Funds Requested For Indians' Aid

Tops \$41 Million

WASHINGTON — The House Appropriations Committee recommended here that \$41,874,000 be appropriated for Indian education and welfare services for the year beginning July 1.

This is the amount budgeted by President Eisenhower and an increase of \$4,614,332 over the amount appropriated for the year ending June 30.

In its report to the House, the committee said the increase would permit the Indian Bureau to place an additional 5,100 Indian children in school, provide foster home care for an additional 388 and relocate an additional 2,500 off reservations.

"It is anticipated that substantially all Indian children in the continental United States who are eligible and willing to avail themselves of schooling will be in school during the 1955 fiscal year," the committee said.

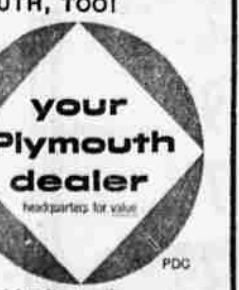
