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Oregon Senate Votes To Transfer Prison Inmates

SALEM, Ore. — The Oregon Senate voted Saturday to permit transfer of Oregon penitentiary inmates to federal prisons or county jails, or to other state penitentiaries.

The vote on the bill, which goes to the House, was 23 to 5. All five opposing votes were cast by Democrats.

The bill would let the State Board of Control make agreements with the federal government, counties or other states to accept Oregon convicts.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden, who sponsored the bill, said it would allow him to transfer his toughest prisoners to Alcatraz. It also would permit him to transfer some prisoners, whose lives are threatened by other convicts, to county jails.

Last year, the warden transferred Donald Bailey, whom the warden accused of being the ring leader in a prison rebellion, to the Multnomah County and Douglas County jails. This transfer was questioned in court, although no final decision was rendered.

Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon, said the bill would allow the warden to get rid of his worst prisoners, but he said the most important feature is that "it would allow the moving of weak prisoners to county jails for their own protection, so that the warden wouldn't have to put them in segregation."

Gill said most states have similar laws.

She will be the speaker at a noon luncheon at the First Baptist Church in Roseburg Tuesday. That night, she will speak at an all-church meeting at 7:30.

Miss Gahs attended school in Bloomfield, N. J., Adelphi College in Garden City, N. Y., Mills College of New York City and Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pa. She received her masters degree in religious education in 1947 in Philadelphia.

She has served since as a director of children's work, pastors' assistance and now as a general missionary for the Los Angeles Missionary Society.

On Wednesday, the Rev. Glenn Hill of Bengal, Illrissa, India, will speak at a noon luncheon and at the mid-week service emphasizing youth night at 7:30.

The Rev. Mr. Hill is a missionary under appointment by the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society. The Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Hill first sailed to Bombay, India, in 1949. He now has charge of the general board work.

9 Convicts Revolt, Guards Held Hostages

Eugene Swanson, 34, and held themselves up in the building. Prison authorities were told that any attempt to rush the building or use tear gas would bring death to the guards.

With escape almost out of the question for the convicts, prison authorities and the governor sat tight, waiting for the rebels to make the next move.

Work details for prisoners not involved in the revolt were cancelled Monday morning. Warden Herbert Han made the announcement over the prison's inter-communication system.

No Radio, No Food
At about the same time, power was shut off from the prison "jail" in order to deprive the rebels of their radio and keep them from knowing every move the prison officials were making.

The rebels and captive guards apparently hadn't eaten since breakfast Sunday.

Gov. Anderson said the convicts were believed to have "some kind of homemade knives" but apparently had no guns. The guards were not armed when captured Sunday.

The 12 convicts involved included nine with previous records of escape or attempted escape. One was awaiting transfer to a state mental hospital as a psychotic.

Speed Reading Class Offered Roseburg Adults

Business and professional people in the county are finding it necessary to read more and more to keep abreast of their businesses.

For some, the list of reading matter has reached such gigantic proportions they feel they can't keep up with it. So, the Roseburg Adult Education program has come up with an answer in a new course it is offering this year.

It is called Speed Reading. Richard Gates is the instructor. He explains that the purpose of the course is to increase the speed of reading, while still retaining the comprehension of slower reading.

He said normally people can double their reading speed and the amount they can read in a given time through such a course. He said the principal is to make phrase readers instead of "word" readers, thus increasing speeds.

The course will run for nine weeks. It is held every Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the adult Education Office in Roseburg Senior High School.

Gates said while the reading was being speeded up, the course would make it possible to at least hold their present retentive power or increase it.

Mother's Frown Stoops Pipe-Smoking Daughter

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—A pretty 22-year-old nurse saw her plans for representing Michigan at the international pipe-puffing contest go up in smoke today. Her mother disapproves.

Kay Kelley, a nurse at Hurley Hospital in Flint, doubtlessly would have been tabbed as a favorite at the contest in Schenectady, N.Y. She won the Michigan championship Saturday night, outpuffing Mrs. Robert Rudl, of Flint, last year's international champ.

Mrs. Kelley kept her pipe going for 35 minutes 10 seconds on the regulation 3.3 grams of tobacco. It was her first try at pipe smoking too.

"But Mother won't let me go to the contest in New York," she said. "In fact, she's simply shocked by the whole affair. She doesn't even approve of smoking, let alone pipe smoking for girls."
