\$43,074 Damages Sought For Accident Injuries

Damages totaling \$43,074.25 are
sought in two suits filed in Dou-
glas County Circuit Court by two
persons injured in an end-to-end
collision on Highway 99.
The suits were brought by Jean-
ette E. Reed and Bitha Haney
against Frank R. Ramsey and
Jesse Comer. Plaintiff Reed seeks
\$18,500 general and \$541.75 special
damages. Plaintiff Haney seeks
\$23,500 and \$532.50.
Both allege they received perma-
nent injuries in an accident
near Myrtle Creek on May 14,
1954. Comer was driving a 1954
truck as an employee of Ramsey.
It is alleged the truck hit the
Reed car, which hit another car,
which in turn struck the car in
which Mrs. Haney was riding. It
is alleged Comer was negligent
and responsible for damage done.

German Orchestra Schedules Tour

BERLIN (AP) — The Berlin Philhar-
monic Orchestra is going to the
United States this month for a tour
of 19 cities. The trip may show
whether music lovers there are
willing to forget about the tainted
past of some of its members.
"We consider it significant, both
culturally and politically, that 10
years after the war we have a
chance to go to America," says
the orchestra manager, Gerhart
von Westernhagen.
The Orchestra's temporary con-
ductor Herbert von Karajan was
a Nazi party member. So were
Von Westernhagen and some of
the orchestra's 103 members. Roughly
half of them played in the orches-
tra during the war. In return, they
received the supreme favor from
Adolf Hitler — exemption from
military duty.
"It is possible there will be no
objections to us," Von Westernhagen
conceded in an interview. "If there
are, we hope we can win over the
objections through our music."
"We must prove that music has
nothing to do with politics."
"It will be a great adventure.
Only one or two members of the
orchestra have been to America."
His anticipation is dampened
somewhat by the fear that Ameri-
can audiences might not under-
stand the orchestra's style.

Freighter Pulled Loose From Grays Harbor Mud

ABERDEEN (AP) — The freighter
Ocean Lott was pulled from the
mud in a narrow dredged
channel in Grays Harbor at high
tide Monday and proceeded on its
way to its dock.
The 4,413-ton ship, carrying
about 9,000 tons of cargo, was
pulled loose by the powerful tug
Salvage Chief of Astoria, Ore., in
face of wind gusts of 35 miles an
hour and heavy rain.
Although aground for about 150
feet at its stern, the New York
owned ship, appeared to have es-
caped without damage.
The Ocean Lott, carrying a
crew of 35, went aground Sunday.

More Cabbies Questioned In Rubinstein Slaying

NEW YORK (AP) — Police are
interviewing more cab drivers in
efforts to find the one who drove
model Estelle Gardner home from
Serge Rubinstein's mansion a few
hours before the playboy financier
was slain 11 days ago.
Miss Gardner, 26, is the last
person known to have seen Rubin-
stein alive.
A stream of cab drivers went to
a police station Sunday with their
trip records for the morning of
Jan. 27, but the one who drove
Miss Gardner was not found among
them.
Top aides of Manhattan Dist.
Atty. Frank S. Hogan and Police
Commissioner Francis W. H.
Adams met Sunday to review
lengthy reports on the investigation
of the murder of Rubinstein, who
was found strangled, gagged and
trussed in his bedroom.

Frank McNamee performed the
ceremony.
Dailey was divorced in 1951 from
Elizabeth Hofert, Los Angeles
socialite. The O'Connors were di-
vorced last year.

Chemical Plant Near Springfield Damaged

EUGENE (AP) — Two fires caused
considerable damage in this area
over the weekend.
One was at the Borden Chemical
Co. plant at Springfield. It resulted
in a loss estimated by E. A. Kin-
ney, plant superintendent, at
between \$5,000 and \$10,000.
The plant makes formaldehyde
and resins used in adhesives and
glue. Kinney said it would be back
in production this week.
Another blaze destroyed an old
resort lodge on the McKenzie
River. The building was insured
for \$30,000.
