SALEM (AP) — The Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee has decided to confine the legislative subcommittee bill to Multnomah County.

As originally introduced, it would have divided Multnomah, Marion and Lane counties into subdistricts for election of state legislators. The committee removed Marion and Lane counties from it at the request of Multnomah County legislators, who feared that having the other two counties might make it impossible to pass the bill. Separate bills to subdivide Marion and Lane counties probably will be introduced.
