

DR. JAMES MILLAR TO GIVE THIRD OF BOOK REVIEWS MONDAY

The third book review in the current series in which the Women's Society of the First Presbyterian Church is presenting Dr. James Millar has been announced for Monday, Feb. 28.

A coffee hour, which has proven very popular, will begin at 10 a.m. and will be followed by the review from 10:30 to 11:30.

Dr. Millar is reviewing books whose authors he has met in the course of his travels. By popular request this review will be on the life of Kagawa, the well known Japanese who was disinherited by his family when he refused to study at the Imperial University to prepare himself for a career as a diplomat. He chose rather to become a social worker and labor leader, finally attaining the position of adviser of the government on labor questions.

Kagawa's obsession was to discover the means of doing away with poverty.

Kagawa's influence has been felt in the fields of economics, politics, religion and writing. In the literary world he is known for his stories for children, philosophical essays, religious studies, poetry, and novels. A number of his novels have proven so popular that they have been translated into English.

All who heard Dr. Millar's review of the lives of Dr. Albert Schweitzer and of Sir Flinders Petrie have been looking forward to this last review of the 1954-55 series.

The Women's Society is using the proceeds from this benefit project for purposes of education and educational equipment.

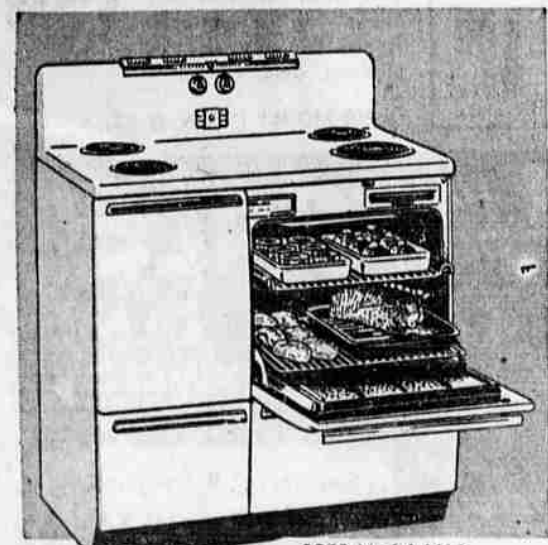
