Senate Okays Bill Giving Women Same Pay As Men When Doing Men's Work

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Senate approved unanimously Wednesday a bill providing that women must get men's pay for doing the same work as men. The bill goes to the House.

It provides that when a woman gets lower pay just because of her sex, she can sue to collect the difference between her pay and what men are being paid.

Sen. George Ulett, Coquille, chairman of the Senate Labor and Industries Committee, said that 13 states have similar laws. He predicted that Oregon employers wouldn't have much trouble under the bill.

Women in the canning industry, retail stores and banks would be the chief ones affected.

Sen. S. Eugene Allen, Portland, author of the bill, said the bill would help men, too. He said men wouldn't have to worry about loss of their jobs to lower paid women.

The bill, endorsed by the U. S. Department of Labor, is patterned after a similar Washington state law.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a bill to crack down on narcotics peddlers. They would get 10 years in prison for the first offense, and life imprisonment for the second offense.

Other bills passed by the House and sent to the Senate would wind up affairs of the Milk Control Board, which the people abolished last November; and provide secrecy for records of inmates of state institutions. These records could be inspected only by permission of a court or the Board of Control.

The Senate refused 17 to 13 to accept a recommendation by its State and Federal Affairs Committee that the United Fund bill be defeated.

So this bill, which would allow payroll deductions from state employees' checks for the United Fund, will be considered by the Senate Thursday.

The Senate Judiciary Committee recommended passage of a bill to provide 20-year prison sentences for convicts who take hostages. It also provides that when a hostage

Report Of Subs Sighted Off Shore Unconfirmed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy said Wednesday it had found nothing to support a report that two unidentified submarines were sighted in North Carolina coastal waters Tuesday.

An investigation is continuing, the Navy said, but "so far, all results have been negative."

A Navy spokesman said it was "unthinkable" that any command would take a submarine into the area off Nags Head where the two submarines were reported seen. The depth of the water is only 50 feet and the ocean surface is rough, the spokesman said, making it a hazardous area in which to try to operate an undersea craft.

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Racing Commission Wednesday announced appointment of Herman S. Chapman as executive secretary. He has been assistant for nine years and succeeds John Abbott who resigned last week.

Lebanon Mayor Heads For Republic Of Lebanon

PORTLAND (AP) — The mayor of Lebanon, Ore., headed out of Portland Wednesday for the republic of Lebanon, a good-will ambassador to the Lebanese.

The mayor, Ralph Scroggin, and Mrs. Scroggin, took with them Gov. Patterson and samples of Oregon myrtle, the last a wood from a tree similar in appearance to one which grows in the Holy Land.

Three other United States cities named Lebanon will be represented in the republic of Lebanon's March 1-15 tourist celebration. Scroggin identified them as Ohio, Tennessee and Nebraska. There are more than a score of towns in this country named Lebanon and each was invited to send a representative.
