## Eisenhower Recalls Meeting With Zhukov During War

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower recalled Wednesday pleasant relations with Marshal Georgi Zhukov, new Soviet defense minister, during World War II—and held open the possibility that he might invite Zhukov to visit the United States.

A reporter came out with the idea of such an invitation at the President's news conference. Eisenhower seemed momentarily taken aback. But he did not close the door against the idea.

The President, appearing to catch his breath, said he wasn't so sure. It was the first time the idea had been put to him in his present job, he said, but it was a remarkable thing to consider and he certainly wanted to talk it over with his aides.

Leading up to this, Eisenhower had related under questioning that while Allied commander in World War II he came to know and admire Zhukov, who led the Red armies into Berlin.

Eisenhower said he invited the Russian soldier to visit America in 1945—even placed his own plane at Zhukov's disposal for the trip and suggested that his son, Maj. John Eisenhower, accompany the Russian as an aide.

Missouri House committee rejected by a 20-5 vote Tuesday night an effort to bar nudism and the nudists' uncensored publications in the state.

The action by the Judiciary Committee came after hours of testimony on the bill against nudism.

The Rev. Braxton B. Sawyer, former Baptist minister who told the committee he heads a non-profit Religious Broadcasting Corporation, supported the measure. He said he was compelled to campaign against nudism when he noticed a group of youngsters giggling slyly over some nudist magazines in a drugstore.

At one point, he asked committee members not to borrow and read the magazines he was using as evidence. Then he said he had some others and he had helped pass out bundles of one publication.

He was behind similar legislation that was killed in Oklahoma recently and passed by the Arkansas House of Representatives just Tuesday.

He is the same man who carried his campaign to a national nudist convention last summer in Battle Creek, Mich. He was thrown out because he gave up neither his clothes nor his camera, he said.

Tuesday night, as in Oklahoma, he was opposed in the hearing by Mrs. Maria Parks of Newton, Kan., the Midwest nudist queen.

She said nudism provided a healthful form of relaxation for families and denied that young people were permitted to join just for the thrill. She denied, also, Sawyer's assertion that she testified in Oklahoma she got a big thrill out of disrobing in front of men.

**Betty Hutton Too Nervous When She's Not Working**

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Betty Hutton, who announced she was retiring last Nov. 8, is back in show business, ready and willing to take night club, television and movie work.

"I was wrong and I admit it," the bouncy blonde said Tuesday. She said that after getting settled in a new house she found herself with nothing to do, nervous and short tempered, whereupon her mother told her: "There's nothing wrong with you that going back into show business wouldn't cure."

## Unintended Rifle Shot Kills Man

McMINNVILLE (AP) — A young Air Force man from Maryland, teaching his fiancée how to shoot a .22 caliber rifle on a farm near here, was killed Tuesday by an unintended shot.

Deputy Coroner Otto Heider said the victim was Sgt. James Donald Wilson, 20, of Ridgely, Md., on leave from the Klamath, Calif., Air Force Base.

Handling the rifle, Heider said, was Mrs. Jean Akers, 20, Wilson's fiancée. Mrs. Akers, who had fired the rifle only twice before, loaded it with the intention of firing at a target, while Wilson was in a nearby building. But the rifle fired while pointed at the building.

Heider said, and Mrs. Akers heard a cry, ran to Wilson and found him dead with a wound in the chest.

An autopsy was ordered. Wilson was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. James R. Wilson of Ridgely.

The mishap occurred on the Orville Straight farm near Grand Ronde, west of here.

## Legislature Gets First Look At Barrington Report

SALEM (AP) — The Legislature's Joint Ways and Means Committee got its first look Wednesday at the Barrington Report which recommends pay and job upgrading for many state employees.

Then it voted to introduce the report as a bill so it could take plenty of time to examine it closely.

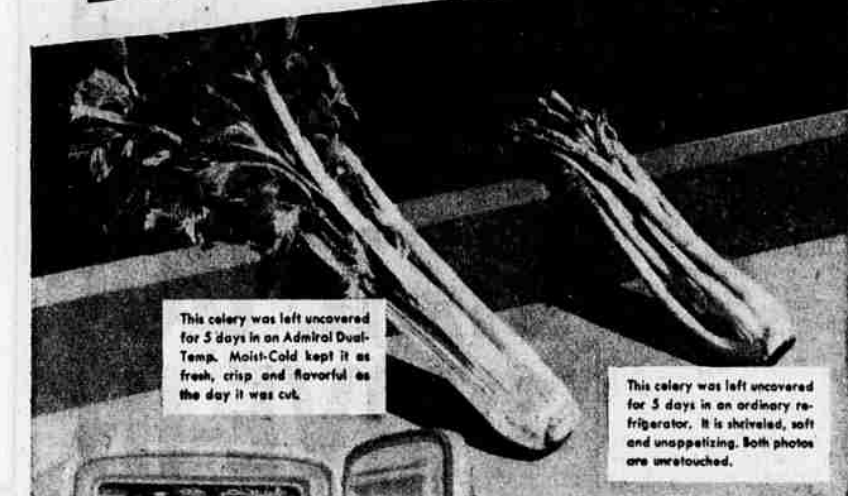
The committee heard Donald Spanier, survey chief for the Barrington firm, say that adopting the report would cost more than \$1,000,000 in the next biennium.

The report says that of the state's 17,000 employees, 1,700 are underpaid, and 1,200 are overpaid.

At the committee meeting, Sen. John P. Hounsell, Hood River Republican, criticized State Finance Director Harry S. Dorman for sponsoring a bill to transfer betterment funds of state institutions.

The Board of Control criticized Dorman Tuesday for doing this.
