Hatoyama Re-Elected Japan Prime Minister

TOKYO (AP) — Ichiro Hatoyama was re-elected Prime Minister late Friday night by the new Diet (parliament) after a coalition of rival Conservatives and Socialists defeated his candidates for speaker and vice speaker of the powerful lower house.

Hatoyama's re-election never was in serious doubt, but former Prime Minister Shigemitsu Yoshida's Conservative Liberal Party teamed up with both right and left wing Socialists to make inroads upon Hatoyama's control of the Diet.

Heart Attack Kills Scouter

A Roseburg man returning from a Boy Scout camp at Wolf Creek died of a heart attack Thursday morning about two miles east of Roseburg.

Scoutmaster Paul Rudolph Back, 59, was returning from Wolf Creek Camp where he had been with his troop, Troop 7, sponsored by the American Legion.

Back was born April 19, 1895, in Highland Kan., and came to Roseburg nine years ago. His address was 1300 Myrtlewood Place. He was an accountant at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He was a member of the First Christian Church at Roseburg.

Surviving are his wife, Margaret, and a son, Donald, both of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, Saturday at 11 a.m. The body will then be taken to Portland for interment in the Willamette National Cemetery.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that contributions be made to a memorial fund to be used for the Boy Scout Camp at Siletco. Donations may be left at the Roseburg Funeral Home.

Former Glendale Woman Succumbs

The remains of Mrs. Pauline Lang, 72, Grants Pass, have been shipped to Portland. Funeral services were being held today.

(Continued from Page One) government, and that he never belonged to any organization which he knew advocated violent overthrow.

Rep. Lloyd R. Haynes, Grants Pass, urged passage of the bill in order to keep subversives out of the organization.

But Rep. Harvey H. DeArmond, Bend, said "loyalty oaths are idiotic. A Communist wouldn't hesitate to swear to it, and it might keep good people out of civil defense."

Bills passed by the House and sent to the governor would let the state fair have displays of historical objects; and provide that if a nominee for county school superintendent dies after the primary, the office would be filled in the same manner as now provided for independent candidates getting on the general election ballot.

The House voted to give final consideration next Monday to the Senate-passed resolution to permit emergency clauses on tax bills. It voted 34-26 Thursday for a report recommending its passage.

WHEN IT'S TIME TO MOVE

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Pat Ward Breaks Down During Vice Trial Questioning

NEW YORK (AP)—Ex-call girl Pat Ward, breaking down in sobs at times, has testified she had sex relations and visited bars and night spots at the age of 16 before she met Minot F. (Mickey) Jelke.

Defense counsel emphasized also that she knew at least two notorious procurers before she met the oleomargarine heir.

And Jelke's counsel obtained a concession from the prosecution's star witness that she doesn't know how many men she had relations with during the period she associated with Jelke.

A tearful breakdown by the 21-year-old brunette Thursday caused an early overnight adjournment of Jelke's trial on a charge of recruiting her for safe society prostitution.

She was being cross examined by defense counsel George Washington Herz about an illegitimate child she bore at the age of 17, before she met Jelke.

The witness mentioned some well-known names when asked about men she knew.

None of the well-known men she mentioned from recollections of her teen years was represented as anything more than a casual acquaintance and there was no suggestion that any were among her vice clients.

Among these men were actor Dane Clark, comedian Joey Adams, band leader Skitch Henderson and disc jockey Jack Elgen.

Mother-in-Law's Killing Draws Death Penalty

DENVER (AP)—Frank Archina, a 22-year-old immigrant, was convicted yesterday of murdering his mother-in-law and sentenced to die in the state's gas chamber.

He also shot to death three other members of his wife's family but was tried only on charges of slaying Mrs. Elizabeth Macri, 58.

His wife Rose, testified against him during a 10-day trial. After the verdict she commented: "It was what he deserved."

Capehart, Fulbright Clash At Stock Exchange Probe

nopoly and thus subject to government regulation.

Friday's renewed bickering in the stock market hearings came in the wake of a long-range exchange between Fulbright and Leonard W. Hall, Republican national chairman, who lambasted the inquiry in a speech in Miami Thursday night as a vehicle for spreading Democratic "gloom and doom" talk.

Fulbright retorted that "professional Republicans" are trying to hamper an honest inquiry because they seem to lack confidence in the strength of the American economy.

Fulbright asked if GM couldn't have sold more cars last year by cutting prices. Curcio said prices were cut in a sense—that GM sold better cars without raising prices.

Capehart demanded to know what bearing this line of questioning had on the subject of the inquiry—the stock market. Curcio said he thought the questions were "quite distant" from the subject.

"This shows conclusively," Capehart declared, "that the purpose here is not to investigate the stock market but business generally."

No Settlement Noted In Telephone Strike

ATLANTA (AP) — The nine-state strike of southern Bell Telephone Co. workers entered its fifth day today with no sign of a break in the deadlocked negotiations.

Reports of damage to telephone equipment continued. Cables have been cut, shot at, burned or pulled down in seven states since the walkout began Monday.

Company spokesman said 16,500 workers were on the job yesterday, 15 per cent more than Monday. An additional 10,000 supervisory employees handled nearly four-fifths of long-distance business, the spokesman said.

PERMIT TOTALS HIGH

In addition to regular classes, three new courses will be offered through the AE program. They are: Conversational Spanish, speed reading and constitution and government.

Conversational Spanish will be taught by Miss Phyllis Davis. It will be offered Monday evening in room SA-1. The course is basic and is for persons wishing to learn the language or review it, according to AE director Richard Boss.

Speed reading will be taught by Richard Gates. Testing in the course will be keyed to increased speed and comprehension in reading. It will be offered Tuesday evenings in room SA-4.

A special class in constitution and government is organized for persons wishing to become American citizens. It will be taught Wednesday evenings in room SA-4 by Leo Boyles from 7 to 9:30.

In addition to the new offerings, other courses will be available to Central Douglas County residents under the AE program. Director Boss urged persons seeking additional information to contact him at the AE office, telephone OR 3-5152; or to call the Roseburg High School office, telephone OR 3-4438, or the school superintendent's office, telephone OR 2-2696.

Registration in the AE classes may be made the first night of classes. Most of them meet in the school buildings at Roseburg High School. A minimum of 12 persons is required for all regular classes. Boss said.

Noninal fees for the classes are charged.
