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YOUR BODY

An increase in the body temperature is always due to one of several factors; a disturbance of the central brain control or the presence of some infection within the blood stream. The infectious process is by far the more common. It usually is accompanied by some other symptom however. This is seen in the beginning of the contagious and infectious diseases of childhood.

The average normal temperature of the body is about 98.6 F. This is the normal oral temperature taken by mouth, the rectal temperature being approximately one degree higher.

For an infant, a temperature of less than 101 degrees might be called a slight fever; between that point and 102 degrees a moderate fever; and over 103 degrees a considerable fever; over 104 degrees is considered a high fever. High fevers are more common in children, and are not of as serious import as in adults, usually unless they are continued. A temperature of 100 degrees or over usually is significant of some sort of physical disorder; this is usually one of the most reliable methods of determining if a child is ill.

Fever lasting for a few days are not as harmful as commonly believed, unless the temperature is quite high. Fever is nature's method of combating the cause,

In most conditions, and moderate fever, unless it continues for many days, need not cause anxiety as far as the increased temperature itself is concerned. High fever often should be reduced, since headache, delirium, and, in infants, convulsions are common. The eruptive diseases of childhood, such as tonsillitis, gripple, and diphtheria are often first brought to attention through fever.

Fever is only a symptom of many diseases. The temperature of the human body is regulated centrally by specific areas in the base of the brain and also by the skin, which accomplishes temperature changes by the moisture given off through the process of perspiration.

Frequently a fever is preceded by a sensation of chilliness or there may be a severe chill. Shortly thereafter, there will be a rise in temperature. In children, this may go as high as 104 to 105 degrees.

Fever, as a beginning of one of the children's diseases, may remain until a rash appears; then it will slowly subside. There is one disease associated with a sudden drop in the fever or crisis. This drop is an accompaniment of the end of pneumonia and is often most dramatic in its suddenness. (P.D. Ad.)

Radio Broadcasts Record But Gives Legion Free Time

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. — A Springfield radio station broadcast a controversial drama called "The Investigator" Friday that gave the American Legion air time to protest the drama as a "poisonous parody" of the investigative activities of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Glen Stadler, manager of the station, KRGA, said 89 phone calls were received approving the station's playing of the 45-minute record and 24 calls protesting.

The Legion's protest was voiced by William D. Browne, chairman of the Oregon Legion's Subversive Activities Committee and a member of the national Legion's Un-American Activities Committee.

Browne said Reuben Ship, author of the play, was deported from the United States in 1953 on the ground that he became a Communist after being granted U.S. citizenship. He said "The Investigator" is a "poisonous parody" of McCarthy's activities. Stadler called it a political satire.

The Legion protested against royalties going to Ship, now living in Canada, and asked the station not to play the record.

"The Legion believes in freedom," Browne said, "but not in the Communist Party having free rein to express its views without an answer."

Lumber Company Sued By Property Owners

Suit for \$17,442 has been entered in circuit court in Roseburg against the Wilbur Lumber Co. by Howard S. and Dorothy Murray and Robert G. and Bette June Murray.

The Murrys claim 322 lambs and 304 ewes strayed and were lost while the company was logging on land assigned to their use. The complaint states that a contract had required that fences and gates on the property be maintained and that the contract was violated.

The suit also asks that \$2,000 be paid the Murrys for legal fees.

LONDON — Deputy Labor Leader Herbert Morrison said Friday he thought the United States had made some mistakes in its Chinese policy but warned Britons about developing any anti-American feeling as a result.

Northwest Pipeline Financing Plan Wins Approval

WASHINGTON — The plan by which the Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. proposes to finance its 163 million dollar line to bring the Northwest its first natural gas received the approval of the Federal Power Commission Friday.

Pacific Northwest Pipeline's president, Ray C. Fish, said the financing of the long line from the San Juan Basin of New Mexico and Colorado to the Pacific Northwest is expected to be completed next month, and construction will start "immediately thereafter."

The financing plan would involve: 1. The sale of 120 million dollars in first mortgage bonds to insurance companies.

2. Public sale for \$20,000,000 of 287,000 units consisting of \$60 in interim notes and one share of common stock each.

3. The sale of 1,549,000 shares of common stock to present company stockholders at \$10 a share.

4. The issuance of \$3,654,000 in unsecured notes at 3 1/2 per cent interest to Phillips Petroleum for lease rights to 70,000 acres in the San Juan Basin Pacific Northwest will buy from Phillips.

The San Juan line will run north to Bellingham, Wash., serving Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho, Washington and Oregon markets en route.

The line will carry 283 million cubic feet of gas a day, during its first two years of operation and then jump to 343 million cubic feet a day as authorized by the FPC.

The financing plans okehed Friday do not encompass an amended application filed by Pacific Northwest for permission to buy Canadian gas from Westcoast Transmission Co. to augment San Juan supplies.

Combat Veteran Shoots Younger Rival For Girl

BREMERTON, Wash. — A 44-year-old former combat infantryman picked off his younger rival for the love of an 18-year-old girl with seven closely placed rifle shots Friday, then blew his own life away with a shotgun.

The victims of what Coroner Al Segerquist said was a case of murder-suicide were:

Albert M. Bloom, 44, a farm hand on the Harold Hoak dairy ranch near Burley, at the south end of Kitsap County.

Richard C. May, 20, a fellow worker on the Hoak farm and also a former Army private.

Details pieced together by Harold Doss, chief of detectives in the Kitsap County Sheriff's office, revealed this story:

May and Bloom had quarreled over the fact May had been dating Carolyn Hoak, 18, a junior at South Kitsap High School and daughter of the dairy owner. Bloom also had advised the girl not to date May but she had not accepted the advice and continued to go with the younger man.

Increasingly moody and quarrelsome, Bloom had waited Friday inside his quarters on the Hoak place while May operated a tractor nearby. When May was about 40 yards away, Bloom opened fire with a small caliber rifle, grouping six shots in May's back and one behind the left ear.

A Canyonville man, Frank Smith, received strict orders from Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff Friday when Smith pleaded guilty to assault and battery.

25 Deaths Result From Severe Cold

Roberts Creek Consolidation Vote On Monday
Roberts Creek gets another chance to become part of a bigger district Monday when consolidation votes are held there and at Myrtle Creek.

The consolidation vote is scheduled at both districts from 2 to 8 p.m. At Myrtle Creek, voters will cast their ballots at the Tri City School and the Myrtle Creek Elementary School.

The effort for consolidation is the latest in a drawn-out campaign to give Roberts Creek high school students a place to go to school. They are currently being taken on a tuition basis at Glide, but the Glide School Board has emphasized this arrangement will be terminated at the end of the school year.

Roberts Creek district has a census of 21 children, who would be added to Myrtle Creek's 2,134. Valuation of the tiny district is \$171,534.

The Myrtle Creek Mail reports if consolidation is agreed, the Myrtle Creek school board will approve continuation of the present one-room school until the new highway is completed. High school students would privately be brought to Myrtle Creek for school.

Drain Council Approves Site For Sewage Plant

The Drain City Council has approved purchase of a five-acre site for a proposed sewage filtration plant in south Drain, according to the Drain Enterprise.

The deal will be purchased from J. A. DeLaunay, who quoted a sale price of \$5,000.

At the same time, the Council has voted to have the city recorder contact engineers to design the plant and sewer lines.

Tucson Arizona Boys Chorus Will Sing Wednesday

From the land of cactus and coyotes, canyons and cowboys, comes one of the unique new attractions of the American concert stage. It is the Tucson Arizona Boys Chorus, which will sing here next Wednesday at 8:15 p.m. in the Central Junior High School auditorium. The appearance is under the auspices of the Roseburg Community Concert association.

In their vestments of cowboy jeans, the boys are beguiling in their program of classics, carols, folk songs, Mexican novelties and westerns sung with a superb blend of fine young voices, state advance reports.

Their own highly original arrangements of songs of the great southwest, spiced with comedy and seasoned with calf hawls and coyote calls give their program its distinctly American flavor and make it a round-up of music and fun, the announcement says.

The Tucson Arizona Boys Chorus was founded in 1939 by Edwardo Caso, its present director. An Englishman and recent arrival at Tucson, Caso met with little encouragement when he undertook the project. When the chorus gave its first concert at Christmas that year in a church, it consisted of only eight boys, with two girls as fill-ins, and the audience was mostly doting kith and kin.

With the backing of impressed individual parents, Caso carried on. The first big concert came in December of 1940 with a skimpily choir in the Tucson Temple of Music and Art and attracted 259 paid admissions. But interest was created.

The local radio station took over the boys under its effective wing, and interest gained momentum, and local support, until by 1950 all Tucson recognized Caso and his singing boys. Incorporated, the chorus is now administered as a non-profit, non-sectarian corporation. Its activities have gained nation-wide fame since.
