Smaller Cities May Be Served By Helicopters

SEATTLE (AP) — Plans for a helicopter "commuter service" to service cities not now on regular airline schedules were announced here by West Coast Airlines — but the company made plain its plans are for the future.

West Coast filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington an outline of its plans to serve 54 communities in Oregon and Washington. Some already have regularly scheduled airlines service and in these cases the helicopter service would be between downtown and the airports.

"West Coast believes that the service requested is required by the public convenience and necessity and that it is the most logical operator in view of its long experience in providing local air service in the Pacific Northwest," the company said in its application.

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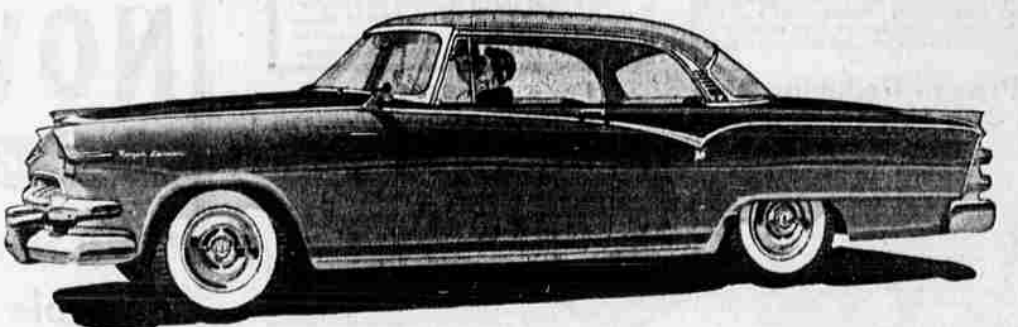
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
