

Marilyn Monroe Draws Tumultuous Circus Applause

NEW YORK (AP) — The band fans held their breath. Then they stopped playing at Madison Square Garden last night and 18,000 circus exploded into tumultuous applause. It was not a tight-rope artist or

a smart equestrienne that stole the show in the 1955 circus opening Wednesday.

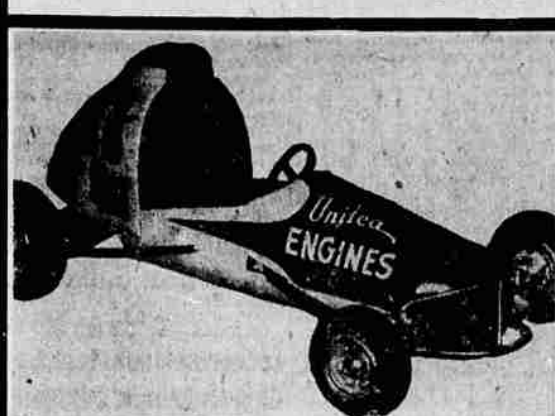
Movie queen Marilyn Monroe rode onto the sawdust arena on top of a huge elephant, painted bright pink for the occasion. She wore a specially designed black and white leotard (a form-fitting circus costume) and black net stockings, and blew kisses left and right.

The cavernous Garden, with its maze of ropes and guy wires suspended from the rafters, nearly shook from the ovation.

Then the band picked up again and the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey "greatest show on earth" went on.

year was the "dream circus," produced by showman Mike Todd for the benefit of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation.

It featured comedian Milton Berle as the ringmaster and a number of other television and film greats, led by blonde Miss Monroe on her pink elephant.

A procession of multicolored floats and glittering costumes portrayed "Celestial Calendar Cavalade."

Notable among them was "Halloween," with actress Martha Raye riding on top of a pumpkin float. Following the float was the quintet of Charles Addams cartoon personalities, led by the eerie "Vampira."

Artificial snow fell on the sawdust as the "Christmas" float paraded with blonde ice queen Sonja Henie sitting on a mass of white fur.

But all the regular circus stunts, some of them "for the first time in this country," were there too.

Grape Cooperative To Buy Plants For Wine Making

WESTFIELD, N. Y. (AP) — An official of the National Grape Cooperative Assn. said Thursday that the association expected to purchase 10 plants of the Welch Grape Juice Co. by August of next year.

George Lamb, treasurer of the grower's cooperative and a vice president of Welch, said purchase of Welch's assets would be completed far ahead of schedule.

The purchase contract was signed in June 1952 with the idea it would take the growers 10 years. Under the plan, unique in American industry, the growers will own the company they now supply and thus will share its profits. This will be in addition to the profits the growers derive from their crops.

Under the plan, the members of the cooperative accept allocation certificates as part payment for their grapes delivered to Welch. When the total value of the certificates, which are based on grape tonnage handled, reaches 15 million dollars, the cooperative gets the Welch plants.

Welch profits additionally under the plan by receiving one per cent of net values for 10 years after the purchase in return for use of the Welch name and trade marks.

A huge increase in the number of members of the cooperative followed creation of the plan, Lamb said. This led to a jump in the tonnage handled by Welch, a corresponding increase in the company's sales and also in allocation certificates to the growers.

Mrs. Brockway is a former Roseburg resident. She moved to California before coming back to Douglas County two months ago. She is a seamstress and plans to make wedding gowns and formal on special order.

Mrs. Christie has been in Riddle for two years. She is originally from Vancouver, Wash.

Special opening day values are planned by the owners. The store is located in the theater building on Main Street.

Legislature Can Control Trains Outside Portland

SALEM (AP) — The Legislature has the exclusive right to regulate the speed of trains in all Oregon cities except Portland, the Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The decision tossed out a 1929 Salem city ordinance fixing train speed limits in that city.

The suit was brought by the Southern Pacific Railroad against Consolidated Freightways, a truck line.

The railroad had recovered a \$665 judgment for damages to a locomotive which struck one of the Consolidated trucks at 12th and State Streets in Salem.

The truck company said the railroad was operating at a speed in excess of that allowed by the city ordinance.

The court decision allows the railroad to collect the damages, since the city ordinance is invalid.

Inasmuch as the public utilities commissioner hasn't set limits within Salem, the court ruled there are no limits.

The decision, by Chief Justice Harold J. Warner, upheld Circuit Judge Martin W. Hawkins of Multnomah County.

GOOD REPORT — WASHINGTON

Chairman Ralph H. Demmler of the Security and Exchange Commission, the agency which polices market activity, gives the nation's brokers a good report card as he testifies before the Senate Banking Committee.
