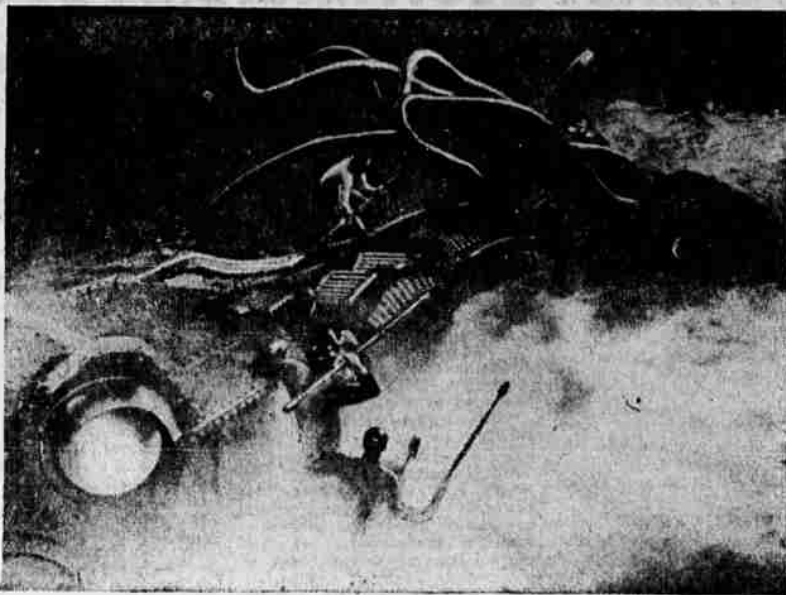




OCEANIC MONSTER

Certain Car Insurance Rates Reduction Told

PORTLAND (AP)—Reductions in rates, ranging from 9 to 32 per cent, for certain classes of automobile liability insurance were put in effect Wednesday by Oregon members of the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters.

For the most part the reductions involve automobiles with women drivers under 25 years of age. However, a 9 per cent reduction is being granted for non-business cars, with no operators under 25, which customarily are driven to or from work less than 10 miles each way and garaged in primarily rural areas.

A 10 per cent reduction is given for automobiles with operators under 25 who have successfully completed high school or college driver training course.

CAB Authorizes Northwest Airlines, Pan American To Fly Routes To Hawaii

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board Wednesday authorized both Northwest Airlines and Pan American World Airways to continue operating between the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii for three years.

The CAB also renewed, for seven years, Northwest's authority to serve Seattle, Portland, Anchorage, Alaska and Japan over the great Circle Route, but deferred for further study Pan American's application for a Great Circle Route to the Orient.

Pan American's operating authority in the Orient was renewed, but applications of Trans World Airlines and Transocean Airlines routes in the Orient were denied. The CAB renewed, on a per-

manent basis, United Airlines' authority to serve Los Angeles as a co-terminal with San Francisco on the California-Honolulu route.

The action was taken in accordance with orders from President Eisenhower, who initially had directed the CAB to cancel Northwest's Seattle-Honolulu service and leave Pan American in exclusive operation. The President reversed himself after studying protests from the Pacific Coast area.

In issuing its final orders as directed by the President, the CAB also released its own findings in the controversial case.

The CAB said it had recommended:
1. Renewal of Northwest's authority to operate the Great Circle Route on a permanent basis, rather than on a temporary basis as directed by the President. The temporary authority, in addition to the seven year permit for the Great Circle Route, included authority for five years to serve Okinawa, Formosa, Hong Kong and the Philippines, and for three years to serve Korea.
2. Denial of Pan America's request for a northern or Great Circle Route to Tokyo. The board said its decision on this point has been in abeyance by the President's action.
3. That Northwest alone be certified over the Pacific Northwest-Hawaii route, on a permanent basis.

School Board Members' Travel Bill Deferred

SALEM (AP)—Travel expenses of school board members came in for sharp criticism Wednesday at a joint Legislative Ways and Means Committee meeting.

A Senate bill to let school boards include travel costs in their budgets was saved from rejection when Sen. John Merrifield, Portland, succeeded in having it sent to the Senate Education Committee.

The committee first voted, 7 to 6, to table it, but then Merrifield saved it.

Several committee members said they oppose the bill because it wouldn't restrict travel within the state.

The committee approved bills to let cars used by parole officers and liquor inspectors be exempt from using the state seal on the sides of the cars.

Eisenhower Signs Bill Favoring GI Benefits

WASHINGTON (AP)—Legislation continuing GI education benefits for those who entered the armed forces before Feb. 1 was signed Tuesday by President Eisenhower.

The new law, enacted with administration encouragement, nullifies part of a presidential proclamation ending Korean War emergency benefits as of Jan. 31.

Those in service before Feb. 1 will be eligible for up to 36 months of schooling, figured at the rate of 1 1/2 days of schooling for each day in service.
