Silent Witnesses Each Fined \$250

SEATTLE (AP) — Carl H. Jackins and George T. Starkovich, who refused to answer questions put to them by the House un-American activities subcommittee last June, Friday have been fined \$250 each and were sentenced to six months in jail.

The jail sentence of Jackins, 38, was suspended by U.S. District Judge George H. Boldt and Jackins was placed on probation for two years.

In refusing to place Starkovich on probation, Judge Boldt said he would have made the fine for the 32-year-old Starkovich much higher, "but it would come from a lot of innocent people who are being duped into believing this Communist propaganda."

Attorneys for both men said they would appeal.

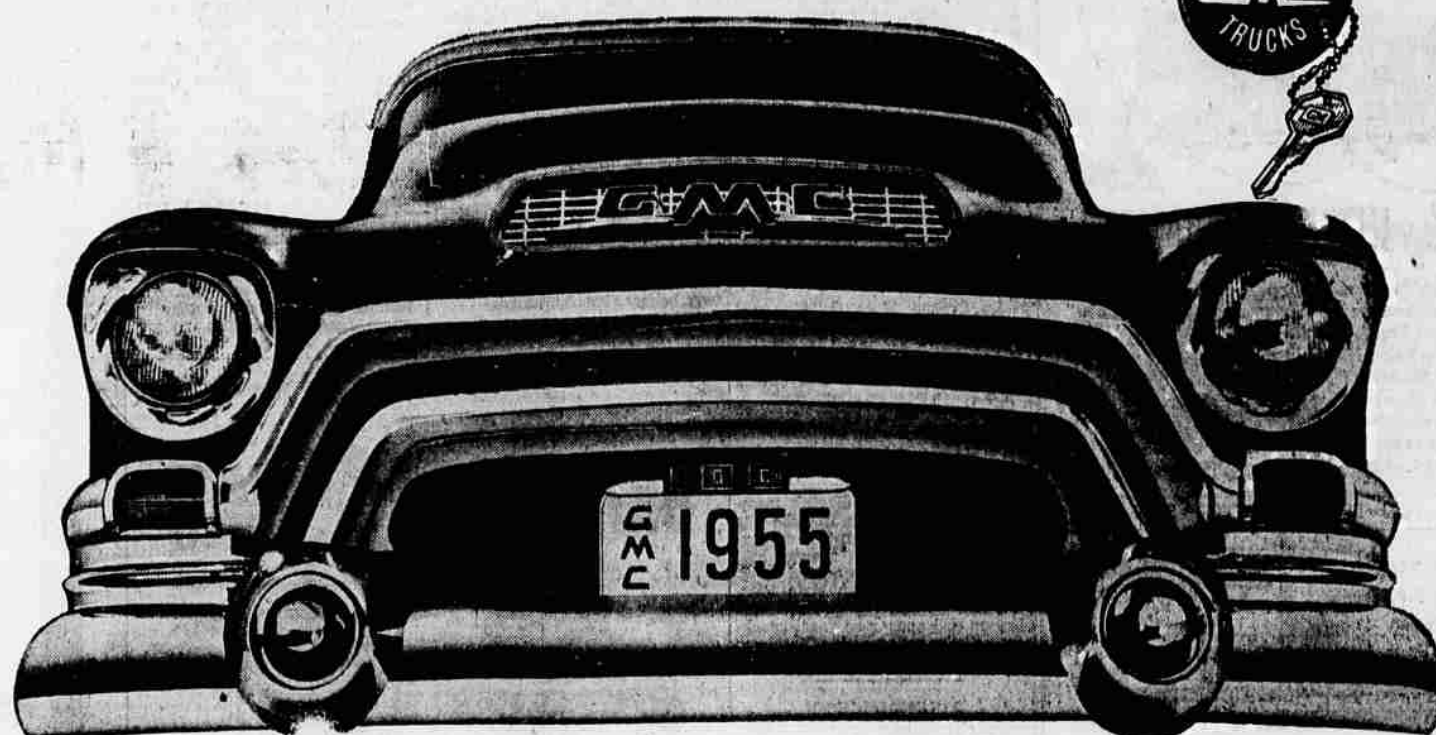
