Dixon-Yates Charges Trumped, Claims Halleck
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Rep. Charles A. Halleck (R-Ind.), House assistant GOP leader, said Tuesday the controversy over the Dixon-Yates contracts was "trumped-up" by "public power advocates, especially in the Tennessee Valley area, who are afraid the gravity train is running out."

Halleck, in a speech prepared for delivery at a luncheon of the Pennsylvania Manufacturers Assn., said "the contract itself confirms this administration's respect for the principle that government should encourage private enterprise wherever possible and practicable."

The Dixon-Yates controversy grew out of the administration's proposal to have private industry build a steam generating plant near Memphis, Tenn., to supply the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) with 600,000 kilowatts of electricity for use in the Memphis area. This power would release a like amount of TVA power for the atomic energy plants at Paducah, Ky. Tennessee Valley congressmen, mostly Democrats, have attacked proposed private industrial contracts as the first step toward dismantling the authority.

Halleck said "the basic issue at stake is whether this government is going to enter into a fair and equitable contract with private enterprise or soak the taxpayers of this nation one hundred million dollars to build another steam generating plant to subsidize the low-cost power."

Rioting Marks Mardi Gras Fun

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Reveling thousands and a tripled police cordoned off Mardi Gras in a downtown Tuesday, watching expectantly for the big parades and unearthing further rioting.

Mardi Gras, a special kingdom of frivolity and masquerading, is ruled by three madcap kings in Rex, Lord of Misrule and King of Carnival; Comus, God of gaiety and oldest of the Mardi Gras monarchs; and Zulu, happy-go-lucky king of the Negroes.

Each parades through fun-bent throngs on the day when things can get out of hand if the thousands aren't kept under control. Merry-makers and police became embroiled early Monday in what was described as one of the worst riots in Mardi Gras history.

Police had to use tear gas bombs and night sticks to subdue the rioting crowd. Police said 14 were injured, including seven policemen and 20 arrested.

To prevent further disturbances in the French quarter, the famed night club district, Police Supt. Joseph Scheuerer tripled the usual Mardi Gras detail, ordering every uniformed man on duty and pulling in most plainclothesmen from outlying districts.

Czechoslovak Ice Star Flees To U. S. Zone

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Czechoslovakia ice star Miroslava Nahnodská has fled to the U. S. Zone of Austria, the American embassy said Tuesday night. She will hold a news conference Wednesday. The 29-year-old ballerina on ice disappeared from her British sector hotel on Saturday just before she was due to return to her Communist homeland. She had taken part in the 1955 world ice skating championships. She finished 18th among 22 competitors for the women's individual title.

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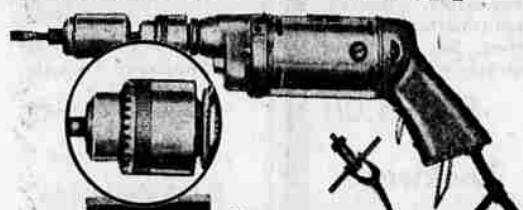
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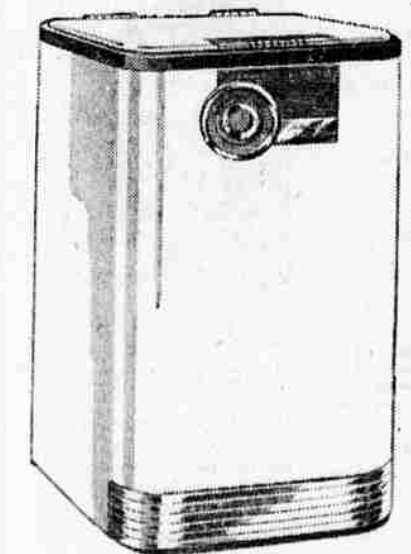
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
