

Coast Ball To Be The Best, Says New PCL President

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Claire Goodwin, new president of the Pacific Coast League, said Wednesday he is convinced baseball on the West Coast this year will be sensational.

Goodwin, a grocery chain executive, recently took over administration of the league with the departure of Clarence (Pants) Rowland to the Chicago Cubs.

He based his prediction on the "hustle for pay" program he introduced in spring training.

"I visited every training camp," Goodwin said as the eight league teams prepared for next Tuesday's opening games, "and told the players that hustle was the key word in our league this season."

"I pointed out that if they hustle they'll be paid for it from our \$20,000 Hustle Fund and that hustling actually was a part of baseball, anyway, a standard thing in baseball language."

"And I told them, too, that if they get out there every day and make this league the hustlingest one in baseball that in years to come their children can boast 'My daddy played in the Pacific Coast League' and how proud that'll make them feel."

Hustle, as defined by Goodwin, means to "work with tireless energy," and that, he says, is what everyone ought to do, particularly baseball players.

The \$20,000 fund, donated by a soft drink bottling company, will be paid out for various categories of hustle throughout the season. There will be monthly awards of \$200 each for players plus \$1,500 each month to the club which demonstrates its desire best. When play ends next fall, \$2,500 each will go to the hustlingest player, umpire and managerial staff of the year.

Bobby Shantz Hit By Batted Liner

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The bad luck that dogged Bobby Shantz in Philadelphia may be following him to Kansas City.

Shantz, the American League's leading pitcher in 1952, started his first exhibition baseball game for the Kansas City Athletics Tuesday.

In the second inning the little left-hander was carried off the field after being struck by a ball. A line drive off the bat of Pittsburgh outfielder Earl Smith hit Shantz just over his left ear. The ball was partly deflected by his glove, thus possibly preventing a skull fracture. The injury was not believed to be serious.

X-rays showed no fracture but he was kept in the hospital overnight for observation.

Last season with the old Philadelphia Athletics, Shantz injured his arm on opening day. He pitched in only two games all season, winding up with a 1-0 record.

The previous year he also was bothered on and off with arm trouble, winning five games and losing nine.

These two bad years followed two seasons of excellent pitching. Bobby turned in a 18-10 record in 1951 and a 24-7 mark in 1952.

Ft. Ord Warriors Pound Bevos, 12-6

The Seattle Rainiers used Hollywood pitching to sharpen their batting Tuesday as they romped to a 10-5 Pacific Coast League exhibition game victory over the Stars.

Big George Schmees set the pace for the Rainiers, getting 5-for-5.

Things went the other way for the Portland Beavers. The Ft. Ord, Calif., Warriors exploded in the fourth to pound the Beavers 12-6. The soldiers scored six runs on nine hits in that inning.

Portland had a 5-0 lead when the trouble began. What's more, two were out and none on. Among the damaging fourth inning hits were three homers.

All told, Ft. Ord picked up 22 hits and had 16 runners left on base. Twelve of the hits, and six earned runs, were charged against pitcher Wally Hood.

San Francisco, meanwhile, took a home-run slugfest from Sacramento, 12-11. Six roundtrippers were belted in the game.

Oakland shut out Stockton of the California League, 5-0. Joe Brovia led the Oaks with a triple in the eighth.

Los Angeles whipped the Camp Pendleton Marines, 15-2, with the aid of newcomers from the Chicago Cubs, Don Elston, Bob Talbot and Don Robertson.

In other PCL news: Portland announced the release of outfielder Fletcher Robbe.

The Washington Senators optioned first baseman Julio Becquer, a 23-year-old Cuban who played with Havana in the International League last year, to San Diego.

Ted Lyons, former White Sox pitcher elected to the Hall of Fame, never played in the minors. He jumped right from the campus of Baylor to the Chicago team.

Boxers Juggled In Ratings By Magazine

NEW YORK (AP) — Increased activity among the top flight boxers have accounted for a host of changes in the April boxing ratings of the Ring Magazine, released Wednesday.

The ratings advance Tommy Jackson of Far Rockaway, N.Y., who is on a winning streak, from sixth to fifth place in the heavy-weight division. Earl Walls of Canada, on his draw with James J. Parker of Paterson, N.J., has dropped from fifth to sixth.

Jimmy Slade of New York has been eliminated from the top ten. Charley Norkus of Jersey City, N.J., who was ninth last month, is No. 10, while Parker was upped to ninth.

Nino Valdes of Cuba remains the leading challenger to Rocky Marciano's throne, although second-ranked Don Cockell of England, will get a title shot at the Brockton, Mass., champion May 16.

Willi Hoepner of Germany, who knocked out Gerhard Hecht to win the European light heavyweight crown, has jumped from ninth to fourth in this class. Paul Andrews of Buffalo, N.Y., has dropped a notch to sixth and Boardwalk Billy Smith of Atlantic City, N.J., fell one spot to eighth. Bob Satterfield of Chicago has moved up to seventh.

In the middleweight division, Fierbio Miti of Italy, Willie Troy of Washington and Bobby Jones of Oakland, Calif., have dropped out of the first ten. They have been replaced by Edward Lausse of Argentina, Johnny Sullivan of England and Bobby Dykes of Miami.

Former welterweight king, Kid Gavilan of Cuba, slipped to eighth after losing to Dykes. Ramon Fuentes of Los Angeles has advanced from fifth to fourth and Del Flanagan of St. Paul, Minn., victor over

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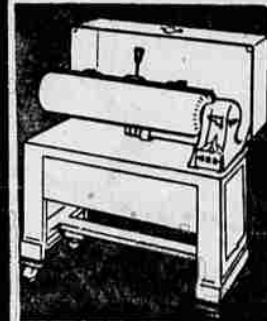
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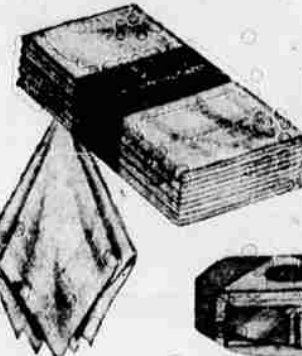
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
