

Margaret Rose To Marry RAF Officer, Report

LONDON — Princess Margaret intends to marry 40-year-old RAF Group Capt. Peter Townsend this fall, an informant in touch with the royal family said Wednesday.

Townsend himself, a divorced man, was quoted as saying: "There can be nothing said until the time is ready or somebody else does something."

The 24-year-old princess is expected to renounce her right of succession to the throne to smooth the way for her wedding to a commoner, according to the informant, who refused to permit use of his name.

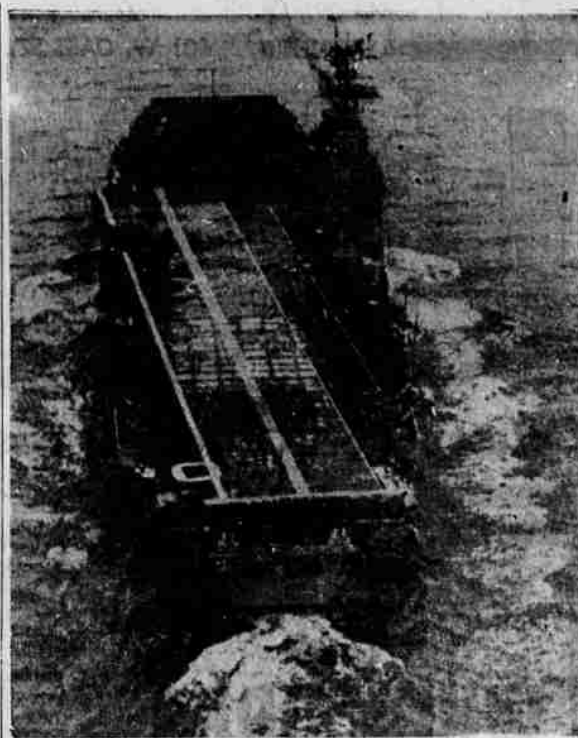
Margaret's marriage to the war hero, 16 years her senior and father of two children, would defy the Church of England's ban on the remarriage of divorced persons.

Buckingham Palace maintained its traditional silence on reports concerning the royal family's personal plans. But available information tended to corroborate the report that Margaret and Townsend are going ahead with wedding plans.

Even a princess can change her mind, however, and Townsend himself presumably could erect great obstacles to the marriage by indiscreet remarks.

There are suggestions—naturally not confirmed—that news about the royal romance is being leaked deliberately to the British press.

The aim of that apparently would be to determine how the British people react to word that the gay princess has chosen a divorced commoner.

Pelly Concedes Oregon Victory

Minor Traffic Delays Caused By Road Projects

SALEM — The Oregon Highway Commission's weekly road construction summary:

Pacific Highway — For 4 miles north of Myrtle Creek, possible minor delay; bridge construction 2.4 miles south of Roseburg, possible delay.

Coast Highway — For 5 miles north of Gardiner, gravel surface; Clear Lake to Eel Lake, 2.45 miles of detour on old pavement; between 2 and 14 miles south of Port Orford, possible minor delay; Depoe Bay to Whale Cove, 1.3 miles gravel surface.

Umpqua Highway — For 1.4 miles east of Reedsport, minor delays.

SEATTLE — Rep. Pelly (R-Wash.) has conceded victory to Oregon in his battle to have surplus grain stored in ships moored in Puget Sound near Olympia.

Pelly said Tuesday government proving it would cost less to store the grain on ships in Oregon's Cathlamet Bay.

"We've got to face up to facts," he said. "If these figures are correct and there are not unconsidered factors, we are committed to accept the most economical loading method."

Pelly, who has been feuding with Oregon's congressional delegation over the storage question, said latest figures show it would cost 10 per cent more to store 450,000 tons of grain in 75 ships in Budd Inlet.

He said it would cost \$4,048,275 to load the ships at Astoria and low them to Olympia, while the cost of loading for Cathlamet Bay plus the cost of dredging the bay would be \$3,669,475.

The 75 Liberty ships to be used in the program are now in the reserve fleet at Astoria.

Budget Under Study — The school budget for 1955-56 is now being studied by the budget committee, which is composed of C. C. Fosback, chairman; Andy Jacoby, secretary; Norman Slack, Charles McCord and Herbert Norcraft.

Two meetings have been held with the first one spent in listening to the building principals explain their needs for the coming year. FCC Nominee Confirmed By Senate Committee

WASHINGTON — The Senate Commerce Committee Wednesday approved President Eisenhower's nomination of George C. McConaughy to be chairman of the Federal Communications Commission.

The 50-year-old one-time Ohio utility lawyer has been acting FCC chairman since last Oct. 4 when Eisenhower gave him a recess appointment and designated him chairman.

The committee also approved the nomination of Clarence G. Morse of San Francisco to be a member of the Federal Maritime Board.

EXPLOSION TAKES THREE — VALPARAISO, Ind. — At least three men were killed Wednesday in the explosion of a gas pipeline seven miles north of here.

Two men severely burned were brought to a hospital here.

State police reported the explosion occurred while a six-man crew was working on the line of the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Co.

McGovern is a graduate of Southern Oregon College with a Bachelor's degree in elementary education. Prior to going to Lookingglass he taught at Dillard and at Douglas High Schools. He will assume his administrative duties at the beginning of the 1955-56 school year.

The citizens' advisory committee has a group checking on possible school sites for the recommended new elementary building in the Winston area. One would be to double-shift the primary grades at Dillard. The other would be to transport the necessary number of students to Lookingglass.

It is reported from the board and budget committees that the district 116 has grown larger than many of the towns in Oregon.

With final reports coming in, it appears that the Douglas High presentation of the operetta "Sweethearts" was as much a financial success as it was an outstanding performance. Many favorable comments were received not only from those attending from the Douglas district but also from those who came from outside the area to attend the performances.

Home From Portland — Mr. and Mrs. George Forrest have returned to their home on Page Road at Winchester, after spending the last week in Portland.

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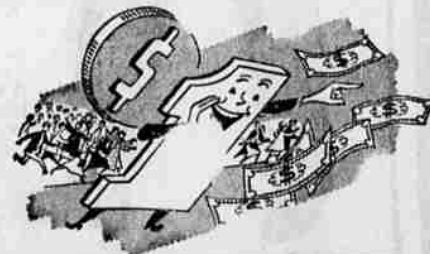

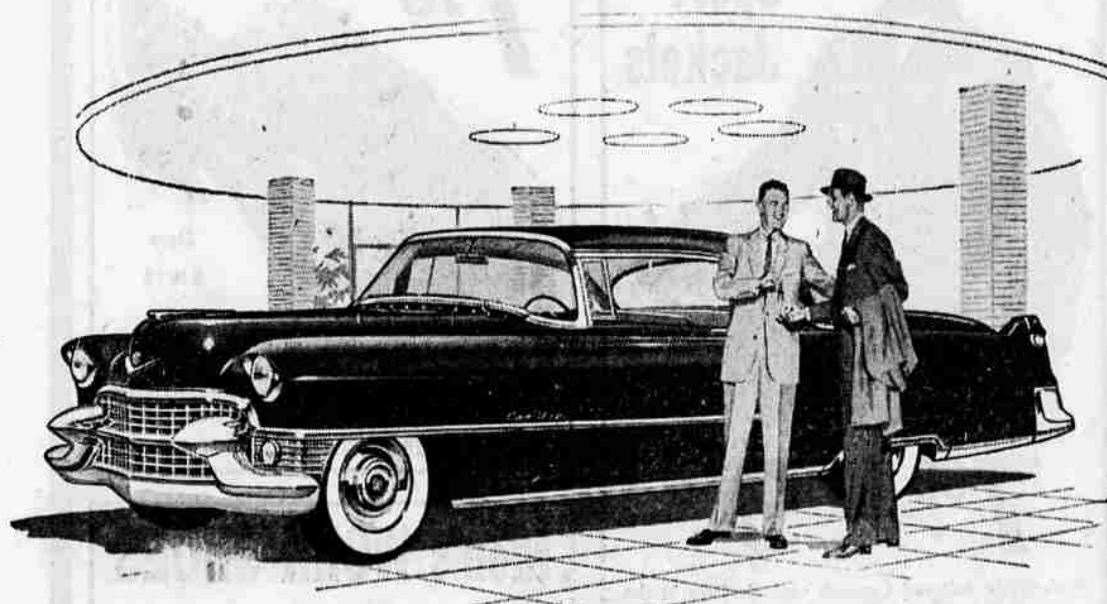
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
