Heart Condition Cuts Archie Moore's Hopes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Light-heavyweight champion Archie Moore won't be permitted to fight in California because of a heart condition, three California athletic commissioners have ruled.

Dr. James H. Ryan and Dr. Winston Hall of San Diego, after examining Moore, said that "The exertion of training and boxing would be inadvisable and dangerous."

Moore is 38, two years above the age limit in California, but he held special approval for a recent fight against Frankie Daniels in San Diego.

Clayton Frye, chief inspector for the California Athletic Commission, said that commissioners and Tony Entenza, Norman Houston and Dr. Dan Kilroy had voted to deny Moore a license to box in this state, which might mean that he couldn't get a license anywhere else.

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Lodgemen Trip Fairhaven Team, Take Industrial League Crown

The combination of six straight wins by Moose lodge during the past four weeks and three last-week defeats for Fairhaven Market gave Moose the second-half YMCA Industrial League championship and the 1955 city basketball title as well.

Thursday night, the Moosemen closed the season appropriately enough by beating Fairhaven in a come-from-behind 45-38 win for a clear-cut title.

In last Tuesday night's play, National Guard accorded the mark-

etsmen a 46-36 surprise lacing to shove the losers out of first place.

Then league officials handed Fairhaven an additional league defeat by counting an earlier Glide tournament game in the standings.

This last action referred to the Glide Invitational Tournament two weeks ago when Umpqua Plywood beat the marketmen 84-57 in a first-round game at that tourney.

There was no indication at that time that it would count as a league game, but officials evidently had decided on this course.

The three-pronged setback cost Fairhaven at least a tie for the second-half title and a chance at a playoff with Moose, the first-half champs, for the city title. It dropped the marketmen into third place in the final standings behind Umpqua Plywood.

The Guard trounced Pacific Plywood 36-22 while Associated was taking motionless 2-0 forfeit win from Sutherland Drive-In Market.

In winning, the strong Guard throttled Pacific in the second half, breaking a 12-12 halftime deadlock. The winners outscored their rivals 5-1 in the third quarter and 19-9 in the final canto.

Guardman Ken Davidson led scoring with 13 markers, nine of them in the final period.

Moose finished strong to overtake Fairhaven and avoid a possible first place deadlock.

The first two periods ended with Fairhaven on top 12-4 and 17-12.

In the third chapter Moose caught up and went ahead to stay with a period ending 23-22 margin. The fourth chapter proved to be the deciding when the winners outscored Fairhaven 22-14 with five men pounding the hoop.

Ralph Rudzik and Bob Schindler each got six points, Bob Stout and Don Hubbard each tallied four points and Frank Weber got two in the final period assault.

For the game, Stout and Russell of the losers finished with 13 apiece.

Jay Eaton Boosts Micro-Midget Race Lead Over Graves
