PARIS (AP) — Air France resumed regular scheduled operations early Tuesday after a partial 48-hour strike curtailed some of the government-owned line's operations.

Japanese Storm Takes Heavy Toll

TOKYO (AP) — A four-day storm which raged through the Western Pacific and left at least 13 dead and 242 missing is smashing northward Tuesday toward Russia's Kamchatka Peninsula.

There were indications the death toll would mount.

The newspaper Asahi, in an unconfirmed report, said there were 28 dead and 81 missing on Japan's northern island of Hokkaido. Asahi also said 35 ships were missing or sunk.

Only 18 deaths had previously been reported from the storm, which swept a 600-mile front from Formosa to the Kuriles.

Encouraging reports were received from some ships earlier reported lost.

Two vessels feared sunk in mountainous seas in the Ryukyu Islands chain limped into Okinawa ports. They carried a total of 317 persons.

Kyodo News Service said two large Japanese fishing boats, reported to have capsized in the East China Sea, showed up or were on their way to port.

The two vessels which sailed into Okinawa ports were the Nanshu Maru with 169 passengers and the Midori Maru with 148 aboard.

Accused Liquor Commission Men Identify Selves

PORTLAND (AP) — Karl F. Glos, a hearing examiner, and Commission Chairman Lester Ireland have identified themselves as the persons Gov. Patterson referred to when he told of irregularities reported in State Liquor Commission affairs.

Glos was accused in a report by attorneys Howard Bobbitt and Robert F. Maguire, both of Portland, of taking money to further a license application. Glos said he had resigned Thursday night but wishes now that he hadn't.

"I was deeply hurt when this was thrown at me and I just resigned before I had time to think about it."

"I hope to bring the case before the State Civil Service Commission and get it cleared up," he said.

Glos said he had nothing to do with decisions of the commission in license applications and that he had been unable to learn any details of the accusations against him.

Ireland also defended himself against implications that he had misrepresented mileage charges in expense reports to last June. The report said he turned in expenses for mileage traveled to and from Hillsboro when he actually had been living in Portland.

Ireland explained that instead of turning in expense accounts for lodgings on the nights he had spent in Portland, he charged 40 miles at 7 cents a mile for those days and applied the money on rental of his \$125-a-month apartment in Portland.

He said he had stopped the practice after investigators called it to his attention last June and that he had returned \$986 to the state. He is making out new expense accounts for the months involved, he said.

The corrected expense accounts may in some cases be higher than the original ones, he said.

Democrat Claims Education Bill Complete Wreck

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Hill (D-Ala.) said here that overwhelming opposition of professional educators has left President Eisenhower's school-aid bill "a wreck of fustian and jargon."

Hill cited testimony before the Senate Labor Committee during the last three days from persons he termed "experienced educators," all of whom have denounced major portions of the Eisenhower program. Hill is chairman of the committee.

The testimony, Hill indicated, would have the effect of boosting support for either his own school aid bill, a measure backed by several other senators, or similar pending bills. Hill's would provide outright grants to states in an effort to ease a shortage of more than 300,000 classrooms.

The measure would provide 500 million dollars of federal money during each of the next two years with states putting up money of their own based on a formula taking into account both the number of school-age children and the per capita income of each state.
