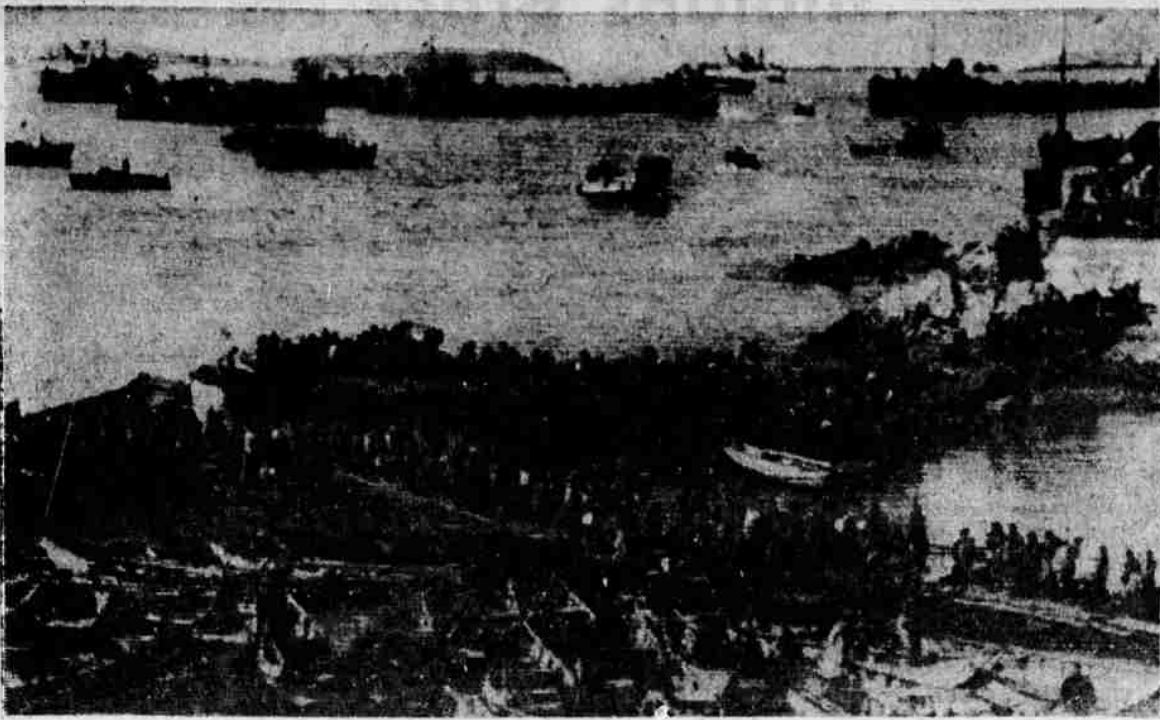

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## Oregon House Completes Resolution Backing Ike On Position To Defend Formosa

SALEM, Ore. — The Oregon House of Representatives completed legislative action Wednesday on a resolution giving President Eisenhower "unequivocal backing" in his position to defend Formosa.

The House action was unanimous. The Senate approved it 29 to 1 last week.

The House vote followed 45 minutes of discussion, making it one of the longest discussions of any measure that has passed without opposition.

While Republicans asked for Democratic support to make it a bipartisan gesture, Democrats objected that they weren't asked to co-sponsor the resolution.

Rep. Leon S. Davis, Hillsboro Republican, opened with a statement that the resolution would echo "the true feeling of every right-thinking citizen of this state."

Rep. Alfred Corbett, Portland Democrat, then made the objection that Democrats were not invited to join in introduction of the resolution.

"This resolution," he said, "is not aimed at informing the people. The President's purpose in asking backing from Congress was to unite the conflicting forces in the Republican Party, and to shore up the regime of Chiang Kai-shek. The Democrats have helped the President on foreign policy more than have the members of his own party."

Then Rep. John D. Hare, Hills-

boro Republican, argued that ex-President Truman "got us into the mess that we're now in."

A bill passed by the House and sent to the Senate would make the secretary of state grant hearings before he revokes or suspends the license of a driver he considers unsafe. These hearings now are granted only after the license is revoked or suspended.

Other measures sent to the Senate by the House would allow house trailers to use only one license plate, and provide that only one ballot number in an election should be given to any one candidate.

The Senate, as it does every two years, passed a bill to validate marriages of divorced persons who didn't wait six months before remarrying. The bill, which goes to the House, also makes legitimate children of such marriages.

Sen. Joseph K. Carson Jr., Portland Democrat, introduced a memorial asking Congress to pay "adequate pensions" to veterans of World War I.

#### EXTREME COLD

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Northern Maine had another period of extreme cold Wednesday with 28 below zero at Presque Isle. There the thermometer sagged to -42 last week and for several days didn't go above zero.

## Senate Committee Asks For Speedy Treaty Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee called Wednesday for speedy ratification of the Formosa defense treaty to deter the Chinese Communists from "reckless attempts to liberate Formosa" in the face of U.S. pledges to defend it.

In a report the committee said it is of great importance that the American policy of keeping Formosa in friendly hands be supported by a concrete understanding that "appropriate action" will be taken to defend that island and the Pescadores against armed attack.

"By doing this in terms which cannot be misunderstood it is hoped that the Communist military regime will be deterred from further attempts to aggrandize its position in the Far East at the expense of the free world," the report said.

All signs pointed to lopsided Senate approval of the agreement with Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist Chinese regime, probably by Thursday.

## Second Columbia Bridge Bill Is Recommended

OLYMPIA (AP) — A bill authorizing a second bridge over the Columbia River between Vancouver and Portland received a "do pass" recommendation from the House Highways Committee Tuesday.

The bill provides the 10 million dollar span be financed by tolls and also authorizes the return of tolls to the existing bridge until the new one is paid for and the old one repaired and altered.

State Highways Director W. A. Bunge told the committee the bill will "clear the cobwebs" left by the 1933 Legislature which passed a similar measure.

Bunge said the second bridge is needed to handle the increasing traffic across the Columbia. Some 42,000 vehicles use the present bridge each day, he said, and the figure will rise to 60,000 by 1960.

The bridge would be built jointly by Washington and Oregon.

Oregon would design and construct the span and the Washington Toll Bridge Authority would handle financing and operation.
