Daro Handy Cops Title In Oregon Postal Loop Shoot

Cottage Grove Bowmen walked off with the most of the top places in second half competition of the recently concluded first annual Roseburg Archers.

In a close race for the junior title, two Portland teams edged the Roseburg Archers' entry. Merry Bowmen of Wilkes No. 1 totaled 13,217, and the No. 2 team totaled 11,304. The Roseburg team had 10,764.

Daro Handy of the Roseburg team, however, topped top individual honors for the juniors with a 682 average.

Other individual champions were Bill DeSalles of the Merry Bowmen with a 681 instinctive average and Dorothy Whitmore of Merry Bowmen with a 684 for the women's eight title.

Second place in the adult team scoring was taken by Merry Bowmen No. 1 with 14,333.

The seven other participating teams finished behind in these positions: Merry Bowmen No. 2, 12,958; Kokeel Archers, 12,553; Cottage Grove Bowmen No. 2, 12,337; Benton Bowmen (incomplete); Merry Bowmen No. 3, 11,955; Roseburg Archers, 10,143; Sylvan Women, 11,633.

Roseburg scoring among the adults included Warren Langele, 582 average, and Stan Norris, 527 average, in men's sight scoring.

Earl Ulrich had a 557 average in men's instinctive; Kathryn Ulrich had a 529 and Betty Allen had a 432 for women's sight scoring.

Junior scoring included Jim Wells, 644; Charles Norris, 608; Roger Allen, 571; Larry Burr, 535; Tommy Clapp, 496.

First half champions were the Cottage Grove adults team and the Merry Bowmen women's and junior teams. There was no women's team scoring in the second half.

Ulrich of the Roseburg Archers and state archery president was in charge of the scoring.

Michigan, Indiana Show Up In ABC

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP)—Michigan and Indiana bowlers took the spotlight in Thursday's shooting in the American Bowling Congress tournament.

A Detroit team, led by Joe Morry, just missed taking the lead in the open division and moved into second place with 3,012, three pins behind the front ranking Howard Clothes of St. Paul, Minn.

The Motor City team posted games of 1,025, 1,006, and 851.

Morry's 718 series topped the Detroit Tool and Machine Co. team's total with games of 208, 288 and 222. His 288 was the highest single game in team competition in the tournament, and his series total was the second 700-plus since the tournament started last Saturday.

His 288 was the highest since change, the Copp Music Center team of South Bend, Ind., rolled into third place with a 2,959 score.

Bob Carteaux, who several weeks ago spilled an 823 series in the Fort Wayne Classic League, moved into third place in the all-events standing with a 1,895 count.

Carteaux, a southpaw, had a 626 in his team competition, and 612 in doubles and 627 in singles.

George Miller and Harry Vaughn of Fort Wayne moved into a tie for third in the doubles with a 1,233 count.

A change in the singles also resulted as Thomas Rebel of Ecorse, Mich., shot a 663 for eighth place.

The greenish colored cards expired March 31 and are to be turned into the game commission license agencies. Boxes have been provided to the license agencies for collection of the cards.

New cards, containing room for recording 40 fish in the aggregate, not more than 20 of which may be salmon, will be issued by the license agencies.

The purpose of the punch cards is to furnish information regarding the total catch of these fish and also to determine the number of fish taken from the various rivers of the state.

Sideliner

As useless and distasteful as they find prolonging the issue, Principal Harry Jacoby and Athletic Director Bob George of Roseburg found it politely necessary to remark briefly on remarks made by North Bend Principal Owen Price in the News-Review Tuesday. (Price's letter to the editor appeared on page 4 of that issue).

In his letter, the North Bend administrator took a stand, as could be expected, opposing those claims made by the local schoolmen.

THE WHOLE controversy arose after the two district schools had failed to agree on a football date for the 1955 season. The same conflict in schedules continues to brew, and a regularly scheduled game between them evidently will not be played next season.

Upon viewing Price's remarks, Jacoby observed that he did not wish to prolong the controversy any longer, but that he would fully support George in whatever action he took or whatever he had to say.

Earlier observation attributed to him that the schedule - making between the two schools had always been taken care of by the coaches and that schedule - making for Roseburg sports are left up to the individual coaches.

George did not withdraw a ny earlier statements that he had made. He willingly supported every previous statement.

If this is the case then the following observations on Price's letter can be made:

1. The North Bend schedule which appears in the letter did not include Myrtle Point at the District 5 meeting when it allegedly was drawn up. (The letter's schedule includes Myrtle Point as a previous North Bend commitment).

2. North Bend Coach Frank Akins (who has not been directly quoted in the issue) did agree at the district meeting to contact or be contacted by George on the open Oct. 14 date, after having agreed that it was still open for both schools. (The letter claims that "Frank Akins claims that he did not tell Bob George by telephone conversation that North Bend would change our football game with Roseburg from Oct. 21 to Oct. 14 after the district meeting".)

The fact of the matter is, it would seem, that a telephone conversation did take place. And the casual observer may inquire as to why such a conversation would have been necessary if the North Bend schedule had been drawn up with Myrtle Point commitments already on it?

Later in his letter - message, Price advises that "since Roseburg High School is a member of District 5 A-1, its obligation should be to honor the scheduled date with North Bend on Oct. 21, which is still being held for Roseburg." (For which there is no approved contract.)

Of course, since North Bend is a member of District 5 A-1, its obligation should be not to honor the "verbally - agreed" Oct. 14 date with Roseburg.

But then why should the right hand know what the left is doing even part of the time. . . . Not too many days ago there appeared in one of the Portland dailies sports pages an inquiry on the part of North Bend for some team to fill the open Oct. 21 date on its schedule.

Of course, since the date is being "held" for Roseburg, this must have been an open invitation to the Indians. Or have the North Bend same-procurers again asserted their independence - from one another.

OREGON STATE College football coach Tommy Prothro upon viewing movies of 1954 Roseburg football games after Tuesday night's alumni dinner - meeting, called the Indians' Nub Beamer one of the best high school backs he has seen.

Prothro has taken to movie-watching in his travels around the state in an effort to estimate the talent that circulated last season - before Prothro's arrival in Oregon. It is said that first impressions were also made by backs Willard Reeve of North Bend and Mel Gillette of Prineville's 1953 team who is not yet in college.

PRO EDDIE OLDFIELD, a d amateur Marsh Smith, local men at the Oregon Open last weekend, finished well down the list and well up in par in the rough going. There was very little par-breaking among the field of 170. Oldfield had 305 for 72 holes and Smith had 325.

Move On To Cut Charges To Non-Resident Hunters

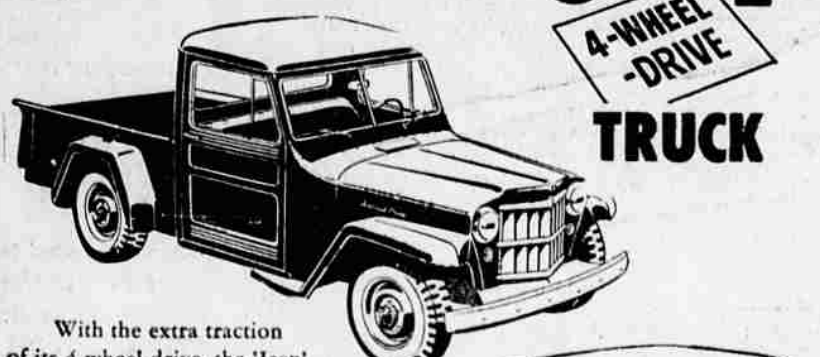
SALEM (AP) — A bill to reduce the non-resident hunting license from \$20 to \$10, for persons who come from states which give similar privileges to Oregon residents, was passed by the House Thursday and sent to the Senate.

It was sponsored by Speaker Ed Geary, Klamath Falls.

Geary said that if the Senate passes it, he will ask the California Legislature to adopt similar legislation.

That would make it possible for Oregon residents to hunt in California, and for California residents to hunt in Oregon, for a \$10 fee.
