

Indians Beat Bulldogs, 48-44

Visitors Give Local Hoopsters Nip And Tuck Battle Saturday

If Sutherland was on the way to a late season collapse after losing three straight prior to Saturday night, the Bulldogs didn't show it in losing a fourth straight to the Indians here the same evening.

Roseburg snapped a 29-29 tie in the third period and cushioned its way to an interesting 48-44 triumph over the Bulldogs to sweep the season's series between the two teams.

Sutherland had just tied the score for the fourth time in the period at 29-29 when Bill Oeding registered from 30-feet with two minutes left to play. When the ball changed hands again Nub Beamer banked one in to make it 33-29 and the Indians led thereafter in winning their sixth game of the season.

Lefty Carl Gwyn hit a left-handed hooker to make it 33-31 but missed the free throw he was awarded on Howard Roberts' foul on the same play.

Oeding then poured through for another lefty and the south-paw duel with Bay carried on, and at the horn Dick Roberts' 15-footer put Roseburg in front 37-31. This was the game's biggest margin of difference up to that point on either side.

Roseburg Jayvees Win Again, 50-35

NEW YORK (AP) — Save a little sympathy for Gunnar Nielsen. He deserves it.

The sorrell-topped Copenhagen pressman held the world indoor mile record Monday, but his fine performance—4:03.6, which shaved two-tenths of a second off Wes Santee's week-old mark—has been all but lost in the shuffle.

In fact, it is safe to say that not more than a handful of the 14,736 spectators who jammed Madison Square Garden for the final race of the season Saturday night, saw him break the tape.

There was a better performance going on behind him. Santee and Fred Dwyer, a pint-sized edition of Man Mountain Dean, were engaging in a lively razzle-dazzle match.

Dwyer got the decision, breaking off of Santee's hold to cross the finish line behind Nielsen. But the referee, ... er, judges, blew the whistle on him and he was disqualified. On the reversed decision Santee was awarded the place.

Santee appeared to be on the way to breaking his own mark until Nielsen came on from third place to pass him on the turn leading into the home stretch. Wes went wide to fight off the Great Dane and Dwyer tried to sneak in on the inside.

Santee moved back into his pole spot when Nielsen shot past and in the process shoved Dwyer right off the track. Fred hopped back on the track and some more pushing kept their minds occupied.

Santee grabbed Dwyer's shoulder, and Fred retaliated with a bear hug.

Then the two danced around and it appeared that Dwyer might lose Santee right into the boxes.

Dwyer finally broke loose and staggered across the line. Some officials caught him in 4:06 and Santee and Bob McMillen of the armed forces each in 4:06.5.

Who's going to beat Oregon State?

The Idaho Vandals, like the other Northern Division basketball teams, thought they had the answer but a weekend encounter with Coach Sall's potent Beavers proved otherwise.

This time, the title-bound Beavers added a 69-63 Saturday night victory over Idaho to their Friday 59-52 triumph at Moscow for their 10th straight conference win without a loss. Wade (Swede) Halbrook popped them in from all over for 27 points.

It was a "63" night on other floors, too. Oregon pronounced Washington 64-63 Saturday night at Eugene when Max Anderson sank two late-minute free throws and a "63" score dropped up down south. UCLA trounced California, 84-63. Washington State was idle.

No Northern Division team has gone through the season undefeated since the 16-game schedule was started back in 1939, so Oregon State might slip. The best marks have been two 15-1 seasons, both by Washington, in 1944 and 1953.

Idaho started out like a house afire, taking a 13-4 lead in the first four minutes, but OSC had the extingisher handy. The visitors evened it up and moved to a 33-31 halftime lead, and staved off another Vandal spurt at start of the second half.

Coach Gill cleared his bench with three minutes to go. Harlan Melton was high scorer for Idaho with 24 points.

Oregon, out to even up for its overtime 54-52 loss Friday night to Washington, moved out in front and led at the half, 36-29. The game was close, with the lead changing hands eight times and tied four times.

The Huskies' Jim Coshaw tossed in a two-point shot to give Washington a 63-62 lead with a minute, 15 seconds to go. But he then committed his fifth personal to leave the game and the man he fouled, center Anderson, made both free throws for the winning points.

Jim Loscutoff, Oregon, was high scorer for the Ducks with 20 points. Dean Parsons was tops for Washington with 14.

This weekend WSC visits Seattle for two games with Washington and Idaho has a two-game visit at Oregon. OSC takes the weekend off.

San Francisco, aiming for No. 1 ranking among the nation's college teams, takes on two California Basketball Assn. opponents this week while UCLA and Stanford battle for undisputed possession of the Southern Division lead.

The Dazzling USC Dons, rated second to Kentucky in last week's Associated Press poll, meet College of the Pacific Wednesday and

San Jose State Friday. USC defeated both earlier.

The Dons 15-1 have won 14 straight. They lost to UCLA at Los Angeles but easily beat the Bruins in San Francisco.

UCLA, rated eighth in the country, hosts Stanford Friday and Saturday. The teams are tied for first place with 5-1. Hapless California 0-6 entertains Southern California 2-4.
