

Helicopters Give Aid In Scotland During Storm

LONDON (AP)—Helicopters whirled over snowbound Scotland Saturday, picking up emergency medical cases and dropping supplies to isolated communities. Snow and cold also held a tight grip on England, Ireland and much of Europe.

Three deaths were reported. Many were injured in traffic mishaps on icy roads. Two 7-year-old girls drowned at Bentley, England. They fell through ice on a pond they were crossing to carry bread to a horse in a snowfilled field. A miner was killed in a snowslide near Sondrio, Italy.

Royal Navy and Royal Air Force helicopters were busy in Scotland on mercy missions. About a third of Scotland, the sector north of the Caledonian canal, was isolated. Roads and railways were blocked. Business was at a standstill. Many power lines were down. Drifts ranged up to 25 feet.

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Preacher Denies Killing Widow

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Jesse Bolin, preacher and used car man held for questioning a second day, denied again Saturday he had killed his widowed benefactor, Mrs. Lucille Quarles.

As the death probe pace increased, Houston police went to Dallas to talk to Mrs. Ledis Bolin, wife of the Cadillac-driving part-time parson.

The handsome Bolin, 39, submitted voluntarily to a lie detector test. But detectives said results were inconclusive because Bolin was "too nervous, too tired and needed a rest."

The car dealer-evangelist had told of being with Mrs. Tressie Bandy, 36-year-old Houston telephone operator, when Mrs. Quarles 50, was beaten to death Tuesday night.

Police said the attractive Mrs. Bandy told the truth, according to lie detector tests, when she said she and Bolin were together from 5 p. m. Tuesday until 2:30 a. m. Wednesday.

COULD REVOKE WILLS

Communist China Threats Haven't Altered Spending

CHICAGO (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey said Saturday Communist China's threatening gestures have not caused any change in Eisenhower administration defense spending plans for the coming year.

"Nothing that has happened in Formosa or elsewhere in the world up to this very day has changed our budget plans for lower spending in the year to come," Humphrey said in remarks prepared for the 48th annual convention of the National Cannery Assn.

In his budget requests to Congress for the bookkeeping year starting next July 1, President Eisenhower allotted 40 1/2 billion dollars to national security programs—186 millions less than this year's figure and six billions below the amount for last year.

"We can and will spend whatever we need to spend for our security," Humphrey declared. "But this administration is operating in the firm knowledge that real security comes not from merely spending billions of dollars, but from spending them wisely."

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Three-Finger-Joe Shot As Intruder

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—"Three-Finger-Joe" Sylvester, 45, well known to police as a confidence man and race track swindler, was found critically wounded in a doorway Saturday and his former father-in-law was discovered shot to death in the bathtub inside the house.

Investigator Charles O'Connor of the sheriff's office said the shootings appeared to be a "case of mistaken identity and suicide."

The dead man, Roy Brougher, 42, was the father of Ruth Brougher, former wife of "Three-Finger-Joe" and herself convicted on manslaughter for shooting a boy friend to death.

Sylvester was operated on at Mount Sinai Hospital for removal of two bullets. His condition is critical.

A taxicab driver, Albert Rogel, passing through the well-to-do neighborhood, heard the man shouting from the doorway: "Help me, I've been shot."

Sylvester told Det. William Murray that he arrived home early Saturday, and was about to admit

himself when the door opened and Brougher stood before him, pistol in hand. There were two quick shots.

Sylvester said he staggered back and cried out, "It's me, Pop."

Murray said Brougher apparently thought he was firing on an intruder, and in his remorse after learning he had shot Sylvester, reloaded the pistol, stood in the bathtub and killed himself.

Severe Earthquake Hits Pakistan; 12 Are Dead

QUETTA, Pakistan (AP)—Severe earth shocks rocked the Quetta area Saturday morning. First reports put the death toll at 12.

The tremors were felt all over the plateau of Baluchistan and the towns of Sheikhmandra, Baleli, Kuchlagh, Sibbi and Macn were badly shaken. Many houses were reported to have collapsed and power was cut off.

Many people rushed from their homes after the first shocks at 3 a. m. local time, and spent the rest of the night in the streets.

The outer wall of the newly built palace of the ruler of Kalat state, at Sheikhmandra, collapsed, and cracks appeared in the walls of other principal buildings.

NOMINATED

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower has nominated Charles Davis, a Chicago investment firm executive, to be an assistant secretary of the Army.

Davis, a Republican, would succeed Charles C. Finucane who recently was promoted to be under-secretary of the Army. The nomination is subject to Senate confirmation.
