For Long Ski Race

EUGENE (AP) — The number of entries in the National Cross Country Ski Championships at nearby Willamette Pass next week-end stood at 20 Thursday.

They included Tauno Paakkkanen, the defending champion from the Finnish Ski Club of New York, and Sven Johansson, Anchorage, Alaska, who was rated a slight favorite.

Johansson recently won the North American Cross Country near Minneapolis and won the John Craig Memorial, which is held in the Willamette Pass area, in 1953 and 1954.

The 11-mile race will be held Saturday. The 18-mile test is scheduled for Sunday.

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Sutherland Girl Finalist, Wins Plaque Award

PORTLAND (AP) — George Shaw was named the state's outstanding sports personality of 1954 by the Oregon Sports Writers and Sportscasters Assn. Thursday night.

He received the Bill Hayward memorial trophy at the annual "banquet of champions," attended by 600 persons.

It was the latest in a series of honors awarded the University of Oregon quarterback.

He was the nation's offensive leader in college football. He was named on numerous all-star teams, and played in the East-West Shrine game. He was the first man elected in the annual draft by professional football teams.

Also a star in baseball, Shaw has not decided yet whether to play professional football or baseball.

Shaw won the award by vote of 50 association members, who selected him from 12 finalists in the annual event. The other 11 received plaques.

They were: Dale Leabo, Portland, softball; Ray Hyde, Portland semipro baseball; Wayne Sturdivant, Milwaukie, high school coaching; Duane Marshall, St. Helens, outstanding high school athlete; Carole Jo Kabier, Sutherlin, golf; Bill Goetter, Hillsboro, bowling; Jack Puscas, Eugene, boxing; Clay Brown, Portland, baseball; Swede Halbrook, Oregon State College, basketball; Bill Delinger, University of Oregon, track; Maureen Murphy, Portland, swimming.

5,824 Teams Due At ABC Tourney

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) — The American Bowling Congress announced Friday that 5,824 teams will compete in the 1955 ABC tournament, to be held in Fort Wayne March 26 through June 5.

The entry list also includes 11,311 doubles, 22,618 singles and 18,817 all-events. With these adding individuals to the 29,129 bowlers on teams, the total of participants is expected to top 31,000.

Fort Wayne has the most team entries with 582. Chicago is sending 300 teams, Detroit 297, Milwaukee 189 and Dayton, Ohio, 180. Teams have entered from 42 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and the Canadian provinces of Ontario, Manitoba and Quebec.

Angels, Seals Close Ranks, Quit Playing Footsie With The Majors

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Los Angeles and San Francisco, which have been playing footsie with the major leagues, Friday found themselves closing ranks with the other six teams in the Pacific Coast League against any invasion from the east.

All signs pointed to a stronger, more determined West Coast circuit under its aggressive new president, Claire V. Goodwin.

The surest sign was Thursday's unanimous action by the eight directors in giving—not lending—San Diego \$100,000 toward construction of a new ball park. The other seven clubs were promised assistance "in every possible manner" for new parks.

Jerry Donovan, PCL executive secretary, said the assistance resolution "means the league will act in concert, as a unit."

President Bill Starr of the San Diego Padres placed a stronger interpretation on the action. "This will prove to all that the Coast League is not concerned over the threat of major league invasion," he said. "We are building our league with the determination to remain in business for a long, long time."

Only last fall—when San Francisco voters approved a \$5 million dollar bond issue to build a baseball park for a big league team—fans were speculating about how soon—not whether—a major franchise would be forthcoming.

However, both the American and National Leagues recently delayed indefinitely any action toward either expansion, or transferring any more franchises. And this week baseball commissioner Ford Frick asked all major leaguers to quit discussing possible expansion.

The \$100,000 grant to San Diego prompted Starr to announce he would start immediately to raise \$900,000 in private capital to build a modern park replacing rundown Lane Field.

Jay Eaton Sweeps Micro Race Field

By grabbing 52 out of a possible 57 points in last Saturday night's races, Jay Eaton in micro-midget No. 12 made a sensational leap from fourth to second place in the driver point standings.

Eaton, who also established the new track record of 9:61 in last week's fourth weekly racing program at the County Fairgrounds track, now trails the leading driver, Del Graves, by only 10 points.

The Pacific Racing Assn. reports the addition of three new bleacher sections to handle larger crowds and the completion of the ventilation system to ease smoke and fumes in the indoor pavilion where races are held.

An additional improvement is the enlargement of the parking area which allows spectators to park much closer to the arena.

Races resume Saturday night with a full program of nine events. Time trials begin at 7:30. Regular races follow with two trophy dashes, five heat races and A and B main events.

Steelhead Slow On Tenmile Lakes

Steelhead angling is reported slow on the Tenmile Lakes outlet as well as the Umpqua River this week by the weekly report of the Oregon State Game Commission. The lower Umpqua is described as being muddy while inclement weather has caused all streams in the upper river to rise and become very roily. If weather and water conditions improve by week's end, angling may be fair.

Water and weather conditions are described as ideal on the Rogue with prospects for the coming weekend expected to continue to be good if the weather remains favorable. Steelhead angling is reported up this past week over the preceding week with limit catches seen each day on the Rogue, particularly below Hells Gate.

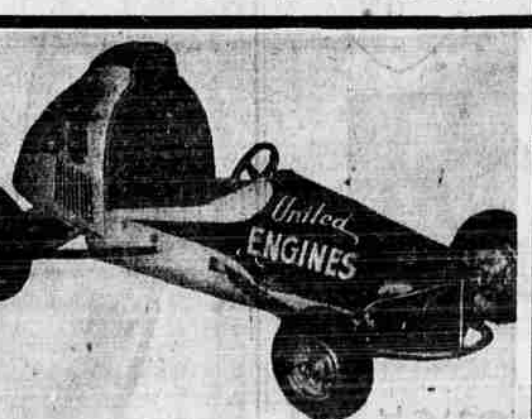
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
