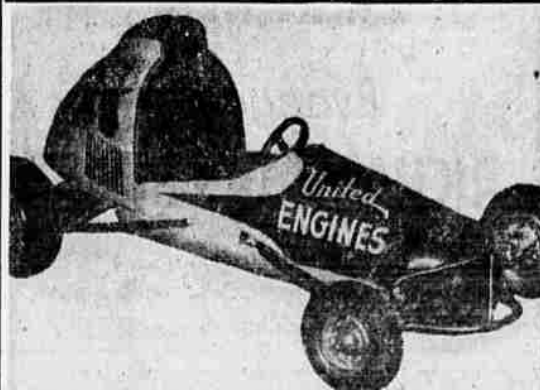

Consumer Demand For New Products, Services Keep Business At Brisk Tempo

NEW YORK (AP) — Consumer demand for new homes, new automobiles, new products and new services kept business moving at a brisk tempo this week — and indicated an even faster pace for the immediate future.

Industrial production spurred ahead. The nation's steel mills operated at close to 90 per cent of capacity; the bellwether paper and paperboard industry reported new gains; output of new automobiles was the highest in history.

Housing starts at last year's 33 per cent ahead of the year-ago rate. Demand for government-insured home mortgages was so high that federal housing officials had to ask Congress for an increase in lending authority.

Pressed by demand for additional telephone facilities, the giant American Telephone & Telegraph Co. announced plans for the biggest corporate borrowing venture in history — the sale of 650 million dollars of convertible debentures. President Cleo F. Craig said, "We still have a backlog of unfilled orders in some places and new demand is very strong."

One spot where demand still lagged behind production was on the farm. Agriculture Secretary Benson told Congress that the government now has 24 billion dollars worth of surplus wheat on its hands — enough to take care of domestic and export requirements for the next two years.

But, he said, things are getting better for the farmer — prices are stabilizing after a difficult period of postwar adjustment, food consumption is on the rise, per capita

farm income is moving up again and exports of some farm products are increasing.

The nation's auto industry turned out its millionth car of 1955 this week, an event which went almost unnoticed in the fever and excitement of the big three's red-hot production war.

Output of U.S. factories — up more than 4 per cent from the previous week's high of 168,059 — totaled 174,954 cars for an all-time record. General Motors reported a new weekly high of 88,000 and Chrysler set a company record with 34,000. Ford built 44,000 cars — highest for any week since World War II.

Retail sales of new cars were also at peak levels (they averaged 18,700 a day), although some dealers said they were still getting cars from the factory faster than they could sell them. Indications were that the millionth new car sale of 1955 would be made around March 5 — or about two weeks earlier than last year.

Steel operations were estimated at 88.2 per cent of capacity, and there were signs that the rate would shoot past 90 per cent in March.

Former Taxicab Driver Testifies In Phenix Killing

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — A former Phenix City taxicab driver now serving a term in "prison" testified Friday that he saw Albert Fuller and Arch Ferrell near the scene about 20 minutes before A. L. Patterson was slain last June 18.

The dramatic accusation came at the beginning of the fourth day of Fuller's trial on a charge of murdering the anti-vice crusader who had promised to put an end to racketeering in Phenix City.

Fuller, 35, was chief deputy sheriff in the vice-ridden community and is one of three defendants charged with the killing.

The testimony from Bill Littleton was the first of the trial which identified either Fuller or Ferrell as having been seen near the scene before the killing. Patterson was shot in a parking lot outside his office building after winning the nomination for attorney general of Alabama.

Littleton is serving 18 months in prison for manslaughter in a homicide charge which grew out of the death of a Ft. Benning, Ga., soldier who was run over by Littleton's cab outside a Phenix City nightclub.

The witness told the jury he was employed by a Columbus, Ga., taxicab company and was driving in Phenix City the night of Patterson's death.

He said he drove by the scene of the slaying and saw Ferrell and Fuller standing there about 20 minutes before the killing.

Fuller has claimed an alibi, that he was in the county jail at the time of the murder. The jail is located about 200 yards from the place where Patterson was shot to death.

Special Solicitor Cecil Deason had promised to "put Fuller at the scene" of the murder even though the first 15 witnesses testifying were unable to link him directly to the killing.

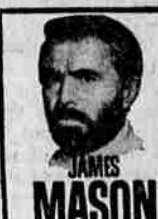
