## Sheriff Asks Information On Car Of Butcherer

The sheriff's office is seeking someone who might be able to identify a car belonging to the person who killed a \$90 Hereford steer and butchered it early Thursday morning.

The steer belonged to Larry Storde, 751 Fieser St. A deputy sheriff said it apparently had been knocked in the head by an axe in its pasture. The hind quarters and both shoulders were removed from the carcass.

The act apparently took place just before dawn, for the carcass still was warm when Storde discovered it at 8 a. m. Location of the pasture is on the north side of the North Umpqua Highway about a mile east of the Roseburg city limits.

## North Roseburg Church's New Educational Unit Will Be Dedicated This Sunday

In a service open to the public, the new educational unit at the North Roseburg Church, Evangelical United Brethren, will be dedicated this Sunday, at 3 p. m. Ira D. Warner, D.D., L.L.D., Bishop of the Pacific Area of the Evangelical United Brethren Church, will bring the dedicatory address.

Participating also in the dedication service will be the Rev. E. A. Fogg, senior superintendent of the Oregon - Washington Conference of the Evangelical United Brethren Church; former pastor, the Rev. E. Clark Robb, of Spokane, Wash.; and the Rev. Leo M. Thorn, pastor of the sponsoring church at Eugene.

Construction of the new structure was begun Sept. 2. The building was occupied for the first time

four months later on Jan. 2, 1955. The new unit, later to be expanded with the addition of a new sanctuary, provides kitchen and dining facilities, a church parlor, a combination church and Sunday School office, a pastor's study, a new heating plant, a mother's room, rest room facilities, storage facilities, beginners' and primary assembly rooms, 13 class rooms, and facilities for a christian kindergarten to be opened in September.

The exterior is finished with vertical pine board 'n' bat siding and Roman brick trim. The interior is predominantly plastered walls. A good deal of the interior finishing has been done by volunteer labor provided by the people of the church. L. W. Metzger of Roseburg was the designer and builder.

Anticipated activities for the day include "King's Kids' Parents' Sunday," a special program for parents of the high school class young people during the 9:45 a. m. Sunday school hour; special music by the Rev. and Mrs. E. Clark Robb, former pastor and wife, and a message by Bishop Warner at 11 a. m.; the public dedication service at 3 p. m.; Open House from 4:30 to 6:30 p. m.; and a special missionary rally from 6:30 to 7:30, featuring colored slides and recordings of mission work in Africa, taken by Bishop Warner who has just returned from an inspection trip there.

The pastor, the Rev. Kenneth D. Dooley, announces that offerings for the day in all services, will go into the building fund. The next step in the expansion program at the North Roseburg Church is to be the construction of a new sanctuary to be joined to the new educational unit at right angles. The public is invited to attend any or all services of the day.

are to include technical assistance. It condemned not only warlike action but "those subtle forms of aggression by which freedom and self-government are undermined and men's minds subverted." The eight treaty nations were pledged "to prevent or counter by appropriate means any attempt in the treaty area to subvert freedom or destroy territorial integrity."

The newly-created council of representatives, will meet at least once a year. It arranged for continuing consultation and mutual assistance, particularly to meet the possibilities of subversion which it viewed with great concern.

## Iraq Joins Western Defense, Signs Pact

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP)—Iraq took up a post in the Western defense lineup today after signing a mutual defense pact with Turkey. She was the first Arab state to forsake a neutral role in the East-West cold war.

In Cairo, a high government spokesman p. m. p. t. l. y. declared Egypt would call a meeting of all Arab League nations except Iraq and demand the expulsion of the Baghdad government and revision of the league agreement.

If the demand is not needed, he added, Egypt will either withdraw from the eight-nation group or renounce any commitment to defend Iraq. The Arab League is a collective security alliance. Egypt, generally acknowledged as its leader, has insisted the Arabs should stick to their neutralist position and depend on themselves for defense.

## 4-H LEADER PASSES

CORVALLIS (AP) — Harry C. Seymour, 76, Oregon 4-H club leader for 31 years, died in a Corvallis hospital early Friday. He had been ill for several weeks. Seymour devoted most of his life to youth work. He was state 4-H leader 1916 until his retirement in 1947, and in that time the program grew from a few hundred to more than 20,000 boys and girls.

Announcement that Miss Haren had won the honor with her 50-minute written examination in a contest sponsored by General Mills, Inc., Minneapolis, Minn., was received Thursday by Mrs. Georgene Clark. Mrs. Clark is a homemaker instructor at the high school.

The 17-year-old senior competed with students in the school's homemaker classes and other senior women interested in the contest. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. U. O. Haren, 80 Castle St. For her skill in answering a 50-minute written examination - she will receive a golden pin award and cook books for herself and the school. Miss Haren will also be entered in competition to name Oregon's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The national winner will be announced April 21.

Each state winner will receive a \$1,500 scholarship. The top national winner's scholarship will be increased to \$5,000, according to General Mills.

Mrs. Clark said the program sponsors held the contest to assist students in building in young women a deeper appreciation and understanding of the American home and the personal qualities necessary to successful homemaking.

Every girl taking the test was given a 24 - page homemaker guide.

## Drop In Crime Noted In Report Of Olson

had tailed off amazingly to 225 in 1954, less than half the total for 1952.

Similar decreases were noted among disorderly conduct and vagrancy cases. While there were 78 charges of drunken driving made in 1952, that number had been cut to 53 two years later. Other miscellaneous crimes took a rise of 12½ per cent in 1954 over 1953, but the clearance percentage also went up from 41 per cent in 1953 to 52 per cent in 1954.

In class 1 crimes, the clearance average in Roseburg is far better than the national average, Olson said.

There was no attempt made to compare the average of Roseburg with those of other cities in clearances of class 2 offenses. Olson explained that too many factors affect the volume of the lesser crimes in any given community.

The factors, he said, include climate, cultural facilities, strength and policies of the police and courts and the attitude of the public toward law enforcement.

He did give credit, though, to Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum for the decrease of drunkenness cases. Where an ordinary drunk formerly had been fined \$10 here, he now is assessed \$35.

Olson's report on crime in the city followed recent enforcement statistics on traffic, which showed that the accident rate has been reduced 30 per cent since 1951 and the traffic injury rate 15 per cent in the same period.

"We firmly believe that these large decreases in crime rates, the high record of crime clearance and the reduction of traffic accidents is the result of strict, impartial and efficient law enforcement," the chief declared.

The police of the local department, he said, will continue to be to enforce the law for the best interests of all the city's citizens.

Olson said the Roseburg Police Dept. is on good relations with other law enforcement agencies, which lessens the all-around task.

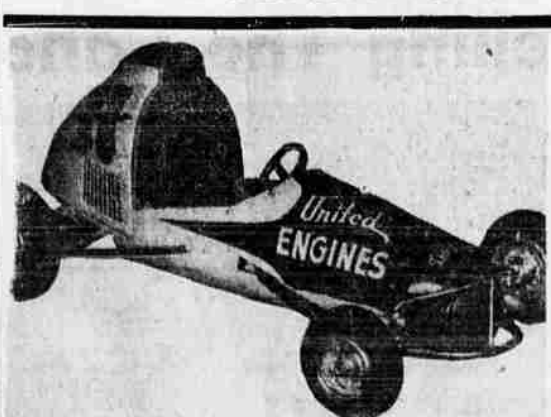
