

Man Being Held For Rape-Slaying Of Ann Yarrow

NEW YORK (AP)—A 25-year-old father of two children was charged today with the rape-slaying of New York University coed Ann Yarrow. He was first arrested on a separate rape complaint.

After 12 hours questioning, William Patrick Farrell was booked on a charge of homicide.

Miss Yarrow, a graduate student, was found raped, strangled and stabbed with a knife 37 times in a lower East Side apartment Feb. 6.

Police nabbed Farrell in a cemetery Tuesday after a short chase from the apartment of his sister-in-law Irene Miller, 29, on East 3rd Street, about a block from where Miss Yarrow, 23, was slain.

A slim, good-looking man of medium build, Farrell went to Mrs. Miller's home Tuesday morning and, with a butcher knife in hand, robbed and raped her in front of her 3-year-old son, police said.

Before raping the woman, police said, he chased from the apartment Mrs. Miller's stepfather, who called police. Farrell fled from the rear of the apartment when they arrived, but was caught after police fired a warning shot.

Police linked Farrell with the Yarrow murder during questioning on Mrs. Miller's complaint.

Through the evening they tackled the dirty job of dredging for a knife they said he told them he had thrown down a sewer.

Nehru's Congress Party Dominates India's Election

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru's Congress party and its allies snatched under Communist nominees in first returns today from a key election in Andhra state.

The Reds, once so confident of victory they announced plans for taking over the south Indian state's government, won only two of the 52 state legislative seats so far decided.

Unofficial newspaper tabulations of early results gave victory to 38 candidates of the United Front, which is led by the Congress party. The State Legislature has 196 seats.

Among the defeated Communist candidates were some of the state party's hierarchy. Red leaders immediately complained voting was unfair.

Of the other 12 seats decided, the Praja (People's Socialist party) PSP won 4 and independent candidates 8.

The counting is expected to continue for several days.

Klamath Indian Given Life Term In Penitentiary

BURNS (AP)—James Q. Anderson, a Klamath Reservation Indian convicted of second degree murder last Friday, was sentenced Tuesday to life in prison.

He was accused of slaying Richard Davis Miller at a ranch on the reservation last November.

Anderson, 31, has served 13 years in the state prison for killing another Klamath Falls man. He was released last summer.

Charges of assault with intent to kill a Grants Pass couple, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Menasco Jr., also are pending against him at Klamath Falls, where he is held.

Immediately after sentence was passed, Defense Atty. Herbert P. Welch, Lakeview, moved for a new trial. Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs set March 23 for hearing arguments on the motion.

The trial was moved here from Klamath Falls at the request of Anderson's attorney.

Roar Of Cheers Greet Pope Pius On 79th Birthday

VATICAN CITY (AP)—A roar of glad cheers greeted Pope Pius XII Wednesday on his double anniversary—the 79th of his birth and the 16th of his election as Pontiff.

Thousands of Romans, tourists and pilgrims gathered in sunny St. Peter's Square to greet the spiritual leader of more than 400 million Roman Catholics.

When the white-clad figure of the convalescing Pontiff appeared in his apartment window to bless the throng, a great roar of "Viva il Papa"—Long live the Pope—rose to greet him. Gold and white papal flags fluttered from Vatican buildings. Women and girls waved white handkerchiefs.

The Pope's voice, carried to the crowd by loudspeaker, seemed stronger than at any time since his grave collapse last December.

Pope Pius was born in Rome on March 2, 1876. He was elected the Catholic Church's 261st head on March 2, 1939, and was crowned ten days later, on March 12.

Sec. Dulles Arrives For Talks With Chiang

TAIPEI (AP)—U.S. Secretary of State Dulles arrives Thursday from Manila for an important card-on-the-table conference with Nationalist China's President Chiang Kai-Shek.

They are expected to discuss in detail the future of Quemoy and Matsu, the last remaining important Nationalist island outposts.

The Nationalists have said they will fight for the islands. They have implied that the United States will support them. The United States has never announced publicly whether it will.

A Manila report that Dulles would sound out Chiang on the possibility of abandoning Quemoy and the Matus caused grave forebodings here. Nationalist sources said such a proposal if made would be rejected.

Massive Atomic Blast Postponed

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Atomic Energy Commission scientists, after a last-minute conference, called off the "big shot" scheduled for just before dawn Wednesday. They said weather conditions were unacceptable.

A spokesman said that no shot would be fired Thursday either, but that a weather evaluation session would be held to determine if the detonation would be rescheduled for Friday morning.

No reason was given for the last minute postponement other than "weather conditions." Presumably winds were too strong aloft. The shot, to have been fired from a 500-foot tower, was the one originally scheduled to open the spring test series. It has been postponed repeatedly.

Weather conditions were considered near perfect when Tuesday's small nuclear shot was fired from a 300-foot tower on Yucca Flat.

Sharp Earthquake Raps Area South Of Frisco

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—A strong earthquake, probably in the Aleutians, was recorded on the University of California seismograph Monday night.

Assistant seismologist Don Toher said the quake was recorded at 8:48.55 p.m. PST, with the indicated distance from Berkeley around 2,300 miles.

He said the Richter magnitude of the quake was between 6 and 6.5.

SIGNS PAY INCREASE

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Wednesday signed the bill raising the pay of Congress members by 50 per cent, giving them \$22,500 a year.

The measure also provides pay raises of \$7,500 to \$10,000 for approximately 400 federal judges, a \$5,000 boost for the vice president and House speaker, and increases for U.S. attorneys, their assistants and several top Justice Department officials.

Teachers' Strike Protests Firing

IRVING, Tex. (AP)—A meeting of striking school personnel, considering a School Board ultimatum to return to their jobs today or be replaced, broke up with no announcement of a decision.

The 114 school employees, who struck because the School Board refused to reinstate dismissed former Sup't. John L. Beard, were told by the board to "return to work Wednesday or be replaced."

The board also fired nine principals and others in executive jobs after a day in which more than 100 citizen volunteers substituted as teachers, bus drivers and custodians.

Police, reinforced by county officers, watched the schools closely to prevent an outbreak of violence feared since Monday night's School Board meeting. That meeting ended in hysterical shouting and name-calling and only the presence of an augmented police force was believed to have prevented fistfights.

Gillis quoted the boy as saying he argued with his sister over a television program he was watching and she pulled the plug from the set. He told Gillis they had been quarrelling all afternoon.

James McGinty was told to issue a 30-day eviction notice to the three families involved. A motion was also adopted to have the city attorney start proceedings to collect money owed the city for back rent from former tenants at Myrtle Manor, about \$2,800.

The council also indicated it would try to give a definite answer on requests by the Tri-City and Herman's Addition areas for Myrtle Creek water at the next meeting, scheduled March 8.

The council decided it must still examine some of the individual problems. The city recorder was instructed to contact the Corvallis engineering firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield to aid solution of the problem.

The firm will be requested to send a representative to Myrtle Creek to explain the problem and offer its solution at the next meeting, reports correspondent Mrs. Ruth M. Evans.

A bright spot of the evening was payment by George Childress, secretary-treasurer of the Myrtle Creek Rural Fire District of \$1,098.18. This was the district's first revenue check to the city. The city fire department protects the district, and the district pays the city 80 per cent of its fire protection taxes.

Parking Tickets Needed In Fine-O-Meters Also

Roseburg police have run across a hitch in the operation of the "fine-o-meters," a dozen of which have been set up in the business district as a convenience to overtime parkers who have received tickets.

Police Chief Stan Olson said today that many persons are merely dropping 50 cents into the envelope provided with parking tickets. The chief emphasized that the parking tickets must be placed in the envelopes along with the money.

Otherwise, he said, the police have no way of knowing whom to credit payments to, since fines are credited by license numbers of cars ticketed.

He cautioned that unless tickets are included in the envelopes, warrants for violators may be issued. All stray cash collected so far has been put into the parking meter fund.

The bills would set up county boards to regulate comic books, and prohibit distributors from requiring dealers to take books they don't want in order to get the ones they do want.

Salvage Timber Tract Sells Above Appraised Price

Douglas fir on one salvage tract of Bureau of Land Management timber was sold here this morning for \$121 per cent over the appraised price.

There was 284,000 board feet of Douglas fir in the tract, appraised at \$4,842.20 and sold for \$10,721 to South Fork Lumber Co., Cottage Grove. Price of the species was bid up from the appraised \$17.05 a thousand to \$37.75. The tract is located on Elk Creek about eight miles east of Yoncalla. Other bidders were Yoncalla Lumber Co., Mt. Baldy Lumber Co., and Lucas Lumber Co., all of Yoncalla; Dunlap Lumber Co., Drain, and Joe Ordis, Oakland.

A second block, containing 445,000 feet of green timber, also was purchased by South Fork Lumber Co., which paid \$12,867.70 compared to the appraisal of \$9,765.70. Douglas fir was bid up from \$25 a thousand to \$33.25, about 33 per cent over appraisal. Yoncalla Lumber Co. and Bergerson Logging Co. of Roseburg were other bidders. The tract is located about six miles northeast of Drain.

There were 43 bids on the first sale, 34 on the second.

Then he moved to Vancouver, where he made his home since then. He was married to Myra Zachary at Lacomb, Alberta, June 14, 1924.

Huff was a member of the Eagles Lodge at Vancouver. Surviving are his wife of Vancouver and a number of nephews and nieces.

Two Released Americans On Way To United States

HONG KONG (AP)—A U. S. consulate spokesman said Tuesday night two Americans who were expelled from Red China as spies and declared they were guilty—have accepted one-way passports good only for a return trip to the United States.

The two are Malcolm Aersohn, 29, of New York City, and Mrs. Adelle Austin Rickett, 35, formerly of Seattle, Wash.

The pair surprised newsmen and U. S. consulate officials by proclaiming here Monday they deserved their punishment at the hands of the Chinese Reds. They had been held for 3 1/2 years in jail under close detention.

Newspapermen and their relatives in the United States said the two had been subjected to a thorough job of Communist brainwashing.
