

Nazarene Church Schedules Pair Of Conventions

A pair of state conventions are scheduled three days next month at the First Church of the Nazarene in Roseburg.

Starting Wednesday afternoon, April 13, will be the fifth annual Church Schools Convention of the Nazarene. It will last through the morning of April 14.

Quick on its heels Thursday afternoon, the 12th annual Nazarene Youth Peoples Society convention will start. It will last through Friday.

The conventions will be climaxed the evening of April 15 with a banquet at the Hotel Umqua.

Heading the list of convention speakers will be Dr. George Coulter, Santa Cruz, Calif., district superintendent of the Northern California District, Church of the Nazarene.

Two faces familiar to Roseburg will also figure prominently in the two conventions. The Rev. Robert Hempel, pastor of the Roseburg First Church of the Nazarene, will deliver the keynote address of the NPS convention. "Is the district NPS president. The Rev. Forrest Hill, former pastor in Roseburg, will be on hand as district church school chairman.

The Rev. Mr. Hill is now pastor at the Albany First Church of the Nazarene.

District Supt. W. D. McGraw Jr. of Clackamas will also take part in both conventions.

The Rev. Mr. Hempel, who is in charge of local arrangements, said he expects about 250 people will attend the conventions.

Noon Services For Holy Week Planned In City

A program of lunch-time services during special observance of Holy Week, prior to Easter, has been planned by the Roseburg Ministerial Assn.

Services will be held each day, Monday through Friday, at the First Presbyterian Church from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m., according to Rev. Newell Morgan, observance chairman and pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

A different minister will speak each day, each along the theme of "On our Road Toward the Cross." Other ministers will help conduct the programs.

The five speakers will be: Monday, Rev. Harry Hampton, associate pastor of the First Presbyterian Church; Tuesday, Father Alfred S. Tyson of St. George's Episcopal Church; Wednesday, Rev. Elsworth Tilton of the First Methodist Church; Thursday, Rev. Raymond Schaefer of the First Baptist Church; and Friday, Rev. Kenneth Dooley of the North Roseburg Evangelical United Brethren Church.

Roseburg service clubs which meet at noon are cooperating in the observance. Some are canceling their meetings next week, others are cutting their meetings short in order to give members time to reach the church by 12:40.

Musical portions of the united services other than congregational singing, will be as follows: Monday, solo by Rev. Henry Fox, assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church; Tuesday, the Douglas High School choir group; Wednesday, the Roseburg High School choir group; and Thursday, Roseburg Church Society chorus. Good Friday program has not yet been fully outlined.

School Measures Protested During Senate Hearing

SALEM (AP)—School superintendents and the Oregon Education Assn. strongly oppose four measures that would make stiffer the requirements in school bonding elections.

The bills, by Sen. Lee Ohmart, Salem, would limit voting in such elections to property owners, require a 30 per cent turnout of voters, require a 60 per cent majority for approval, and provide that the elections be held only on primary or general election dates.

Appearing at a hearing Friday, Floyd Light, superintendent of David Douglas High School District east of Portland, said that persons who are paying for their homes on installments would not be allowed to vote because their installments include taxes.

The people voted in 1948 to let others than property owners vote in school elections.

Clarence Hines, Eugene superintendent, said it wasn't fair to have different requirements for school elections than for other elections.

Mike Deller, Roseburg superintendent, said everybody in Oregon pays some tax and supports schools.

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Sponsors Sought For Scholarships To Boys State

Umpqua American Legion Post 116 of Roseburg announced today it had started a search for sponsors of local youths to this year's annual Beaver Boys State.

The \$25 scholarships will allow youths to attend the annual event at Oregon State College in Corvallis from June 12 to 18.

At the same time, District Chairman Claude Baker of Roseburg said he was contacting officials at Roseburg High, Glendale High and Douglas High. They in turn will make plans for selections of youths to attend the state event put on by the American Legion. Applications must be received by Baker by April 25.

Candidates for Beaver Boys State must be between 15 and 18 and must be either sophomores or juniors. Boys not in school but who are otherwise eligible and are properly recommended can be accepted. No youth who has already attended one of the boys' states is eligible. Baker said "only boys with outstanding qualifications in character, service and leadership will be selected."

Part of the annual event is to train youth in the functional aspects of citizenship, Baker said. It is a program of education to teach youth constructive attitudes toward American government, he said. He summed it up by calling an "intensive citizenship training program."

Last year 10 youths attended from this area. Baker said he expected to see more go this year. Other posts in the county were also expected to begin a hunt for sponsors and candidates soon, too.
