Idaho Proposes Raising Income Tax 7 1/2 Per Cent

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House of Representatives received here a bill raising state income tax 7 1/2 per cent to produce a million and a half dollars lost through rejection of an "income tax acceleration bill."

Late Tuesday, the Senate gave final approval to truck and liquor tax increases, with only two days remaining until the scheduled end of the session.
The income tax increase bill would provide that beginning with the levy on this year's income, the taxpayer would simply add 7 1/2 per cent after figuring his tax. The act would be a "stopgap" measure expiring Dec. 31, 1956.
A bill repealing the 15 per cent income tax cut enacted in 1953 has been passed by both houses and signed by Gov. Smylie.
The "acceleration" bill would have required corporations and self-employed persons to file quarterly tax returns to make more money available for this biennium.

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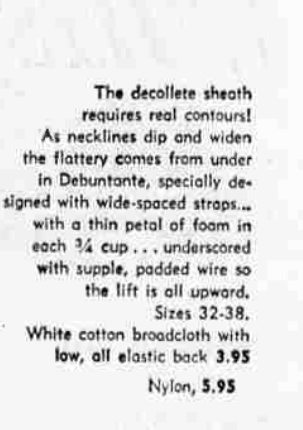

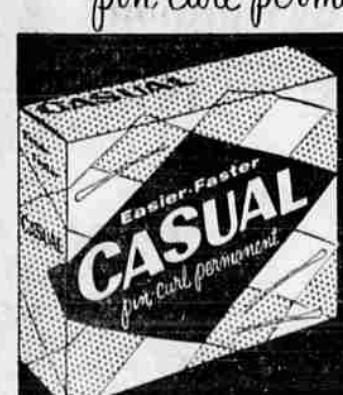
