, put the skids under whatever hopes Oregon might have been entertaining title-wise by bopping the Ducks, 54-52, in an overtime thriller.

Oregon still clung to second place but now trails Oregon State by four games with only seven games still on the schedule.

The fifth member of the conference, Washington State, sits out this weekend. The Cougars are in third place.

The sky-high Beavers were out in front of Idaho, 33-25, and looked to be surefire winners. But the Vandals came back with vengeance in the second half and before OSC knew what was happening they were two points behind.

Gill then set his Beavers to guarding closely and OSC nabbed several bad Idaho passes, giving the Beavers the chance to go back out in front.

The two starting centers Swede Halbrook of OSC and Jim Sather of Idaho, topped scoring for their respective teams. Halbrook was high for the night with 21. Sather got 14.

The Washington-Oregon tussle developed into a scoring duel between big Jim Loscutt of the Ducks and Washington's 11-11 Dean Parsons. Loscutt wound up with a one-point lead at 27.

Timmy Dye's Washington lads started fast against the Ducks and left the floor at the intermission in command, 32-23.

The Huskies maintained that edge through most of the second half and were ahead, 49-38, with about six minutes remaining when Oregon snapped to and started hitting the basket.

Within three minutes the Ducks had cut the margin to 49-45. A field goal by Phil McHugh and Loscutt's tip-in knotted the score.

In the overtime period, Washington's Dean Parsons got a free throw. Dovie Perkins added two more points on a jump shot and Don Sumitser sealed it with the Huskies with two charity tosses. Oregon could manage only three.

The Dons, ranked second in the nation, came from behind to defeat Loyola of Los Angeles in the San Francisco Cow Palace, 65-55.

About 35 miles to the south, the 5 foot 11 Tomise banged in 40 points — a new Southern Division scoring record for the Pacific Coast Conference, as the Indians walloped Southern California, 92-78.

Stanford still shares the Southern Division lead with the UCLA Bruins, who beat California Friday night, 83-64. Both now have 4-1 conference records.

Gavilan Wins Split Verdict Over Durando

NEW YORK — How much does Kid Gavilan have left? The first returns are in now.

After his split decision over Ernie Durando last night at Madison Square Garden, you'd say the Cuban Kead still can take a bombing punch on the chin by a slugger. He still can flash an eye-catching flurry to win votes and start arguments in the balcony.

Maybe Gavilan still has enough left to win back the welterweight title he lost to Johnny Saxton, Oct. 20, in Philadelphia. Maybe, but not for sure. It will take more than one fight to tell, after a three-month layoff.

There were times when Gavilan, weighing 152½ to Durando's 160½ pounds, revived memories of his early days. There were times, in the first and third rounds, when he reminded you of his fights with Saxton in Philadelphia and Bobo Olson in Chicago, right when his reflexes were blurred and his pace slowed and labored.

One official, Referee Mark Conn, thought Gavilan had so little that he won only three rounds, losing to Durando on a 7-3 card. Both judges had Gavilan on top, but not by too much. Judge Bert Grant gave it 6-4 and Judge Artie Adala 5-4-1, the same as the Associated Press. A single poll of writers showed a lopsided vote for Gavilan.

Many in the crowd of 8,208 paying \$21,958 bowed the decision. Most of them probably had come over from New Jersey to cheer for Durando, a 28-year-old middleweight from Boyonene and a 4 to 1 underdog. He gave them plenty to cheer, too, for he was always pressing, forcing the action from bell to bell as he cranked up his heavy punches or pawed with a jab.

Gavilan owed his decision to the left hook that won so many of his 118 pro fights since 1943. At one stage in the seventh, he drove home 10 consecutive hooks, accompanying each with a grunt.

Durando wobbled the Kead with a hook in the fourth and bounced a thudding right off his jaw in the fifth but it was Gavilan's furious flurry in the last 30 seconds that won the all-important decisive round on Adala's card.

Coquille Defeats Bulldogs, 66-64

Three teams in the Associated Press high school poll suffered defeats Friday night, but the other poll leaders won their games handsily in Oregon prep basketball action.

St. Helens' 66-54 win over River was its 15th consecutive victory without a defeat. St. Helens was picked as the No. 5 team in the poll.

Among the losers was North Bend, No. 4 in the poll and winner of 16 games this season. Coquille handed North Bend its second loss, 66-64 in a startling upset. Jack Jacobson's 34 points was a big factor in Coquille's victory.

South Salem and Beaverton, tied for 10th place, both were defeated. Milwaukie, the second rated team, dumped South Salem 48-24, and unranked Milwaukie handed Beaverton its first loss after nine wins in the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League 67-59.

Milwaukie, the defending state champion, has a 14-3 record. Medford, the state's No. 1 team, won its 14th game against a single loss, nudging Marshfield 67-62 in a close game at Coos Bay. Frank Rector and Larry Coppel paced Medford's attack with 18 points apiece, and Ted Fischer and Roger Johnson each scored 17 for Marshfield.

Eugene, No. 3 in the poll, pushed its record to 14-2 for the season by walloping Oakridge 75-34 in a district 6 contest at Eugene. Mike Moran, the 6-8 Eugene center, outscored the entire Oakridge team by dumping in 36 points. Eugene led at the half, 37-9.
