"Ten straight" Oregon State counts on this as wrap-up week for the Northern Division Coast Conference basketball title.

A victory at Corvallis Monday night for the undefeated Beavers (10-0) over tailed Idaho (3-8) would assure at least a tie for the

title, no matter what Oregon (7-3) does the rest of the season if OSC loses the rest.

Coach Slat Gills' powerhouse also has Tuesday night against Idaho and Friday and Saturday nights at Pullman against Washington State (4-9) to add the clincher and gain the right to go against the Southern Division winner for the Coast title the second straight year. Oregon State was idle last weekend.

Saturday night Washington (5-7) in the cellar two weekends ago, smashed Washington State a second straight time at Seattle, 63-49, after leading by only one point at halftime to strike toward second place in the standings. Washington won handily Friday night 76-60.

In the night's other game, Oregon's brilliant Jim Loscuttoff shifted to a forward berth from center and set a new division record of 29 rebounds as the Ducks trounced Idaho at Eugene, 70-44. It evened

up for Idaho's well-earned 65-59 win Friday night.

The Washington-WSC clash was a close one the first half. Washington's Dean Parsons looked as though he was taking on the Cougars alone, scoring the Huskies' first 13 points. He collected three personal fouls, however, and was pulled out and WSC crept up to 23-22 at halftime. Later Parsons went back in to collect 22 for the game.

WSC's Ron Bennink set a new division record, sinking 17 of 20 free throws, and added three baskets to lead both teams in scoring

with 23 points. Seven-foot Gary Nelson had his best night for Washington, with 16 tallies.

Bent on revenge for Friday night's humiliation, Oregon raced to a 18-10 halftime lead over Idaho. Max Anderson, at center for Oregon, matched Loscuttoff's 18 points and the two led both teams in scoring. Jim Sather was high for Idaho with 11.

Washington entertains Oregon at Seattle Friday and Saturday nights in a rematch of their thrilling split series at Eugene two weeks ago. A double win for the Huskies would tie them with the Ducks for second place.
