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Republicans Open Efforts To Allow Extra Terms

BOISE (AP) — Republican leaders opened an all-out effort Thursday to budge the first major roadblock of the current legislative session — the proposed constitutional amendment allowing Gov. Robert E. Smylie and future governors a second term.

Declaring that "no governor can succeed unless he can succeed himself," Majority Leader Earl S. Wright (R-Clark) told a reporter the measure was as important for the Democrats as the Republicans.

But Minority Leader O. J. Buxton (D-Teton) told newsmen Democrats would hold firm to their successful opposition "until the Republicans show some signs of wanting to cooperate with us."

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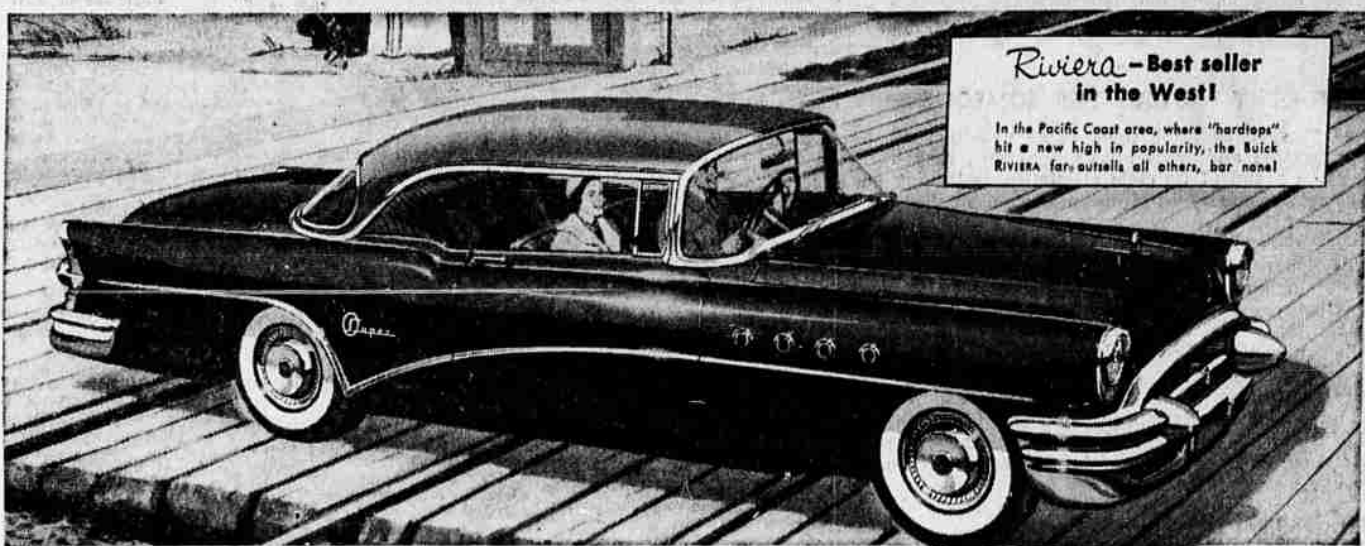
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
