

Much Expected Of Marion And White Sox

TAMPA (AP) — The new American League manager who probably is in the hottest seat this spring is the former great shortstop Marty Marion. He is taking over a club, the Chicago White Sox, which figures to be a contender and will be liked by some of the experts to beat out Cleveland and the New York Yankees.

Marty has had two previous shots at a managerial job, with the St. Louis Cardinals and St. Louis Browns, but this is his first good team. He will be marked for criticism if the Sox do not do at least as well as they did under Paul Richards last season.

He says he is fully aware of this. We asked him what he felt he had picked up in the skills of handling a club.

"If you mean in handling a team during a game, nothing," he said. "You learn all that when you're a player. That is, if you're a good one and normally intelligent. Of course, you're approaching it from a different angle as a manager, and it's a job to learn to make the decisions, just like any other job. But the most important thing about managing a ball club is in knowing how to handle the individual players, to get the most out of each man on your roster. I'm thankful that I had last season as a coach under

Paul Richards, because I think I learned a whole lot by watching the tact with which he handled certain situations.

"I don't have too many personnel problems with this team, because it has a nucleus of hard-playing veterans who love the game and are going to give you all they've got every day—men like Minnie Minoso, Jim Rivera and Nellie Fox. If you had a whole team made up of men like that, you couldn't help being a good manager. Fox nearly went crazy when Richards kept him on the bench just one day last summer to give him some rest.

"But, unfortunately, they're not all like that. They even vary from day to day. They've got their problems, or think they have. Some days they feel like show-boating, making every play look beautiful, when all you want them to do is make the play. It's the manager's job to handle each case individually."

New Look Expected In PCL This Year

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Pacific Coast League opens its season a fortnight hence and the word from the front office is: Even with programs fans are going to have a hard time identifying the baseball players.

That is not to say there have been any more changes than usual in the personnel of the eight teams.

What Claire Goodwin, the league's new president, means is: His new hustle program is designed to make such a difference in players' attitudes and performance that even the old faithful in the circuit will be barely recognizable.

Backed With Cash
The program is not just a headquarters' edict. It's backed up with cash prizes, and if there's anything a baseball player enjoys more than money it hasn't been discovered, as many a waitress and bellboy will testify.

Goodwin has arranged with a soft drink concern to put up \$20,000 which will be doled out for various categories of hustling. Even managers are eligible, with \$2,500 set aside for the pilot who puts on the best season-long performance of zip and drive.

The aim of the league, which Goodwin, a former grocery chain executive, took over when Clarence (Pants) Rowland returned to the Chicago Cubs a few weeks ago, is to provide better baseball.

Fans have been dwindling at most parks around the circuit, which stretches from San Diego to Seattle. The threat of major league baseball eventually moving in also hangs over the area.

"It's my opinion that we can get fans back into our parks if we speed up the games," said Goodwin. "And I think we can best do that by awarding prizes to the players who show the most hustle. That's why we're inaugurating the program."

United States Taking Aim At 3 Pan-Am Swim Titles

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The United States took dead aim at three more swimming championships in the Pan-American Games today, and in the case of diving queen Patricia McCormick, of California, the old story of sticking by the champion still held good.

The 26-year-old Pasadena artist captured the three-meter springboard crown and led the United States to a sweep of the first three places in the event yesterday.

On tap late this afternoon in the

National University's ornate Olympic stadium were gold medal finals in the 400-meter freestyle and 100-meter backstroke for men, and the 100-meter freestyle for women.

Basketball, baseball, water polo and other sports continued today.

The U.S. women's basketball team, led by Lurline Mealhouse and Ruth Cannon, each with 19 points, whipped Chile 62-43 and won the Pan-American championship.

The United States has only to defeat winless Venezuela tonight to annex the men's basketball title, thanks to an upset victory by Brazil over Mexico last night 65-59.

The U.S. over-all unofficial scoring continued to soar. The count for the top teams today stood: United States 1,081 1/2, Argentina 467 1/2, Mexico 296 1/2.

Queen Patricia of the diving ranks won the three-meter title with a total of 142.43 points. Pressing her closely all the way through the 10-diver schedule were Jeanne Stunyo, a Detroit University freshman from Gary, Ind., and Emily Houghton, from Purdue University at Lafayette, Ind.

Jeanne scored 137.41 points and Emily 133.12.

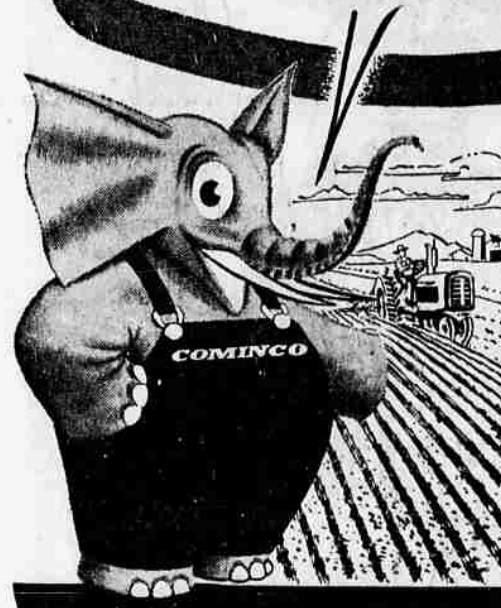

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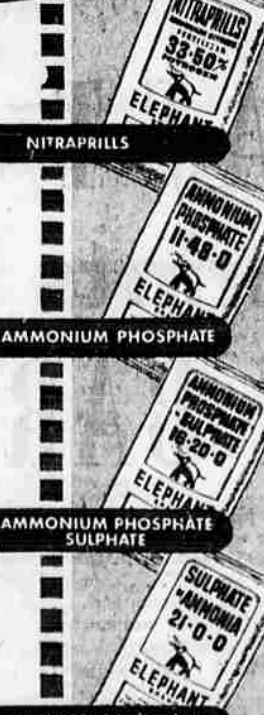
