The Colonial tea given Saturday afternoon by the Daughters of the American Revolution in observance of George Washington's birthday was one of the most colorful and interesting parties of the season.

The tea featured a display of unusual and beautiful antiques of the Revolutionary period. Mrs. Dean Ross and Mrs. Victor Micelli, co-chairmen of arrangements, reproduced Colonial settings in the recreation room of the Methodist Church, using screens and rugs and the antique furniture, pictures, mirrors and accessories, which made up the displays. These settings depicted one end of a formal living room with a fireplace, a dining room which provided the background for the tea table, and a country kitchen with hooked rug, settle, spinning wheels and wooden and copper utensils.

Noteworthy among the furniture shown was the settee and a Chippendale chair brought from Philadelphia by Mrs. Walter Monger's family; a dropleaf mahogany table belonging to Mrs. Earl Wiley, and a what-not, an Empire console table and a pedestal table brought to Oregon by General Joseph Lane and loaned by Mrs. Douglas Waite.

Pauley shawls and handwoven coverlets formed the background for tables holding beautiful pieces

of old china and glass, figurines, fans, books and documents and handwoven articles.

The tea table, which was arranged by Mrs. Earl Wiley, vice regent of Umpqua Chapter, was covered by a handwoven fringed damask cloth brought from England in 1800 by the Grinstead family and loaned by Mrs. Cal
