A's Shell Out For 3 Yankees

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The Kansas City Athletics have shelled out around \$50,000 to the New York Yankees in the A's first major financial move to improve their cellar-dwelling status. For their money they got pitcher Tom Gorman and pinch hitter Blackwell, and first baseman Dick Kryhoski, with Gorman key man in the straight cash deal Wednesday.

Only possible catch is both pitchers have been bothered with sore arms. Gorman, however, is expected to fill an important role among the relief pitchers — something the A's have been looking for.

Owner Arnold Johnson has said he had a million dollars to spend on improving the club, which finished at the bottom of the American League under a Philadelphia banner last season. But until Wednesday price tags on major league talent apparently had been too high.

The exact price for the three was not disclosed but it was reported "in excess of \$50,000."

Blackwell, who had his greatest season in 1947 while with the Cincinnati Reds, admitted to a gamble. He's 32 and has been bothered with arm trouble for some time. He went on the Yanks' voluntary retired list last year and had been at odds with them over his retirement status.

GAMES ON TELEVISION

PORTLAND (AP) — Station KOIN-TV will televise Saturday an exhibition baseball game between the New York Giants and the Cleveland Indians in Dallas, Tex. Game time is 11:30 a. m.

Code For Uniform Racing Progresses

The most recent move to unite hardtop racing associations in Oregon with uniform car specifications took a positive step today when an official constitution was drawn up by a Roseburg attorney.

These articles of incorporation, as they are called, will be open to observation when representatives from nine Oregon racing associations gather here in three weeks.

A state-wide board of directors will also be selected at that time. Roseburg resident Larry Newport, instigator of the current

move for organization and uniformity among the associations, will serve as executive secretary. The former secretary-treasurer of the Pacific Racing Assn. in Roseburg recently completed a two-month swing through Oregon cities for talks with racing officials there.

He contacted and received the support of officials from St. Helens, Hillsboro, Tillamook, Eugene, Coos Bay, Medford, Klamath Falls, Prineville and Roseburg.

As Newport explains, "the purpose of this move is to establish uniform car specifications and track regulations for racing throughout the state."

"We have to get together," he maintains, "and provide intercity competition if our sport is to grow. . . . We've got to have new blood all the time."

The only major association which Newport was unable to contact was Portland. But plans for approaching this group are in the making, he says.

The new constitution, when accepted, will not apply for this year's racing. Most associations had already drawn up their individual specifications and regulations before the current program was undertaken.

Handling the legal work is local attorney Daniel P. Keohane, who has handled similar activity for the Roseburg Speedway and the Pacific Racing Assn.

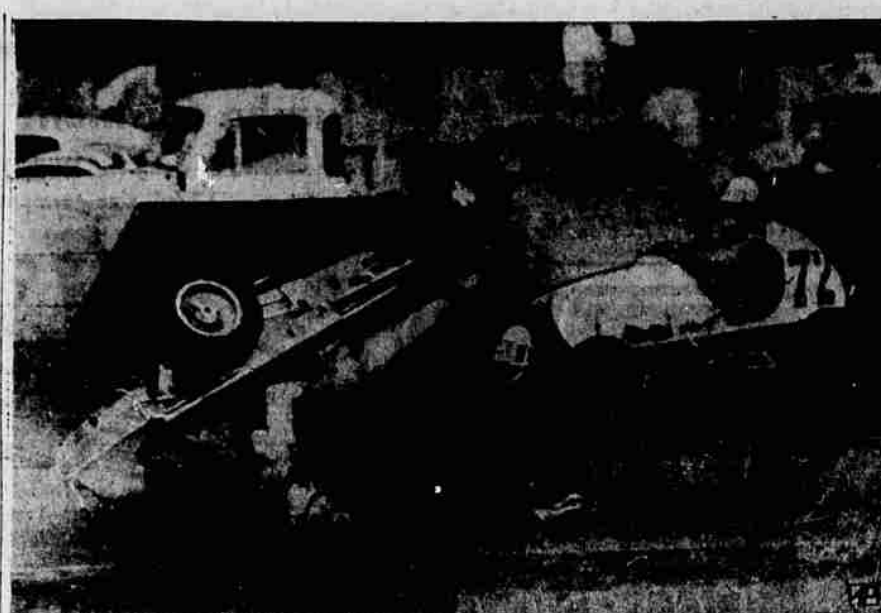
Eight Junior Collegians Transfer To University

IRISH NAME COACH

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Notre Dame's football coaching staff has been completed for the 1955 season with the naming of Jack Landry, former Irish fullback, as freshman coach.

Landry, 29, played on Notre Dame's 1948-50 teams and succeeds Frank (Blacky) Johnston, who resigned to become line coach at the University of South Carolina.

The Irish opened spring drills Wednesday. Coach Terry Brennan looked over 81 candidates, including 17 lettermen.

Racing Measure Now In House

SALEM (AP) — Anticipating that the courts might rule against it, in a case now on file, the State Racing Commission introduced a bill in the House Wednesday to include reasons why the commission could use to deny dog or horse racing meet licenses.

The commission is afraid that Circuit Judge Val Sloper, Salem, may rule that the commission had no right to refuse a dog racing license for Eugene interests. The commission, with legislative lawyers agreeing, thinks the present law is unconstitutional because it doesn't set up any reasons for denial of a license.

The new bill would include these reasons for denying licenses: If the applicant has made false statements, if he is not of good repute or character, if he hasn't a good record of compliance with racing laws of any state, if he doesn't have financial responsibility, if he isn't the legitimate owner of the enterprise to be licensed, if he isn't a citizen, if the corporation is controlled by a person who has been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude.

The license also could be denied if the public interest or convenience doesn't demand it, or if it isn't in the best interest of the safety, welfare, health, peace and morals of the state.

The present law lets the commission deny licenses, but it does not set up any yardstick for such denial.

Rainiers Buy Hollywood's Infielder Monte Basgall

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — The Seattle Rainiers, seeking to bolster their infield and solve a second-base problem, acquired Monte Basgall Tuesday from the Hollywood Stars in a straight cash deal. The amount was not disclosed.

Basgall, 32, has been the regular Hollywood second sacker for the past three Pacific Coast League seasons. He hit .252 in 145 games for the Stars last year.

Manager Fred Hutchinson said he had not been too satisfied with the work of last season's Rainier second baseman, Jack Bukowats, a graduate from Salem of the old Western International League, or with Marv Williams, signed during the winter.

The 18-year-old Toronto miss was scheduled to enter the water for the 22-mile swim to Port Angeles, Wash., at 4 a. m. Thursday. But after a check with the Weather Bureau late Wednesday night, officials announced the second postponement and said they did not know when another attempt will be made.
