A native of the Cumberland Mountains of eastern Kentucky, Mrs. Osborne is the daughter of a Presbyterian missionary who chose the southern mountains as his field of service. She has spent the greater part of her life absorbing the folklore and folk-speech of the mountain people. Mrs. Osborne is executive secretary of Old Oregon Trail, Inc., with offices in the Portland Chamber of Commerce building. She is also a member of Gov. Patterson's Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial Committee for Oregon, and also the Oregon representative of the American Pioneer Trails Association. She gives illustrated lectures and travelogues on both the Oregon Trail and the Lewis and Clark Trail. Her forthcoming book, "Peaceful Conquest—Story of the Lewis and Clark Expedition," is to be the official book used in observance of the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial.

AAUW Has Panel Discussion On Youth

Community influence on youth proved a lively subject in panel discussion at a meeting of the AAUW Wednesday night with Dr. James Millar, moderator.

Julian Holleck spoke on juvenile delinquency, citing statistics on a questionnaire filled in by a group of high school students where two-thirds of them indicated lying, cheating and stealing was a way of life. Causes and remedies were touched upon with the recurring question "Where can we place the blame?"

Lowell Rhoden's subject was business. In seeking employment our young people have no training in applying for a job, the idea of service is not considered; their thought being to earn a few dollars. Mothers were taken to task for accompanying them to seek jobs, or often telephoning. Adults have tremendous influence on youth. Some are careless and fail to teach the young people how to meet people, or apply for jobs which causes frustration and leads to delinquency, said Dr. Millar. The next speaker, Judge Slocum, believes education can do much for delinquency. Eighty per cent of violators return for the second time, he said.

The mother's view point was given by Mrs. Esther Halladay, who said the role of "father" had been neglected. The average home needed more of his attention and time.

Police officers have the responsibility of preventing delinquency said Cal Baird, and are doing constructive work by creating activity for youth through Boy Scout, PAL clubs, etc. A large percentage come from broken homes leaving the child with a feeling of insecurity and loneliness. Many have no early religious training, no guidance, and find their home, for some reason, unattractive.

Discussing the cultural influences of the community on youth, Mrs. Mary Roberts quoted from Emerson who said "Culture is one thing, varnish is another." The word culture means to till or cultivate. To train and cultivate right thinking and desires in our town there are many good influences, the first of which, she named the churches, which afford integrity and social life. Other sources included community centers, sorority, and theatrical groups, Shakespearean plays at Ashland, night schools, home demonstration units, and art and craft work, the public library and motion pictures.

A lively question and answer period followed covering remedies,

causes, etc. Recommendations for greater recreational facilities for youth out of school, parental education, legal cooperation, and marriage counseling service were advanced.

The program was planned by Mrs. Andrew Broadbuss, chairman of the social studies group and her committee. Her assistant, Mrs. Phyllis Davis, announced the panel speakers.

Preceding the meeting a musical number was presented by George Shanklin, who introduced David France, runner-up in the auditions held by the recently organized Symphony Society, accompanied by Evangeline Chapman. David played a trumpet solo, Haydn concerto, 2nd movement.
