Lumber Industry On Up-Swing In Jackson County

MEDFORD — The lumber processing industry in this area is expanding—by an estimated \$2,500,000.

The industry, which accounts for

more than half of the income dollars in Jackson County, has not had a comparable growth since just after the end of World War II. Construction has already started on one half-million-dollar plywood plant; plans for another are being discussed among a group of interested lumbermen, and a third group recently announced its plans for a \$300,000 mill.

Other firms are expanding their operations, and two new small sawmills are expected to begin operations by spring.

These developments are raising hopes of residents who have long felt the need for more processing and remanufacturing because of a slack-off in the logging and sawmilling operations, expected as private timberlands are cut off.

The growth of remanufacturing as demonstrated by the plans for plywood operations, plus rapid growth of tree farms in the area, offer the best hope for a healthy and continuing lumber products industry, most observers here believe.

Tree farms have grown from nothing to more than 200,000 acres in Jackson County alone in less than 10 years. Most of the bigger

lumbering companies have tree farm units, and more are in prospect.

The owners of the tree farms, and other lumber and logging concerns interested in forest conservation and forest management practices, are organized into the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm Assn. This group serves them with a radio network operated through mobile radio units, with a co-operative fire fighting plan, and a logging truck clearing house and registry.

Edward Nicholas Faces Charge Of Non-Support

Edward Nicholas Jr., 27, Montecano, Wash., has been returned to the Douglas County jail from his home to face a charge of non-support outstanding against him for more than two years.

Nicholas was secretly indicted by the grand jury more than a month ago. Sunday, he was brought back here by a sheriff's deputy. Bail of \$1,000 has been set on the man.

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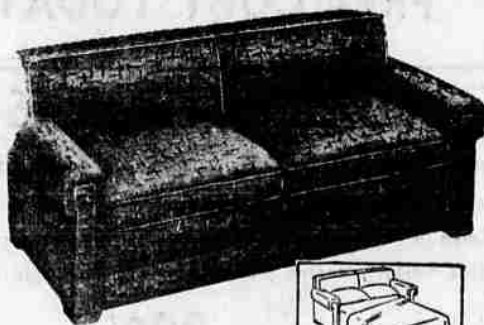
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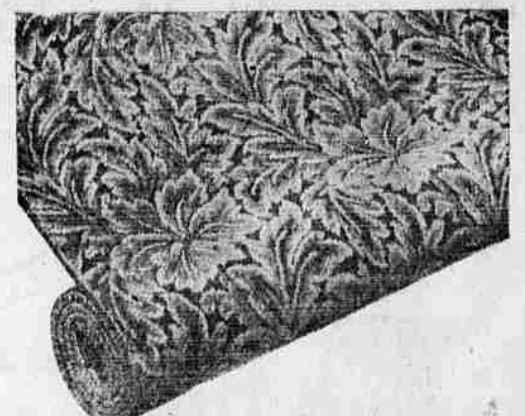

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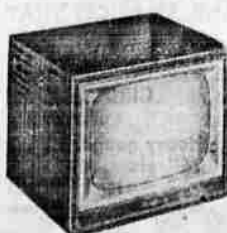
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
