Attend Game — Mr. and Mrs. Bill Benson of Roseburg attended the NCAA basketball game at Corvallis Saturday night.

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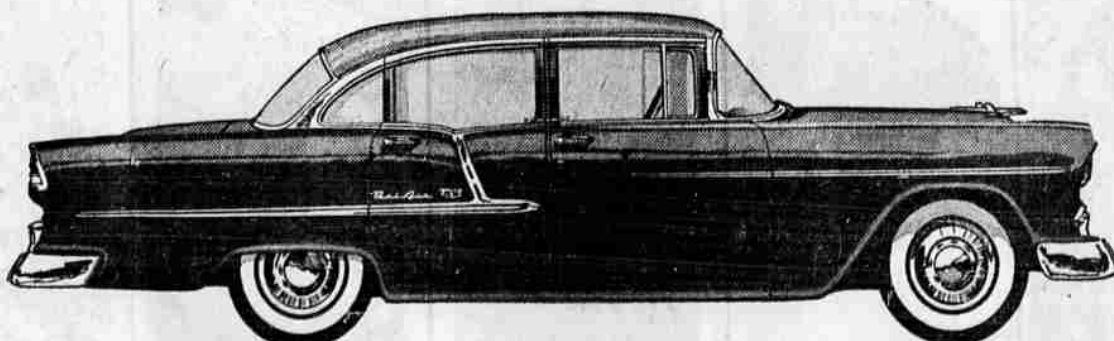
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
