

Dr. Oppenheimer Will Speak At Oregon Colleges

PORTLAND — Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer will lecture at three Oregon colleges as planned, an official of the State Board of Higher Education said this week.

The statement was made after the University of Washington president said the atom scientist could not lecture there.

Oppenheimer's security clearance was withdrawn some time ago by the Atomic Energy Commission, an action hotly debated. Charles D. Byrnes, chancellor of the Oregon state system of higher education, said he considered Oppenheimer "one of the world's most distinguished physicists."

"He will appear in late April and early May, giving two lectures on each campus on the subject 'Composition of Matter.' The outcome of previous investigations will have no bearing on his appearance, because he was chosen prior to the investigations and because there was no evidence of disloyalty or impairment of his scientific standing that came out of the investigations," Byrnes said.

Oppenheimer is scheduled to be at the University of Oregon April 19-20, at Oregon State College April 26-28, and at Portland State College May 3-4.

At Seattle, the Washington State chapter of the American Civil Liberties Committee issued a statement criticizing action of the University of Washington president, Dr. Henry Schmitz.

The statement said refusal to invite Oppenheimer "clearly violates academic freedom and denies the university's traditional duty to provide a forum for free discussion in all fields of learning."

Three Questioned About Gangland Slaying Of Con

NEW YORK — Two men involved in a Baltimore armed robbery case were questioned through the morning hours Wednesday about the gangland-style slaying of an ex-convict.

The murdered man, 40-year-old Joseph Aronowitz, also figured in the robbery case.

He was killed Tuesday by two bullets through his head and left slumped over the wheel of his car in front of a Brooklyn coffin show room.

Questioned by detectives were Martin Yamin, 32, an ousted Baltimore police magistrate, and Joe Sampson, 31.

Yamin was allowed to go home at 4:15 a. m. He commented to newsmen, "I'll be available any time I am wanted." Sampson had earlier left the police station, guarded by two detectives.

After searching for Sampson during much of Tuesday, police finally picked him up when he appeared at his Manhattan home late in the afternoon.

Aronowitz's widow, Jane, had warned that Sampson, too, might be slated for death.

"You'd better protect Joe Sampson," she told police. "They're going to get him next."

With Sampson when he left the police station was a woman identified as his girl friend, Ursula Bergman, 32, of Manhattan.

Aronowitz and Sampson had been scheduled to go on trial in Baltimore Wednesday for an attempted armed robbery last September. They were regarded as potential witnesses against Yamin and John Ditamasso, also of Baltimore, who are accused of helping plot the robbery.

Accepting Earnings Law Applies Only To Men

SALEM — The Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that the law against accepting earnings of a prostitute applies only to men.

On this ground, it reversed the conviction of Leona Goesser, Portland.

The high court, in a decision by Justice Walter L. Toole, said the law is meant to apply only "to the reprehensible conduct of a male panderer."

She was convicted in the court of Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson, Portland.

Maurice Travis Resigns Post With Smelters

DENVER — Maurice E. Travis has resigned as secretary-treasurer of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (IUMS).

Travis was indicted by a federal grand jury last October for swearing falsely in a non-Communist affidavit required of union officials under the Taft-Hartley Act. He is free on bond and no trial date has been set.

The IUMS expelled the union several years ago, showing the mine-mill leadership showed Communist influences.

John Clark, president of the union, which has its headquarters in Denver, accepted Travis' resignation "with deep regret."

Travis' letter of resignation, dated Feb. 14, was made public by the union Wednesday. He said his action "is necessitated by an order of the National Labor Relations Board which denies our union the right to participate in elections and use other facilities of the NLRB."

The union had reported earlier Wednesday that it was informed the NLRB will ask a permanent stay of its Feb. 1 order stripping from the union certain rights under the board.

ROK Chief Maintains Common Enemy Exists

TAIPEI, Formosa — The chief of staff of the ROK army said Wednesday of South Korea and Nationalist China.

"We have one common enemy, Red China; and one common objective, Red China. We (South Korea) must march north, and Free China must go west and recover the mainland."

Gen. Chung Il Kwon, who arrived Monday for a four-day visit, told a news conference he was confident Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists could "attack and recover the mainland."

Asked if he thought a mutual defense pact between the Nationalists and South Korea was desirable, he predicted the two countries would "automatically cooperate in an emergency, without any documents or pacts."

Jet Plane Crash Survivors Tell Experiences In Wilds

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — The wife of a survivor of a U.S. Air Force B47 jet bomber wrecked in the Canadian wilderness says "God has been good to us and we're going to lick this thing together."

Mrs. Orlean Pittman, 29, whose husband, Capt. Thomas L. Pittman, 34, underwent amputation of his lower right leg in Winnipeg after surviving three sub-zero nights in the snow, also told a reporter Wednesday night she would like to go to Winnipeg and will know Thursday whether the Air Force can fly her there.

Capt. Pittman and Lt. Col. Kenneth G. McGrew, 33, and Capt. Lester E. Epton, 33, who also were rescued after the bomber explosion, and Maj. Robert Dowdy, 31, who died in the wreck, were based here at March AFB. They left last Friday, refueled in the air near Seattle, and were on a sweep over Canada when the accident occurred at dawn Saturday.

Col. McGrew and Capt. Epton, in a news conference here Wednesday night, said the B47 was about six miles up and flying around 480 miles an hour with the air temperature 40 degrees below zero when it happened.

"There was no warning of anything wrong," Col. McGrew said, "but suddenly the right inboard engine exploded with a 'wham.' Pieces of the engine apparently ripped into the side of the plane and the resulting pressure change caused the cabin literally to blow apart."

Neither McGrew nor Epton remembers just how he managed to fire his ejection seat, but both did. McGrew and Epton credited their survival kits, strapped to their bodies, with saving their lives. They were able to put wool socks on their hands and feet, make shelters with their parachutes and spread a rubber life raft on the snow to be seen from above.

They had walkie talkie radios and heard the radios of search planes. Col. McGrew said that within two hours he guided a search plane to the location. Two Royal Canadian Air Force men parachuted, one to McGrew and one to Epton, bringing fur-lined clothing with them.

The mother, Mrs. Esthene Longdyke, 24, and Longdyke, 28, also were burned and remained in critical condition at St. Mary's hospital in Grand Rapids.

The father said he heard the boy screaming, but a solid wall of flames barred rescue attempts.

Rescued Flier Has Amputation

WINNIPEG, Man. — A U.S. Air Force officer, rescued after lying injured in the northern Saskatchewan wilderness for three sub-zero nights and days without food, lost the lower part of his right leg Wednesday.

Doctors at Deer Lodge Military Hospital said after the amputation, Capt. Thomas L. Pittman, 34, of Riverside, Calif., is in "surprisingly good condition."

He was one of three survivors of a B47 Stratofortress explosion high in the air Saturday. A fellow crewman was found dead in the bomber's wreckage.

Pittman's right leg was smashed when the bomber exploded and his head was injured. Both legs were frostbitten as he lay in a snow-drift, protected only by his survival suit and a part of the parachute in which he dropped. The amputation was made just below the right knee.

Pittman grinned and told newsmen before the operation "I'm mighty glad to be here."
