### Chiang Vows To Fight For Quemoy And Matsu

ing. The Nationalist military information service said it was the largest artillery exchange at Quemoy since the Tachen withdrawal began, with the Reds pouring over 50 shells from Amoy port and receiving "a heavy retaliation barrage" in return.

LONDON (AP)—Moscow radio broadcast an exchange of greetings between Soviet and Red Chinese leaders Sunday marking the fifth anniversary of the 30-year mutual aid pact between the two countries.

The Soviet telegram called the alliance signed Feb. 15, 1950, a "reliable defense of peace and international security."

The message from the Red Chinese leaders was couched in similar terms, but blasted aggressive circles of the United States and their followers.

LONDON (AP)—The Chinese Communists said Monday Soviet support was encouraging them in their campaign to take Formosa. Peiping Radio broadcast an editorial in the Peiping People's Daily, government newspaper, saying:

The Soviet people are always our most reliable and faithful friends. The righteous support given us by the Soviet government and people in our struggle to liberate Formosa (Formosa) and safeguard Asia gives us great encouragement and confidence in victory.

LONDON (AP)—Indian Prime Minister Nehru came out Monday for Nationalist China's participation in any international conference on the Formosa issue. Britain, holding a similar view, urged a quick cease-fire as the prelude to such a parley.

France lined up with Britain and the United States in criticism of Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov's proposal for a 10-power conference that would exclude Chiang Kai-shek's Chinese Nationalists. A foreign ministry spokesman in Paris said "it is not possible that this proposition could produce any concrete results."

Refused to rule on whether the Essex County, Mass., probate court had validly denied a Boston Jewish couple the right to adopt 3-year-old blonde twins born to a Roman Catholic mother. The probate court turned down the couple, Mr. and Mrs. Rouben Goldman, on the basis of a Massachusetts law requiring that when practicable custody must be given to persons of the same religious faith as that of the child. The probate court said many Catholic couples in the area were seeking to adopt Catholic children.

Rejected a move to Colorado to have returned to a state court the case against Thomas Carson Maxwell, Leadville, Colo., police captain charged with murder in the shooting of Army Cpl. Leon Elmore Jr. On Maxwell's request, the case was transferred to the U.S. district court in Denver.

Reinstated in full a federal Trade Commission order requiring Rhodes Pharmaceutical Co., Inc., of Chicago to cease making claims that its product, "Imdrin" is an adequate, effective, or reliable treatment for, or will cure, any arthritic or rheumatic condition.

The commission appealed to the Supreme Court after the U. S. Circuit Court in Chicago revised the FTC order to ban any claim of "permanent relief."

WINNIPEG, Man. (AP)—U.S. and Canadian planes scanned the frozen wastes of northern Saskatchewan today for two crewmen of a U.S. Stratojet bomber which crashed Saturday after exploding 35,000 feet up. Two others have been rescued.

The two survivors, Lt. Col. Kenneth G. McGraw, Yakima, Wash., and Capt. Lester E. Epton, Prearkness, N.J., both 33, said they were hurled unconscious from the plane and came to while plummeting earthward. McGraw's parachute was opening as he revived and Epton pulled his ripcord at about 15,000 feet.

They were brought to the Canadian air force hospital here, where both were reported in "good condition" despite their ordeal in subzero temperature. Air force officials said Epton, who was marooned in the space more than 30 hours, suffered frostbitten feet and severely bloodshot eyes.

Both will be flown back today to their Air Force base, March Field, Riverside, Calif.

Neither knew what had happened to the other two crew members—Maj. Robert R. Dowdy, 31, San Diego, Calif., and Capt. Thomas L. Putkiu, Fabens, Tex.
