Mrs. Young Presents Fine Book Review

The Roseburg Woman's Club presented Mrs. E. G. Young in a review of Pearl S. Buck's "The Good Earth" to a large and appreciative audience Tuesday afternoon at the clubhouse.

The book covers the period from the Boxer Rebellion to 1933, and Mrs. Young, following the basic outline of the book, divided the review into the major periods in the life of the author.

Mrs. Young pointed out that as a child Pearl Buck mingled with all classes of Chinese people and acquired a Chinese outlook which has kept her consistently sympathetic with the Chinese and which was made possible this stirring and emotional study told in terms of people's lives. She reported that in this autobiography the author sees herself in perspective — never "Have I am" — but always this is the history and political development of China as I saw and lived it; that the author visualized historical characters as vividly as characters in a novel, set the stage, and brought them dramatically to life for the reader.

Supporting her remarks with material from other books by the author, Mrs. Young outlined the life of the author's missionary parents, life in Chinese rural areas, the degenerate society of pre-war Shanghai, the personal characteristics and problems of many of China's outstanding political figures, several of the controversial opinions held by the author and stressed in particular, the growth of modern China, its mistrust of the West, and the opportunity the U.S. has to escape from present misadventure.

Following the review, guests enjoyed viewing and discussing with the owners the many beautiful examples of Oriental art which were on display from the collections of Mrs. Stanley Kidder and Miss Gertrude East.
