

PCC Hoop Wrap-Up Due

The Pacific Coast Conference's Northern Division wraps up the 1955 basketball schedule this week with a set of games that are strictly for the league record books.

Oregon State clinched its second straight championship and a PCC playoff berth two weeks ago and only prestige will be at stake in games Friday and Saturday nights with Oregon.

The Beavers were rated No. 16 in The Associated Press poll after winning 13 straight in the conference. They lost to Washington winning 13 straight in the conference. They lost to Washington State last week and dropped out of the top 20.

Idaho (4-10) stands to benefit the most from the weekend schedule. The Vandals will be host to Washington (6-8) and a sweep of the two games would boost them over Washington State, which ended its season with a loss to Idaho last Tuesday, into a third-place tie with the Huskies.

On the other hand a double win by Washington and a sweep by Oregon State would tie the Huskies and the Webfoots in second place. Oregon has won eight and lost six. Oregon State plays Oregon at Eugene Friday night then returns to Corvallis for the finale. After that, while the rest of the league stows away its gear, the Beavers will prepare for the PCC playoffs with UCLA, the Southern Division

champion, next weekend. The playoff winner earns a spot in the NCAA Western regional.

In the Southern Division this weekend, second place Stanford entertains California's Bears at Palo Alto Friday night while UCLA takes on USC at Long Beach.

California and Stanford met at Berkeley Saturday night. Bob McKeen of the Bears and Stanford's Ron Tomasic will be shooting at the Southern Division's single season scoring record of 238 set by Bill Sharman of USC. McKeen has 219, Tomasic 208.

The games this weekend will be the last under the PCC's 32-year-old Northern and Southern Divisions. Next season the nine teams will play a round-robin schedule.

Marciano-Cockell Bout Set May 19

NEW YORK (AP)—Everything is set for Rocky Marciano to defend his world heavyweight title against Don Cockell, a pudgy Englishman, May 19 at San Francisco's Kezar Stadium. Only the formal signing remains.

All the financial details were ironed out Thursday at a conference in the office of Jim Norris, President of the International Boxing Club. Marciano will get 40 per cent, Cockell 20 per cent of gate receipts and any extra TV or movie money.

Marciano was due down from camp at Grossinger, N.Y., to sign the papers before the British heavyweight and his party return to England. They are booked to sail Saturday.

In case Cockell should upset the champ, there is a rematch clause in the agreement calling for another match within 90 days with each fighter getting 30 per cent.

Although Norris held out a shade of doubt about San Francisco as the positive site, promoter Jimmy Murray, who will join with the IBC in staging the scrap, has been naming dates for weeks. It is likely the fight will be seen only on the later television although those details still must be arranged.

Coast League Fans Will Be Informed Of Rhubarbs
SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Fans are going to be kept informed on Pacific Coast League rhubarbs this year, says Claire Goodwin, the new PCL president.

"The minute there is a beef, say at third base, an announcer is going to tell the people what it is all about," he told reporters Thursday.

And that's only the beginning. Goodwin said he and Oscar Vitt, the former Cleveland Indian manager hired as a personnel relations man, will visit each of the PCL training camps preaching hustle to everyone from the bat boy to the club president.

He said his program, aimed at luring more paying customers will include earlier starting times and drastic curtailment of stalling by players, managers and umpires.

"If we improve our product," Goodwin said, "the fans will come out and watch us."
