

Camp Tsiltcoos Open House Set Sunday Afternoon

An open house will be held Sunday at Camp Tsiltcoos on the Douglas-Lane border near the coast, according to Walt Smith, executive for the Douglas Fir District of Boy Scouts.

The new camp of the Oregon Trail Council will be open from 2 to 7:30 p.m. to anyone wishing to see the work accomplished and the plans for further camp construction.

The council is trying to raise an additional \$50,000 this year to finish essential buildings and purchase more equipment, according to John Todd of Roseburg, council vice president and camp development chairman. The camp is now about two-thirds complete.

He and other Scout leaders have invited Sunday excursionists to drop by the camp during the open house hours. A free dinner will be served at 5 p.m. Anyone wishing transportation may contact Jack McGuire, district finance chairman, or Bill Forrest, camp fund chairman.

Smith pointed out that the camp, located on a peninsula jutting into Siltcoos Lake, will be open for eight weeks of scout camping this summer, with about 300 boys there all the time. Already, one or more troops have made reservations for each week.

A "good turn" weekend is planned April 16-17 at which time volunteer workers will go to the camp to work on various projects. The primary project for the local district is to build a rifle range.

Tension Grips Town In Advance Of School Vote

IRVING, Tex. (AP) — Tension gripped this small residential town Friday on the eve of an election that will decide the fate of the strife-torn Irving Independent School District.

Classes will continue regardless of the outcome of the election. Should voters vote to abolish the district it would be a victory for backers of deposed School Supt. John L. Beard, 53.

Beard was fired by the school board last month for what it termed failure to cooperate. Within a few days nearly 200 teachers and other school employees left their jobs in protest. They said there was no proper explanation of Beard's dismissal and that their jobs had grown "intolerable."

The school board retaliated quickly by firing nine executives of the school system, including the principals of seven schools. It warned the teachers and employees to come back to work or be dismissed. The "strikers" stayed away from the schools. Parents and volunteers kept classes going until new people were hired.

But persons backing Beard petitioned County Judge Lew Sterrett of Dallas to call an election to decide whether to abolish the school district. If it carries, the school board will be dissolved. The Beard faction says another election would be called immediately to "recreate" the district and elect another board.

New Plywood Corporation Stock Cleared For Sale

will continue to operate it until sales of shares have reached one million dollars.

Shares of the common stock will sell for \$5.00 each. A total 350 shares will be sold, and no stockholder will be allowed to buy more than one share. Money from sales will be placed in escrow at the Myrtle Creek bank until the million dollar figure has been reached. Operation will begin when the million dollars are in escrow.

Buckner said he for starting operation will depend on response to the sale of shares.

Another development announced was the retirement of Ren D. Sims, president of the new corporation. He told Mrs. Evans: "After viewing the immense amount of work and time required by officers and members of the board to make the venture a success, it shied too much conflict with my daily operation here. I just don't have the time to devote to the project which it deserves."

Buckner, whose resignation must still be approved by Umpqua Plywood Corp., says the new cooperative anticipates paying \$3 per hour when the plant starts.

Another Umpqua Plywood Corp. official has also decided to throw his lot with the new company. The former assistant manager, William DeWitt, is a new member of the Myrtle Creek Plywood Co. board of directors.

DeWitt told Mrs. Evans that some 165 men are now working in the Umpqua Plywood sawmill. He said that shipments this month and next are being increased by a third to move inventories of the Umpqua Plywood Corp. He said the logging operation was employing about 150 men. These men, he said, will probably be absorbed by the Umpqua Plywood Tiller operation, which will continue under Umpqua Plywood management.

Although Umpqua Plywood is virtually defunct in the Myrtle Creek area technically, it will continue to operate the plant until Myrtle Creek Plywood takes over.

"at such price as it might take to move these commodities."

But the agency has no sales policy or sales program "worthy of the name," it added.

It directed the CCG to get a sales manager at once and to develop a program under which surplus commodities will be sold for the best price the government can get.

The committee directed the CCG to reduce its storage costs at least 20 per cent during the coming year, eventually holding only one year's security reserve. The surplus held by the CCG were acquired under price support laws adopted by Congress. Benson has contended that past price support laws were unrealistic and encouraged surplus production.

The committee ordered restored a cut proposed by the administration of \$18,359,447 in "action" programs, which include disease and pest control, soil conservation operations, flood prevention, and the school lunch program.

It approved lending authority of \$60 million dollars as requested for the Rural Electrification Administration and 75 millions for rural telephone installations. The Farmers Home Administration was given 153 millions, a budget boost of 11 million, in loan authorization. It increased by \$5,206,379 the budget for the soil conservation service.

ly voted for the 10 per cent boost, explaining they did so reluctantly only after the administration proposal had been killed.

Democrats declared they were "tired" of attempted dictation from the executive branch, and insisted the Senate should pass what it believed to be right.

The bill passed by the Senate would give each employee at least a 10 per cent increase in pay, but would mean more for those receiving less than \$4,000 a year since it has a \$400 floor.

Republican Leader Knowland (R-Calif.) predicted President Eisenhower would not sign the 10 per cent increase if it ever reached his desk. Knowland appealed to the Senate to approve a measure which would not be an "empty gesture that will not become the law of the land."

Eisenhower himself has said that he viewed with "grave apprehension" any bill going beyond the

Second Man's Arrest Clears 29 Burglaries

both men are "of Negro race and economic and social conditions of this county (Lane) made it onerous for (them) to carry out the strict terms of their probation."

The best interest of society as well as of the two men involved will be served by termination of their probation."

Bunch said the two were under suspicion during the probation time. Though they were arrested several times, he said, no evidence was produced to hold them.

After their probation was terminated a week ago Monday, the two returned to Lane County. The failure of the district attorney's and sheriff's offices in Lane County to press extradition came despite a bench warrant signed by Circuit Judge William G. Eas ordering the pair into court to show cause why their probation should not be revoked.

They were in technical violation of probation conditions by leaving Lane County's area of jurisdiction, authorities say.

Lovell said the Lane County enforcement officers' failure to follow up the case stemmed from lack of cash budgeted to carry through extradition proceedings. Later, Lovell's superior officer, H. M. Randall of Salem, when interviewed by telephone by The News-Review, said this condition existed throughout the state.

Without clearcut evidence proving crime committed by the pair, he said, extradition may have appeared unsound from an economic standpoint.

Bunch said the most netted from the burglaries in Eugene was between \$250 and \$300 worth of clothing taken from a cleaning establishment.

Locally, the most taken was about \$150 at the Beaver Food Service, according to Police Chief Stan Olson.

Though Roseburg police questioned Ross extensively after his arrest, they were unable to obtain any information from him. Later, Medford police obtained a confession from him that he had been involved in the Roseburg and Medford burglaries.

The uplift that Ross was headed for Roseburg came from Medford police, who had investigated the theft of \$120 from a Medford restaurant early Wednesday morning.

Barcus Remodels Sales, Service Quarters Here

Complete remodeling and construction of major additions to Barcus Sales and Service, 1900 N. Stephens St., Roseburg, is now underway.

While the work is going on the firm will remain open, according to R. R. (Bud) Parsons, one of the owners. Entrance may be made at the rear of the present old building, he said. The remodeling is being done by S. Perche Construction Co., Roseburg.

It is the first major reconstruction by the firm which has been at its present location for seven years. The construction is expected to be finished within 45 days.
