Doctor Confesses Killing Family

MCALISTER, Okla. (AP) — County attorney James Whyte Tuesday announced Dr. Ben H. Galbraith's sudden confession came after he was returned here from Henderson, Tenn., where he was arrested Monday. His confession, made to Whyte, was taken on a wire recorder and played to newsmen. The bodies of his wife and three children were found in their burning home Thursday morning while Galbraith said he was in Norman, Okla.

Brownell Warns Unions To Beware Of Infiltration

BOSTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. Brownell Monday cautioned unions in good standing with the National Labor Relations Board to watch out for Communist "infiltration through affiliation." In an address prepared for the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, the attorney general said this type of infiltration "is one of the new facets of the Communist line."

Brownell discussed the new Communist control act adopted by Congress last year. Among other things, it provides for registration with the attorney general of labor unions found by the subversive activities control board to be Red-dominated. Such registration automatically deprives a union of the right to use the services of the NLRB.

Noting that the justice department has publicly announced it is investigating various unions under this new law, Brownell said the union reactions have been of three types:

- "1. Action to cleanse themselves of Communist domination, which is exactly what Congress wants them to do.
- "2. Attempts to conceal such domination.
- "3. Affiliation with other unions which are members of the AFL, CIO and thus gain entry from the act." The law says any union affiliated with one of the big federations is presumed to be free of Communist domination.

'Y' Membership To Hear Secretary Of World Service

YMCA World Service Sec. William P. Coston will be the featured speaker Wednesday night at a dinner meeting of Y membership enrollment workers and other friends of the organization. All persons interested in hearing Coston's report on YMCA services in Korea are invited to attend. Dinner will start at 6:30 p.m. in the Hotel Umpqua, with Coston scheduled to speak at 7:15. Co-chairmen of the session are William D. Green Jr., membership drive head, and Rev. Raymond Schaefer, chairman of the local chapter. Coston recently returned to the United States after three years work in war-torn Korea. He handled several jobs there, including relief work, general administration, and training.

Coston helped keep the Korean YMCA going and growing despite the ravages of war and scattered membership. The local chairman said. The Korean organization, stronger than ever, now has 24 associations, 10,000 members and a program of social services that reaches many thousands of war orphans, wounded veterans and refugees. Born in Clay Center, Kan., Coston spent three years in Puerto Rico in World War II. He is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles.

His Y experience includes being associate community boys secretary in Hollywood field program secretary in southeast Los Angeles and secretary of the student Christian association at Sacramento Junior College. He joined the Y International Committee staff in 1948 as world service secretary for Bolivia. Three years later he was sent to Korea. His wife was women and girls' work secretary at Stockton prior to their marriage.

20-Year-Sentence Meted For Assault On Girl

COQUILLE (AP) — James Harrison Tipton, 48, who admitted he had assaulted a 9-year-old girl the day before, Monday was sentenced to 20 years in prison. After Tipton admitted he had lured the girl into his rooming house as she was on her way home from church and there had assaulted her with intent to rape her, Circuit Judge Dal M. King passed sentence and commented that he regretted that he could not mete a life sentence. Willy Ray Knee, 21, of Coos Bay, who had been sentenced earlier for assault with intent to rape then was brought back into the court. Knee had been sentenced to 20 years after being found guilty of assault with intent to rape a 14-year-old girl. A 16-year-old youth also was accused in the attack. "In hearing your case," Judge King told Knee, "I didn't think there was anything much worse, but since then I have come across one that is worse."

RECKLESS DRIVING

William McCoy Wilson, 22, Wilbur, pleaded guilty Saturday to reckless driving, and Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff fined him \$100. Wilson was arrested by state police.

Shift Of Coast Guard Protested

SEATTLE (AP) — Representatives of two maritime unions told a Coast Guard board that a proposed shift of the CG's Pacific Northwest air base from Port Angeles to Seattle would endanger the safety of seafarers. Protesting the transfer of facilities were Capt. Mele D. Adlum, representing the Masters, Mates and Pilots Union, and Maxie Weisbarth, Seattle port agent for the Sailors Union of the Pacific. Adlum protested on the grounds Seattle is 30 to 40 minutes more flight time away from danger areas of the Strait of Juan de Fuca and Cape Flattery than Port Angeles. He also said Seattle air traffic is more congested than Port Angeles and more likely to be affected by fog and other adverse weather conditions. The board, headed by Capt. Ira

Bonneville Power Plans Another Power Reduction

PORTLAND (AP) — Bonneville Power Administration announced Tuesday that it was going to make another reduction in hydroelectric power deliveries to 14 plants in the Pacific Northwest. The new reduction will be effective Wednesday morning and will amount to 50 per cent of normal deliveries. Only Monday a cut of 35 per cent went into effect. The increase to 50 per cent was ordered, Bonneville reported, because the river flows have remained lower than usual and demand high because of continuing cold weather. The reductions are under so-called interruptible contracts which provide that power may be cut off when necessary. The electricity is sold at a lower rate than that under firm contract.

Ten of the plants arranged, when the 35 per cent cut was announced, to maintain full production by buying higher-cost steam-generated power. The four which did not were listed by Bonneville as Victor Chemical of Silver Bow Mont.; Rayonier, Inc. of Port Angeles, Wash.; and Penn Salt and Electro-Metallurgical of Portland.

Safety Worker Of Camas Will Be Speaker Here

The chairman of a safety effort in Camas, Wash., Wednesday night will be featured speaker at the second organizational meeting of a safety council in Roseburg. He is Lawrence Beauchamp, the town's fire chief, according to Irv Reiersen, secretary of the Roseburg group. At the Wednesday meeting, to be held in the old circuit court room in the courthouse at 8 p.m., President Bill Unruh of the Roseburg council is to name committee chairmen. Later in the week, members of the council will be in Ashland for a conference on home safety. The conference will be held on the Southern Oregon College campus all day Friday. The local council is one of the sponsors.

Beauchamp also is to speak in Ashland. Featured will be Dr. Harry F. Dietrich, Beverly Hills, Calif., pediatrician, who Reiersen said is a recognized authority on child safety. Others who will speak include: Claude Haggard, Grants, Pass, safety engineer for California Oregon Power Co.; H. W. Heidenreich, Medford, firearms safety instructor for the National Rifle Assn.; and Dr. Ralph Sullivan, Salem, director of industrial hygiene for the State Board of Health.

Subjects to be covered include fire, pesticides, electricity and child safety. Among those expected to attend from here are Reiersen; C. H. Boniolo, Roseburg building inspector; W. E. (Dutch) Miller, Roseburg fire chief; Dr. E. J. Wainwright, public health officer; and Mrs. Edwin Tauscher of the Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Assn. Some PTA people also may attend.

Access Roads Budget Cut Is Recommended

The U. S. House of Representatives appropriations committee Monday recommended a \$200,000 cut in the budget estimates for construction of access roads in the O & C lands. The committee has indicated that it believes the action will not retard the construction program. In a statement from the committee, it was reported: "This reduction appears warranted since the actual costs of constructing roads . . . in the revealed lands have been running considerably under the bureau estimates. President Eisenhower had asked for \$2,250,000 for BLM construction during the fiscal year starting July 1. The committee approved the budget estimate of \$13,400,000 for the bureau's activities in management, an increase of \$1,137,000 over current-year appropriations.

Council Debates Action On Business Request

George Luoma. The debate included Harris, however, moved that the waiver be denied. It never came to a vote, and the issue was tabled for the second straight meeting. The setback clause and Luoma's information also is to be studied at a later date. The councilman said he believes the city should adopt a general policy on setbacks for buildings along all arterials. After lengthy discussion over the meaning of Woodruff's motion to accept the Planning Commission's recommendation of a sewer report, the council finally received the letter. The report deals with the proposed new sewer treatment plant and sewer trunks in West Roseburg.

Senete Takes Up Postal Pay Raise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) said today "if looks as if we have enough votes" in the Senate to pass a 10 per cent pay raise for 1 1/2 million federal employees. The Senate may start debate this afternoon on the first of the bills, covering 500,000 postal workers. Next will come a similar pay measure for the one million classified civil service workers. The House Monday gave the Eisenhower administration a rebuff by voting overwhelmingly, 292-120, against calling up a 7 1/2 per cent average postal pay raise bill under a rule banning any amendment.

Such a rule had been sought by administration leaders and Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex) to head off floor moves for a bigger raise. The rule required a two-thirds vote; it got little more than one-third. **DOG KILLED, NO RABIES** PORTLAND (AP) — Police killed a dog here Monday after a number of persons had reported the animal had shown symptoms of rabies. It was running about wildly and slavering, they said. City health officials later reported that a rabies test showed negative results.

Tax Committee Remains Locked On New Revenue

If any part of the commission's program is attacked by referendum, then the burden will fall on property. However, the committee did vote to double the 1 per cent withholding tax, and to make it apply to farm workers, too. This was a reversal of a decision of several days ago when the committee decided on a graduated withholding tax so that salaried individuals would pay approximately their total income tax by the withholding method. However, the committee rejected the graduated idea Monday, deciding it would cause too much trouble for employers and the tax commission. The committee also decided to require estimated tax returns to be filed by persons in business for themselves, and by salaried persons who get \$1,000 or more a year for which the tax isn't withheld. The committee tentatively voted 5 to 3 against the bill by Sen. Walter J. Pearson, Portland Democrat, to have a "broad base" income tax. This bill would retain present rates and deductions, but would substitute a \$10 tax credit for each dependent, instead of the present \$600 personal exemptions.

Mrs. Edwin Brophy, who lives at the corner of Ball Street and Brown Avenue, wrote against the paving of Ball, for which petitions were presented earlier in the month. However, she was informed that the proposal would affect her property. She lives south of Harvard Avenue, and the proposed paving will be north of the avenue. Asked for a letter for the record from Miss Mini Bell, 829 Reservoir Ave., who claimed her property was damaged in street improvements on Terrace Avenue, Miss Bell said a corner of her property was chopped off. She seeks consideration of reimbursement for the damages claimed.
