A QUIZ. Answer 9 of these correctly and you're an outdoor expert; 8 is might good. After answering the questions, help yourself to the answers which follow.

Remember Ogden Nash's poem: "Oh weep for Mr. and Mrs. Bryan! He was eaten by a lion; Following which, the lion's lioness, up and swallowed Bryan's Bryan-ess!" Now, what would you call the male, female and young of the American deer, the red deer (European elk)?

2.—Which prehistoric mammal has been uncovered in the frozen northland, preserved even to the food in its stomach?

3.—True or False: (A) Some butterflies may live through the winter enveloped for months in snow and ice. (B) House flies become sluggish at about 50 degrees Fahrenheit. (C) One insect takes 17 years to develop from egg to adult, underground. (D) Some insects, including stone flies, cockroaches, sheep ticks, can carry on their life cycles during freezing weather.

4.—ABOUT ANTLERS: (A) Are there some animals in which both male and female grow antlers? (B) Are all antlers shed annually?

5.—About horns: (A) What is the difference between a horn and antler? (B) Are horns ever shed?

6.—Roughly, about how many different species of mammals are there. How many birds?

7.—Some animals are long jumpers. Some definite records have been established. Pair up these animals with the longest recorded jumps: weasel, man, cougar, horse, kangaroo rat—3 feet, 12, 26.7, 27, 38.

8.—Some animals are long jumpers. Pair up these animals with their highest recorded jumps: pronghorn antelope, American elk, Klipspringer, man, lion—5, 6 feet 11½ inches, 8, 9 and 25 feet.

9.—Pair up recorded animal speeds with the right animals: camel, jackrabbit, moose, sheep.

Answers: 1. The male of the American deer is a buck, the female is a doe; the young a fawn, or a stag if it is a female, and a doe if it is a male. The male of European red deer (European elk) is a hart or stag; the female a hind, the young a calf if it is a male and fawn if a female.

2. The mastodon, which was perhaps last seen by man about 15,000 years ago, has been found in the Siberian permafrost and more recently in Alaska with hide, meat and bones preserved.

3. All are true. The 17-year-old cycle is that of the locust.

4. The deer family, including elk, moose, caribou, and deer, grow antlers which are solid and which they shed annually. In rare instances, a female may grow antlers or males be without them. However, with the caribou (including the reindeer) both male and female grow them—the male's usually being slightly larger and heavier.

5. Horns are permanent growths and usually hollow. They are retained throughout life with the rare exception of the American pronghorn antelope which sheds its short horn each season, retaining the small base.

6. THERE ARE between 4 to 5 thousand species of warm-blooded backboned mammals. There are something like 15,000 species of birds.

7. The weasel broad jumps 3 feet; the kangaroo rat, 12; man, 26.7; horse, 27; cougar, 38.

8. In the high jump, the pronghorn antelope, American elk, Klipspringer, man, lion—5, 6 feet 11½ inches, 8, 9 and 25 feet.

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho Vandals, counted out of the Northern Division basketball race almost at the start, still can make things miserable for the rest of the league.

The Vandals have won only four of 14 games this season but each win has put a crimp in the opponents' plans for self-betterment.

The Vandals picked up their fourth victory Tuesday night—a 77-59 decision over Washington State. They have two more games on their schedule, playing Washington here next weekend, and a double win would lift them into a third-place tie with the Huskies.

Tuesday night, Idaho went out in front at the start and at one point in the second period held a 30-point edge over the Cougars.

WSC, surprise winner over Northern champion Oregon State Saturday night, couldn't crack the Idaho defense and wound up with a 28 per cent shooting average. The Vandals made 34 per cent of their shots.

Jay Buhler was high scorer with 26 points. Ron Bennink led Washington State with 14.

The game ended the season for Washington State and gave the Cougars a 5-11 conference record.

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Little Mo Announces Plans To Foresake Tennis, Wed

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Maureen Connolly suddenly gave up plans for a tennis comeback last night and said she would get married in June.

The blonde, brown-eyed miss, who at 20 has captured most of the world's tennis crowns and still holds some of them, said the man is Norman Brinker, 23. They had been engaged since November 1953, but marriage plans had been indefinitely postponed.

The announcement surprised even close friends who had watched the determined girls' preparations for a return to her meteoric tennis career, which was interrupted by a horse riding injury to her right leg last July.

"I just don't enjoy tennis any more," said Miss Connolly. "I've lost that old spark, the drive one must sustain to go through a long season's campaign like I have for several years."

"If I don't have that keen interest for tennis, a tour would be no good."

She said that after she was settled in domestic life she might try to regain her national championship, and possibly make a short tour of Europe.

"But as for tennis in my future, I look forward towards the teaching end," she said.

Until last night's announcement, Miss Connolly's dominating ambition had appeared to be the regaining of the U.S. women's crown. When she won her first U.S. women's singles title in 1951, she was the youngest player ever to hold the crown. The next year she captured the All-England Championships at Wimbledon in her first attempt. She retained the Wimbledon title the next two years.

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Activity Growing Feverish In State Prep Hoop Circles

Cleveland of Portland clinched at least a tie for one of the two top spots in the Portland League race. The district 9 playoff starts at Hillsboro. Another team passed the century mark in defeating hapless Hill Military. And Eugene scored 100 points in defeating a district 6 opponent.

These were the highlights of high school basketball action in Oregon Tuesday night.

Hill Military, a Portland academy, was beaten 115-43 by Colton. It was Hill's second poorest showing of the season. Earlier the squad lost 154-16 to Gaston, 113-9 to MacLaren's Boys School, and 105-29 in an earlier game with Colton. Spectacular as are these, the record loss still is Gervais High School's 101-0 defeat at the hands of Jefferson in 1934.

Mel Martin was high scorer for Colton Tuesday night with 35 points—a record high for a player from a class B school this season. He rolled up the total on 28 field goals and 3 free throws.

Mike Moran of Eugene also established an individual scoring record for the season when his team beat Willamette of Eugene 100-33 in a district 6 contest.

Moran's 59 points—on 18 field goals and 23 free throws—was an all-time district 6 record and a season record for a class A player.

Only two players have bettered his mark—Jerry Crimmins of Milton-Freewater, 73 points, and Wade (Swede) Halbrook of Portland's Lincoln, 71 points, both in 1952.

Eugene, which placed third in this week's Associated Press prep poll, is the third class A school to hit or pass the 100 mark. The record of 118 is held by Milton-Freewater. Brookings had 107 last year also.

Cleveland, the No. 6 team in the poll, moved a step closer to a berth in the state playoffs at Eugene March 15-19 by defeating

Jefferson, the No. 9 team, 68-59. The two top squads in the Portland League win tournament berths.

Franklin, Lincoln, and Grant are tied for third place in the league behind Jefferson. Franklin beat Benson 78-54, Lincoln defeated Roosevelt 65-48, and Grant edged Washington 58-53.

Beaverton, Hillsboro and Forest Grove posted first round victories in the district 9 double-elimination tournament which got underway at Hillsboro.

Beaverton, No. 10 in the poll, topped Tigard 73-39, Forest Grove beat Yamhill 63-45, and Hillsboro defeated Banks 82-50.

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
