Yalta Papers Disclose Very Little Not Known

years the Soviets solidified Communist rule from the Baltic to the Black Sea.

The Big Three conference was held at Yalta in the Russian Crimea in February 1945. Roosevelt, Stalin and Churchill met some months earlier at Tehran, mainly on coordinating military strategy against Nazi Germany.

At Yalta they grappled with great political issues, including the future of Germany. The record shows they agreed on "dis-membrement" of Germany in principle, but not on how it should be cut up.

But the overriding problem was Russia's prospective entry into the war against Japan. Russia agreed to come in once Germany was defeated. The war in Europe ended May 7, 1945. Russia entered the conflict with Japan on Aug. 9, 1945, three days after the United States dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima. Japan surrendered Aug. 14, 1945.

The agreement between Roosevelt and Stalin on Russian entry into the Pacific war has produced years of political controversy in the United States.

Many Republican senators and others denounced Roosevelt's concessions as an unnecessary grant of position and power to Stalin. Roosevelt's defenders have replied it was the price he had to pay to assure Russian military action against Japan.

State Department officials are understood to have hoped that publication of the record would bring the long dispute to an end. It appeared, however, that the record might simply furnish more ammunition for it.

In addition, a question was raised as to whether the published record was complete in all details. The State Department itself said some omissions had been made for national security or elimination of repetitious material or to avoid "needless offense" to foreign nations or to individuals.

Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) called Roosevelt's action in agreeing to Stalin's far East demands "an almost unparalleled error." Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said publication was aimed "at satisfying more vitriolic elements of the Republican party."

Second Douglas Judge Asked In Brief Filed

ted here, besides a host of county roads.

Other factors enter into the plan of the local people.

First, all probate and juvenile matters now are in the jurisdiction of Judge Hill. In most other counties, the matters are brought into circuit court. It's said in the brief that Judge Hill also has a heavy load of county business to attend. With the addition of a second circuit judge here it's anticipated that juvenile and probate proceedings will be placed in circuit court.

Second, it's brought out that Douglas County has the highest number of law, equity and criminal actions filed between Oct. 1, 1953, and Dec. 1, 1954, in Oregon, excepting Lane, which has two judges. Marion with three and Multnomah with 11.

Third, Judge Wimberly runs a circuit court serving an estimated population of 68,000 in the county, about 24,000 more than the average of all other courts in the state. It's figured that some Coos-Curry county business might be taken up here. That population average for three judges in Douglas, Coos and Curry counties thus would correspond roughly with the state average.

The mileage of highways in the county, it was noted, substantially contributes to civil litigation.

It also has contributed materially to criminal actions due to the apprehension of violators and felons on the 100 miles of Pacific Highway within the county, it was stated.

The county itself has been looking forward to the appointment of the second judge, and the new west wing of the courthouse now under construction will include two circuit courtrooms.

Additional circuit judges also are sought in other counties in the state. Lane County, a part of the Second Judicial District with Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, is asking for a third judge.

A Supreme Court administrative report also points out shortages of jurists in Jackson, Linn, Lincoln, Marion and Multnomah counties, though the Linn County situation is of temporary nature.

The appointment of a second judge here is supported by the Douglas County Court and the Coos-Curry Bar Assn., besides the Douglas County Bar Assn.

The brief states that if a second judge is added, more court employees also would be hired.

Dulles Declines To State Why Papers Released

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles angrily refused to answer and stalked away Thursday when a reporter asked why he released the controversial Yalta papers at this time.

Earlier he had told newsmen he expected the controversy over Yalta "will go on through the ages."

This was in response to a question whether he thought publication of the voluminous record of the wartime Big Three meeting would quiet the partisan political furor about what took place at the Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin meeting in the Soviet Crimea in February of 1945.

The incident occurred at the Military Air Transport Service terminal as Dulles was about to board a plane for Ottawa and his first state visit to Canada.

With Canadian Ambassador Arnold Heeney, Dulles took up a position before microphones and cameras. The first questioner was CBS reporter Pete Clapper, was: "Mr. Secretary, why did you release the Yalta papers at this time?"

Dulles flushed, took a couple of steps toward Clapper and thrust out his jaw.

"I'm not going to stand here at this time (to) make a statement about Canada and have a question like that shot at me."

With that, he stalked away toward his waiting plane.

An official who declined to permit use of his name said Wednesday night that the documents were released at that time because at least one newspaper already had obtained a copy. There also were reports of heavy pressure from Republican members of Congress. Dulles' own plan, for the time being, had been to make them available to certain key members and committees of Congress on a confidential basis.

Vernon Little Is Appointed To Oakland Council

Little, who is president of the Oakland Chamber of Commerce, was sworn in by Judge R. A. Wilkins at a council meeting this morning according to Correspondent Edith Dunn.

In other council action, property owners in the vicinity of Walnut Street and Third Avenue petitioned for a street light. The matter was tabled until a definite location for the light can be determined. It was also decided to ask California Oregon Power Co. to put in larger lights in east Oakland.

Veterans organizations asked for an ordinance outlawing solicitors claiming to represent them. There is an old ordinance pertaining to permits and fines for soliciting and peddling in the city.

Ed Stearns, Kenneth Copeland and Harvey Smith were appointed to a citizens committee to obtain a right-of-way for extension of Oak Street east.

A letter was read from the State Highway Commission concerning drainage of the triangle being developed by the Oakland Garden Club.

A. W. Carlisle explained the Oakland Civil Defense set-up. He said Leroy Sifer and Russell Carlisle will police the surrounding area. Fay Stearns and Gene Todd of the Fire Dept. will be in charge of fire protection. John Goin and Todd would be in charge of Boy Scout work, and Gene Cherry in charge of water supply. Chief of Police W. Manning was appointed to head CD police activities.

A special meeting of the council will be held Tuesday, March 22, to discuss the garbage disposal problem.

School Clerk Compiles Figures On New Budget

Additionally there will be \$35,000 in rebates given taxpayers who pay taxes in advance. "Therefore, these two items must be added back on the budget to arrive at the correct amount," he said.

The figure then climbs back to an estimated \$1,442,800.55. The general fund tax base on which the six per cent limitation is figured this year amounts to \$144,983.38. Principal and interest on outstanding bonds previously voted by the people amount to \$283,422.50, making a total of \$1,442,800.55 within the six per cent limitation.

The final special levy figure (outside the six per cent limitation) is, therefore, \$1,014,454.16.

The figure outside the 6 per cent limitation approved by voters July 14, 1954, was \$935,115.26. Millage this past year was 55.8. Millc estimates it will be increased about three mills if the budget meets voter approval.

Difference between the 1954-55 special levy and the proposed 1955-56 special levy is about \$79,000, said the clerk, to pay for new instructors and other cost incidental to operation of the new Hucresia Junior High School. Lane addition. The district expects 300 new students next year.

The total budget figure is also increased by \$38,200 in bonds and interest voted by District 4 residents when they okayed the new construction.

son's signature before becoming law. The House passed it 40-16 Wednesday, on the grounds it would help solve the teacher shortage.

The minimums would be \$3,200 for teachers with bachelor degrees, and \$3,600 for those with master's degrees.

The Oregon Education Assn. asked for minimums \$400 more than those that were finally approved.

The bill would become law July 1, 1956.

The House also sent to the governor a bill guaranteeing counties the right to lease county-owned lands for prospecting for oil, gas and minerals.

The House Tax Committee said it would wait on its revenue program for another 10 days, and then try to figure out strategy in getting the people to accept it. The committee fears that parts of the \$35,000,000 program might be referred to the people, thus depriving the state of some of the revenue in the next biennium.

The program will be explained to the House March 25. It calls for higher income and withholding taxes, a cigarette tax, income taxes on utilities, and various other kinds of levies.

The House Local Government Committee, at the request of the League of Oregon Cities, introduced a bill to have the secretary of state make census counts of cities under 5,000 population when the cities request and pay for it.

A bill introduced by Rev. Katherine Musa, The Dalles, would have signs put on school buses advising motorists to stop when loading or unloading. Such signs now are required, but there's nothing on the school buses telling that the stops should be made.
