

Glide Board Will View Plans For New Construction

The Glide School Board will meet next week to approve the plans for construction of two extra rooms, a cafeteria and kitchen by architect Lyle Glenn of Roseburg.

According to Supt. Byron Evans, the larger room, 27 ft. by 37 ft. will be used as a hand room, the second room, 19 ft. by 26 ft. will be a music practice room. The cafeteria, for high school students and teachers and the 7th and 8th graders, will be 37 ft. by 70 ft. kitchen, 19 ft. by 35 ft. Type of construction, cement blocks with brick veneer.

These new rooms will be added to the high school building completed last fall, which was four rooms, and offices of the superintendent and school board. The 8th grade students occupied two rooms, and the other two rooms for music and drawing-crafts classes. When the new addition is completed, the 7th grade students will occupy the latter rooms in the coming school year.

The new construction cost has been figured in the 1955-56 budget report of the Glide School District 12 budget committee, but construction was authorized by the voters of the district in the serial levy election held in April 1954.

Bids for construction will be opened late in March to allow ample time for completion of the building.

Supt. Evans advises that by fall of 1956, a separate building for upper grade students will have to be added on account of the increase of population in the district and enrollment.

Sutherland Sawmill Has Resumed Operation

Following resumption of mill operations a week ago, the Viking Lumber Co., planer at Sutherland was operating again this week.

At present, 25 men are working at the mill, with the number expected to reach 50 about March 1. The operation had been shut down for the winter.

Elmer Holmberg, company president, is quoted in the Sutherland Sun that prospects for 1955 are "exceptionally good," with plenty of housing projects to start as weather clears. The company has contracted to supply studs and other material for one housing project in Chicago that calls for 1,500 new homes.

Strains, sprains and dislocations are quite common complaints and may involve many of the muscles, ligaments and joints of the body. Sprains may occur from the same causes as strains, but involve the deeper structures such as the tendons, as well as the muscles. The pain is more severe, and swelling usually occurs promptly, although it may not occur for several hours or even before the following day. Recovery of use of the injured joint or muscles may require several days. Usually an area of discoloration or "black and blue" remains for some days or weeks. This discoloration, which is under the skin, is due to the accumulation of blood which has oozed from the tiny blood vessel at the point of injury and will eventually disappear.

Dislocations occur when one bone of a joint slips out of adjustment with its neighboring bone. This usually is caused by an exaggerated wrench or twist of a joint. The joints of the shoulder, wrist, hip and fingers are the joints most frequently dislocated. Dislocations are quite common in young children and the aged because their joint ligaments are not sufficiently strong to withstand extra strain.

most of the next 27 years he was to be a U. S. telegrapher.

Gen. Grant won Learn's first vote before he was 21. "I voted before I had a right to in the territory," Learn said Thursday, "but no one challenged it!" Originally, he had come from a family of Democrats, but "got thrown in with some Republicans in Percy."

Since then he has balloted a GOP ticket nationally. Municipal issues are a different matter. Learn has split his ticket often on local candidates.

His working experiences include time spent as a range rider in Wyoming, a banker in Utah and Washington, a miner-pro prospector in eastern Oregon, a real estate man in Washington and Oregon, a fuel executive in Colorado and as a farmer in Lookingglass.

Today Learn is up and about part of every day he is able. He didn't get to vote in the 1952 general election, but he hopes to go to the polls in 1956. At near-99, he is very active and doesn't allow a hearing defect to handicap him.

He used to be quite a "fiddler." For a long time in the Wyoming territory, he and his fiddle and a lady and her piano provided the only music for residents. Today he declines to classify the fiddling as a hobby, says he has none except for "attending to my own business." A guiding Learn philosophy has been to "try to follow the golden rule."

Learn attaches no particular importance for his longevity to non-drinking or non-smoking, although "I never smoked or drank strong liquor or wine. Can't stand the taste of wine!"

Learn missed out fighting in any of America's wars, "was always too young or too old."

The Calamity Jane story was enlarged upon as he told of the old West this week at his home. It seems Calamity had much more to do with the Rollins territory while Learn was there. The son-to-be-friend of Wild Bill Hickok's was termed "a good looker" by Learn. Contrary to rules, the young and attractive woman with long brown hair had been allowed to join the cavalry which then protected the railroad development in the territory. It wasn't too long after that Calamity was kicked out of the group for reasons of improper personal behavior with the cavalrymen, Learn recalls.

Learn and his wife came to the Lookingglass area in 1928. For a time he tried his hand at farming before moving into Roseburg. He worked for the Postal Telegraph before retiring in 1936.

Youth Rescued After 12-Story Fall Down Pipe

NEW YORK (AP) — Screaming in pain, a 20-year-old youth was rescued Friday from a narrow shaft down which he had plunged almost 12 stories 12 hours earlier.

"Get me out of here," he cried pitifully as police emergency squadmen battered frantically at walls of the shaft between the first and second floors.

"I think my arms and legs are broken, they're all numb, wailed the wedged youth just as the emergency workers finally broke through to free him some three hours after they began their efforts.

The youth, who identified himself as James Anderson, wedged behind pipes in the tiny shaft—18 inches by five feet—following his plunge about 9 o'clock Thursday night.

He said a companion bent on burglarizing the office and storage building at 121-123 East 24th street had forced him at gunpoint to jump through a skylight atop the building, which they had reached by way of fire escapes.

But instead of landing on a floor underneath the skylight, he said, he hurtled downward in black space. Near the bottom he stuck between some pipes and the air shaft wall.

For hours no one heard his cries for help.

Finally at dawn Friday a building worker, Michael Reedy, unlocked a door on the ground level and heard Anderson's muffled pleas for aid.

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — The atomic submarine Nautilus was at sea for the second successive day Saturday on a new series of tests.

Friday, the 3,000-ton undersea craft spent 10 hours in a daylight test of her torpedo armament while cruising Long Island and Block Island Sounds.

Saturday's tests, a submarine base source stated, would be concerned with her anchor and steering gear.

Friday's cruise marked the first time Nautilus had been at sea since Jan. 25 when, after logging 1,000 hours under nuclear propulsion, she was placed in dry dock for necessary maintenance.

Navy officials explained that this consisted chiefly of removing marine growth which had attached to her hull during the year's stay at the fitting dock after being launched in January of 1954.

A sub base spokesman said that Nautilus would make her first deep dive "in the near future."

Japan Slates Vital Election For Sunday

TOKYO (AP) — Japan votes tomorrow in a national election that will help set the nation's course in the cold war struggle between communism and the West.

It also will decide how fast Japan will rearm.

There are four major parties in the race, two conservative and two socialist. The Communists also are trying a minor comeback.

Predictions are that the conservatives will pile up a commanding margin.

At stake are the 467 seats of the House of Representatives, which elects the prime minister and makes Japan's laws.

A record 37 to 38 million Japanese men and women—75 per cent of those registered—are expected to vote. Women have voted in Japan only since the war.

Riddle Budget Hearing Slated

The annual school budget of Riddle District No. 70 has been accepted as presented by the school board and budget committee. The budget totals \$222,445, an increase of \$11,245 over last year.

Contributing factors of the increase are three additional teachers; plus \$100 raise in basic salary schedule; additional custodial service for expected growth of the school plant; additional school secretary; increase in textbooks and supplies; and in retirement and social security withholdings.

However, expected revenue is approximately \$41,000 higher than last year, giving an estimated tax levy on present known assessed valuation for 1955-56 of 17.5 mills, or a decrease of 2.5 mills over last year. Several possible major additions to local valuation will undoubtedly lower millage further, according to Superintendent Kenneth Stuart.

Public hearing of the school budget will be March 9 at the Riddle High School building at 8 p.m.

The budget is posted according to state law at the Riddle postoffice, high school, and Weimer's grocery.

The budget next must be presented to the rural school board for incorporation in the rural school budget. Any deficits in the Riddle budget would have to be approved in Riddle as a social levy if the full amount for Riddle is to be scheduled.

Drain Chamber Gets Little Hope For Road Work

Drain Chamber of Commerce people have been told that chances of improvements on Highway 99 between Anlauf and to the south of Drain by the State Highway Commission are fairly slim at this time.

Tom Edwards, division engineer for the State Highway Dept., advised the chambermen, however, that it will be to their advantage to "incessantly present" their plea to the commission.

The city is due to be bypassed when the relocated highway is completed to the east this summer. Drain people feel that they have a particular problem, in that they long have regarded their city as a gateway to the coast. The city is situated at the junction of highways 33 and 99.

The people of the north Douglas community earlier had petitioned the commission for realignment of the existing highway.

Edwards told the group that other bypassed cities, in several instances, have experienced better business conditions after such highway reroutings as that around Drain.

The engineer wouldn't predict whether improvements to Highway 225 between Sutherland and Elkton or Route F running out of Eugene would take precedence over any local improvement.

Marriages Hit Rocks For Both Robinson, Son

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — The marriages of the Edward G. Robinsons, both Sr. and Jr., have hit the rocks.

Edward Sr., the movies' "Little Caesar," was sued here by Gladys Robinson, 59, after 28 years of marriage. She accused him of "destroying my happiness" and "destroying the legitimate ends of matrimony." She charges mental cruelty.

A few hours later the wife of Edward Jr., Frances Christman Robinson, 54, instructed her attorney, S. S. Hahn, to bring suit for divorce next Monday on grounds of incompatibility.

"We'll try to get the divorce as quietly as possible so far as the accusations are concerned," Hahn said.

Mrs. Robinson Sr. yesterday asked temporary alimony and half of community property which she values at \$3,500,000.

tor Court Assn. could work with it to secure better directional signs to channel tourists to the businesses. He said the "impact of the highway building program" on established roadside businesses will be great. He said it was necessary to have "adequate directional signs and accesses" to the businesses.

Henderson also explained some legislation both in Congress and in the State Legislature. He said the association would battle toll roads and did not favor any of the billboard bills now in the Legislature. He said the lawyer retained by the association was now writing a bill in the State Legislature which will take out the best features of three bills now being studied to form one new bill. "We'll want to use billboards," he said.

He finally urged local associations to work for increase of the tourist industry (now the state's third with 125 million dollars in 1954).

Russia Reportedly Gives Red China Eight Small Subs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Russia is reported to have turned over to Red China perhaps eight small coastal type submarines.

American officials who reported this Friday said the Russians are also training Chinese Communist crews to operate the craft.

At least three of these submarines are said to have been seen at the Chinese Communist harbor at Tsingtao, across the Yellow Sea from Korea.

Little firm information appears to be available here on whether any of the subs have been operating in the Formosa area. However, the Chinese Nationalists claim their planes have sunk two submarines in the area in recent days.

One report is that four to eight of the Russian-built submarines were formally transferred to the Red Chinese last September. An official familiar with Red naval strength said he believed the figure was more likely correct.

Vote On Harlan Due Next Week; Hearing Ended

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Daniel (D-Tex.) said today he now is convinced Judge John Marshall Harlan "does not subscribe to any world government."

This was the principal issue raised against Harlan's appointment to the Supreme Court during two days of Senate Judiciary Committee hearings which ended late yesterday.

Chairman Kilgore (D-WVa.) said he hoped the committee would act on the nomination sometime next week. He has predicted the committee will recommend Senate confirmation. President Eisenhower nominated Harlan to the high court last Nov. 9, but action was deferred when opposition arose.

Daniel said before the hearing he was concerned about some of the portents against Harlan's nomination and wanted to learn whether the New York jurist favored a partial surrender of national sovereignty to international organizations.

Appearing as the final witness Friday, Harlan testified he was not "a one-worlder" who believed in surrendering American sovereignty. Neither, said Harlan, was he an isolationist. Harlan said he felt this country had to align itself with other free nations to counter the Communist menace.
